

Near Air Crash Laid to Malfunctioning Woman

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17-(AP)—A wild "kiss and kick" battle between a statuesque blonde and the co-pilot of a chartered New York-Florida plane flying at an altitude of 3,000 feet was reported to police here today.

Co-pilot, T. C. Sallee, 32, who flew with the late Bill Odom on a round-the-world trip, said the struggle lasted 15 minutes and threatened to send the plane crashing out of control.

Finally, the pilot, K. H. Dubanovich, turned the plane back on its south-bound flight and made a shaky, unobscured landing at Washington National airport.

The blonde was identified by a driver's license as Miss Willie Jane Frost, 38, of Coral Gables, Fla., and Los Angeles. She was taken to a hospital in nearby Alexandria, Va.

Woke Up Hysterical
Co-pilot Sallee said the woman chartered the plane in New York for a trip to Miami. She slept most of the time during the first part of the trip, but about 10 minutes south of Washington she woke up hysterical. Sallee said she began kicking the back of his seat facing out of control.

"She reached around my neck and pulled me back. Then she started kissing me," he said.

Kicked at Windows
"I saw a chance to grab her hands when she started kicking at the windows, but I couldn't hold on. Finally I managed to get into the rear seat and hold her down but she kept kicking and struggling."

"She asked me if I loved her," Sallee said, "and hoping to quiet her, I would say, 'madly'."

"That seemed to quiet her for a while, but then she would start in again. She was throwing herself all over the plane, trying to grab the wheel, trying to open the door."

Signaled for Landing
When it became apparent that the woman could not be subdued, Pilot Dubanovich signalled the Washington airport tower to have an ambulance waiting.

"Have malfunctioning passenger aboard. Have police and ambulances standing by. Am going to land."

Ranks of Dixie Homeless Grow With Floods

Flood waters spilled across more farmland in the south Friday, and engineers predicted the army of 35,000 homeless would continue to grow.

Meanwhile, a new blast of frigid air whistled into the northern plains from Canada and spread south and eastward.

Rising tributaries of the Mississippi river engulfed more cotton land in flood-plagued Louisiana. Guardsmen manning amphibious "dams" churned through swamps and bayous to whisk lowland residents from the spreading path of flood waters that already cover 1,840,000 acres. Another 190,000 acres are under water in adjoining Mississippi.

About 8,000 have been driven from their homes in Louisiana and Mississippi. Another 23,000 are homeless in Arkansas.

Houck to Head City-County Airport Zoners

Roy Houck, retired Salem contractor, will be chairman of the new joint city-county airport zoning board for McNary field, it was announced Friday.

Houck was named to the board, and as chairman, Thursday evening by the four members earlier appointed by Marion county court and Salem council.

This group will meet again Monday, February 27, to select members of a five-man committee to do the actual zoning, to protect the airport from high buildings and other obstructions and from use of adjacent land which would hamper aerial operations. Improvement to assure CAA expansion projects is among the aims.

On the board also are Robert F. White, chairman of the city planning and zoning commission; Dr. Lewis D. Campbell, flying enthusiast; Hedda Swart, county engineer; and Donald Cannon, president of Salem Gun club.

Garbage Dump Odors Draw Sharp Protest

A wide variety of complaints were voiced Friday as the Marion county court held an all-day hearing for Macleay district residents who are protesting location of a county dump at Macleay.

The dump was established Nov. 15, 1949, a mile north of the Macleay schoolhouse on a site purchased by the county from Oscar Baker for \$7,500. It is about a mile east of the city of Salem's dump near Macleay.

Mrs. Dan Wilson of Macleay produced a letter from Baker stating that he didn't know the land would be used for a dump or he wouldn't have allowed the county to purchase it.

Judge Grant Murphy, however, said that Baker offered the land for sale just a short time after the court had made it known through local newspapers that the county was seeking a site for a garbage dump.

Typical Complaints
Complaints were registered by nearly every one of nearly 50 residents who packed the county courtroom. Typical among these were from:

Mrs. Theodore Olson — "The smell is severe even at the Pratum school five miles away."

Mrs. George E. Boedigheimer — "Trucks drop debris as they carry garbage to the dump."

"Continuous Stench"
Joseph Fendrick — "Edible matter fails to burn and carries a continuous stench."

Paul Ricks — "I saw two children walking through bones, rotten potatoes and lemons and old car batteries and then going into school wearing the same shoes."

Mrs. Dan Wilson — "Property has gone down in value and nearby grain fields are endangered by fire."

A. W. Sahli — "I once raised skunks and I'd prefer the odor from them to the odor from that dump."

No Protests Raised
In defense of the court, Murphy pointed out that there were no protests from residents when they were approached prior to the establishment of the dump about the problem and that no protests have been registered from residents near the county dump at Woodburn, a larger city.

It was announced by Norman Winslow, attorney for protesting residents, that the Macleay Community club has gone on record as protesting continued operation of the dump.

Murphy, in answer to a request from Sahli, one of the protesting residents, said the court would be glad to come out to the dump area at any convenient time and make a first-hand study of conditions that residents claim exist.

Deputy District Attorney Sam Harbison appeared at the hearing as counsel for the court.

The court took the petition asking removal of the dump under advisement.

Logsdon Sued For Back Taxes

OREGON CITY, Feb. 17-(AP)—Lonnie Logsdon, night club and amusement company operator, was sued by the government for back income taxes today.

The government filed a tax lien for \$123,086, which it said represented additional income taxes and interest for 1942, 1943, 1946, and 1947.

Logsdon has been sued at different times by persons who contended they lost money gambling in establishments he ran.

Deadline Near For Enclosure Of Stairwells

Deadline for enclosure of all unprotected verticle openings in buildings of three or more stories in which people sleep is July 5, State Fire Marshal Robert B. Taylor reminded Friday. Penalty for non-compliance is closure of the building, said Taylor.

That is the end of a three-year grace period provided by the fire escape law amendment of 1947. The time was granted to permit changes to be made in existing buildings — regarding stairwells particularly.

Meanwhile, the city building inspector's office is allowing owners to proceed with alterations to conform with the state law, although Salem's city building code is more stringent, provided the state fire marshal and the city fire prevention bureau approve the work. On permits for such alterations, the building permit form bears the notation of "Does not meet requirements as called for in the city of Salem building code nor this building department's approval."

City Engineer J. H. Davis, who is building inspector, said buildings which come under the amendment must conform to the city's requirements as to enclosed passages when other alterations are made.

Occupancies coming under the scope of the act include hotels, rooming houses, apartment buildings, hospitals, nursing homes, boarding schools and some other buildings. Taylor said he was enlisting the assistance of apartment, hotel and hospital associations and other groups to make certain that the requirements of the law are understood by all who come under its provisions.

Final Services Set in Stayton For Lloyd Fox

Funeral services will be held at the Weddle funeral home in Stayton Monday at 2:30 p.m. for Lloyd Fox, 27, former Salem and West Stayton resident, who died of exposure in the mountains near McCloud, Calif., last Tuesday.

Fox was enroute to a resort lodge where he had been recently employed to repair telephone lines at the time of his death, his mother in Salem was informed.

Born at Missoula, Mont., Dec. 29, 1922, Fox came to Marion county with his family and with the exception of war service had resided in Salem and vicinity all his life. He had been in California for the past year.

Surviving are his widow, Leella Fox, Wenatchee, Wash., and one daughter; mother, Mrs. Harley West, Salem; father, F. J. Fox, West Stayton; half-brother, Fred Davenport, Dexter; half-sisters Mrs. Violet Driessche, Mansfield, Wash., and Mrs. Alice Hilton, West Stayton; sisters, Mrs. Lucille Loe and Betty Jane Fox, both of Salem.

Jurist Asserts U.S. 'on Road To Socialism'

A warning for all people to exert their individual efforts to turn back from the road to socialism was issued Friday night in Salem by Louisiana jurist, Judge George W. Hardy, Jr.

Members of the Salem Knife and Fork club heard Judge Hardy plead for a return to the fundamental American ideas of equality of opportunity in a speech entitled "God, the Supreme Court and Us."

"The road to socialism is traversed by easy stages," Judge Hardy said. "We have learned to accept, then expect and enjoy benefits from the coffers of government."

Hardy cited the examples of nations where lethargy of the people has led to their downfall or loss of individual freedom to minority rule. "We should realize that welfare and freedom of the individual is guaranteed by protection of majorities, not minorities."

"There must be a subordination of individual or minority rights to the desires of the majority or society. The trend towards protection of minorities may be leading the (U.S.) supreme court into infringing on rights of majorities."

The trend of the supreme court was emphasized by a recent ruling forbidding so-called free time in the schools for religious education. There, one person an admitted atheist, thwarted the desires of the majority by the expedient of a supreme court decision.

We need a return to faith in "God, yes, and faith in our fellowmen," the judge of the second circuit court of appeals in Shreveport, La., said. America is a partnership between God and the people; the trend of government and thought seems to be discarding that idea, Hardy added.
