

Susan M. Faherty, Manager of County Red Cross to Resign

Susan M. Faherty, Marion county Red Cross chapter manager, submitted her resignation, effective March 31, to the board of directors of the chapter here Monday night.

The board accepted her resignation "with regret," noting her "outstanding work in building up the chapter" during her four year tenure. They reported that her successor will be announced soon.

Miss Faherty disclosed that she will return to her home state of Arizona, to become assistant administrator for the southern Arizona regional blood center at Tucson.

Prior to World War II Miss Faherty was director of Catholic Charities in Arizona. She assumed her Red Cross position in Salem following the war in which she served as a major in the WAC.

Commander in Legion

Miss Faherty currently is commander of post 140, American Legion, Salem's all-woman post.

A bloodmobile visit at Mt. Angel on February 27 was announced. It will be sponsored by the American Legion post there.

Unscheduled donors were invited to participate in the blood unit's Salem visit today from 2 to 6 p. m. at the First Methodist church.

Members of the county chapter have been invited to attend a Portland program February 20 observing the first anniversary of the Portland regional blood center.

Adm. Ross E. McIntire, national blood program chairman, is scheduled to attend.

To Assist With Work

Mrs. Mark Astrup, Junior Red Cross chairman, reported that Mrs. Donald Burke and Mrs. Riley Miller will assist with work in Marion county schools.

The home service department reported 195 cases during January with \$602 given for assistance. Included were two families affected by floods and two families who were left homeless by fire.

Emergency relief was extended in these cases.

The chapter reported that plans are progressing well for the opening of the Red Cross fund campaign on February 27.

Suit Dismissed Involving Local Union Council

PORTLAND, Feb. 13 - (AP) - A National Labor Relations board suit against the Salem Building Trades council was dismissed today in federal court.

An NLRB attorney asked for the dismissal.

The agency had asked the court for an injunction to halt what it said was an illegal secondary boycott against the Valley Concrete company, Independence. This involved picketing of bridge and road work in which the firm's cement was used.

Last week, the NLRB held the firm was not engaged in interstate commerce and the NLRB did not have jurisdiction over the dispute.

U.S. 'to Listen' To Any Soviet A-Control Bids

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 - (AP) - The United States, in a change of tone toward Soviet Russia, today made plain that if Moscow has any new atomic control proposal to lay before the United Nations, this country will consider it "sympathetically."

The virtual invitation to Russia to come forward for new negotiations on the vital subject was extended by John D. Hickerson, assistant secretary of state, in talking to newsmen.

Officials said this was no change in policy, but the emphasis was somewhat different from the policy declarations made last week by President Truman and Secretary of State Acheson. They ruled out any dramatic new peace approach to Russia.

Rafael Sabantini, Author, Succumbs

ADELPHODEN, Switzerland, Feb. 13 - (AP) - Rafael Sabantini, creator of Captain Blood whose adventures covered the pages of three books, died at his hotel here early today at the age of 73.

Sabantini had been ill for years with gastric ulcers and a weak heart.

The Anglo-Italian author was best known for his novels "Scaramouche," "The Sea Hawk," "The Snare," "The Black Swan" and the three Captain Blood volumes. Many of his novels became colorful films.

Condition Traffic Accident Victims Said Unchanged

Ceremonies at Start of Scio School Project

SCIO, Feb. 13 - Ground-breaking for a new high school building was accompanied by full-scale ceremonies here today.

Stores closed, early arrivals jammed the athletic field grandstand and others stood in the rain as Dr. J. F. Hosh of Scio turned the first spadeful of earth on the construction of new quarters for Linn county union high school district three.

Speakers included Mayor Carl Warren of Scio, Linn county Judge E. G. Arnold of Albany, and Hosh, who deeded land for the athletic field to the school district.

Rolla M. Shelton, school district clerk, told of Scio's first school graduating class in 1911. Shelton was a member of that class.

Other speakers included Marvin Long, chairman of the union high school district; Kenneth J. Purdy, former school board chairman; and Mrs. C. J. Thurston, president of the Scio P.T.A. which sponsored today's program.

State Requests Portland Road Setback Lines

The Oregon state highway department wants the city of Salem to establish setback lines along North Portland road, to pave the way for eventual widening of the paved street from 60 to 80 feet.

This was communicated to the city council Monday night and referred to the planning and zoning commission.

In other action, the council appropriated an extra \$2,000 from the emergency fund, adding it to an earlier \$5,000 sum set aside for addition to the police station at city hall. This will enable City Manager J. L. Franzen to accept the low bid of E. E. Batterman, at \$6,473, for the one-story addition to the front of city hall.

Public hearings were ordered called for next month on 11 vacations of streets and alleys asked by the Salem school district. They are on school properties but never were used as streets.

An apartment zone was created for Robert Seamer property on 14th street between State and Ferry streets. Other bills passed provide for a consistent house numbering plan and a special setback to allow porch construction at 1295 Fir.

Truman Lists GI Education Work Abuses

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 - (AP) - President Truman today handed congress a catalog of abuses under this year's \$2,754,000,000 GI education program and urged the legislators to clamp down.

Pointing to skyrocketing numbers of veterans attending trade and vocational schools, Mr. Truman asked new legislation to prevent inferior training.

With an estimated 850,000 veterans taking such courses - and 5,635 private trade and vocational schools for them set up in five and a half years - Mr. Truman told congress he was concerned lest the GI education plan "be blemished by the belated growth of certain kinds" of such training which wouldn't be much help to the veteran.

The president submitted a report of the veterans administration and the budget bureau which estimated that more than 900,000 GI's would be taking the trade courses by 1951 and that the national budget for next fiscal year probably must be increased to handle it if the trend swings higher.

Threat of Blast Alerts Base

ALAMEDA, Calif., Feb. 13 - (AP) - A telephoned threat that the naval air station would be blown up brought a full security alert at some naval installations in this area today.

Paul Newcomb, operator of the Oakland fire department's alarm center, said he heard someone on the telephone say last night that "the naval air station will be blown up after 4 a.m."

A full security alert was placed on the Alameda station, the reserve air unit at Oakland airport, the naval supply center in Oakland, and the Moffett naval air station at Sunnyvale, 30 miles south of San Francisco.

PORTLAND, Feb. 13 - (AP) - The Sons and Daughters of Oregon Pioneers held their annual dinner here tonight. Some 250 persons attended.

Chief of Canadian Snowplow Crew Swept into River

VANCOUVER, Feb. 13 - (CP) - A foreman of a snowplow crew was swept into the turbulent Fraser river today when an avalanche roared down a mountain-side.

Warm weather has loosened the mountain snows, and both Canadian Pacific and Canadian National railways reported lines to the east blocked, the second time in a week.

Foreman John Torjick, alone on the snowplow, was swept to his death in open water, his body disappearing under an ice pack in the river.

He was with a crew at Hell's Gate on the C.N.R., 115 miles east of Vancouver, when the slide of mixed snow and rock plummeted down, carrying a 100-ton snowplow half way down the river bank. Torjick was thrown into the water. Members of his crew, working outside the plow, escaped injury.

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California Laughs Himself to Death

LONG BEACH, Calif., Feb. 13 - (AP) - Julius B. Madeson, 52, laughed so hard at a barber's joke that he fell dead today.

Police said Madeson and Bert Lowery were swapping humor in Lowery's barber shop here. In the midst of his laughter, Madeson suddenly collapsed. He was pronounced dead at Seaside hospital.

9 Tennessee Deaths Boost Tornado Toll

RIPELY, Tenn., Feb. 13 - (AP) - A tornado dealt death to nine persons in the tiny Hurricane Hill community early today and brought to at least 47 the number of deaths from weekend tornadoes in four states.

Some 200 persons were injured in the storms that skipped into east Texas, northwest Louisiana, southern Arkansas and west Tennessee.

The twister roared into the Hurricane Hill farm settlement near here as the countryside slept. It killed Wilson Carroll, a 34-year-old tenant farmer, his 27-year-old wife and their six small children.

Nearby, the storm wrecked two more homes and took the life of Alice Wright, a 57-year-old negro farm woman.

Several other homes in the two-mile path were damaged, but only four persons were injured and those slightly.

It was the second time the Hurricane Hill section had been devastated by winds. Old settlers say it got its name from a storm that eliminated everything in its path in the 1870's.

The tornado struck about 2 a. m., an hour and a half after a twister tore across some farmlands near Rosemark, Tenn., a few miles from Memphis, 53 miles south of here. Several homes were damaged.

This wind ripped out walls in the rooms where several members of the L. E. House family were sleeping. But no one was hurt.

The tornadoes continued to follow their northeastward course that started Saturday when a mass of cold air met warm, moist air and spawned death and destruction in Texas and Louisiana.

Russians Slow Trucks Again

BERLIN, Tuesday, Feb. 14 - (AP) - The Russians slowed down trucks bound for Berlin without warning last night.

By midnight there were between 30 and 40 trucks stalled at the Soviet checkpoint in Helmsstedt. German customs men said the Russians had offered no explanation. Only three or four trucks an hour were allowed to pass.

Truck traffic in the opposite direction, from Berlin to the west, was normal.

There had been no delays over the week-end. Traffic was handled at the rate of about 10 trucks an hour which is considered satisfactory.

11 Officers Bolt Bridges Union To Join AFL

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 13 - (AP) - Inter-union strife among San Francisco warehousemen became a reality today.

Eleven San Francisco officers of the CIO Warehousemen's union bolted the organization to go into the AFL Teamsters union.

Local 6 of the warehousemen has six divisions and about 12,000 members. It is a part of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union, which is headed by Harry Bridges. The San Francisco division, of which the 11 officers were members, has approximately 5,000 members.

Heading the Teamsters' union on the Pacific coast, which has publicly said it believed the warehousemen should come within its jurisdiction, is Dave Beck of Seattle.

The 11 men who left the CIO immediately formed a new Teamsters union local.

Joseph Dillon, Teamsters official who will be secretary-treasurer pro-tem of the new unit, said it would attempt to win over local CIO warehousemen.

The 11 officers included three business agents, six executive board members and two members of the board of trustees.

One of the business agents, Tony Koclosky, said they had quit the CIO local because they disagreed with the "left-wing" policies of the ILWU.

Dragon Dies In Captivity

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 13 - (AP) - This real dragon didn't do so well in captivity.

The eight-foot killer dragon imported from the island of Komodo near Borneo was found dead today in its crate aboard ship.

The thing is a carnivorous lizard, a pint-sized version of an ancestor that sometimes grew 80 feet long. It was one of a thousand rare oriental birds, animals and reptiles brought here for Animal Hunter Noel Rosefelt, who is going to distribute them to various zoos around the country.
