## ABC's Racial Policy Blasted

### Gotham Sheet Howls; Court Action Slated

NEW YORK, Feb. 20 (AP)—The American Bowling Congress' rule restricting membership to individuals of the white male sex resulted today in cancellation of a March 17 tournament by the New York Journal-American.

The Journal-American, in a front page story signed by Bill Corum, said it also would take similar action at the end of a women's tournament, now underway.

The Women's International Bowling Congress continues to adhere to its restrictive by-laws.

The ABC faces court action next Monday, date set for a hearing on the suit by the New York state attorney general to oust the organization from the state on the grounds of alleged racial discrimination.

Attorney General Nathaniel L. Goldstein has charged the activities of the ABC are contrary to the policies of the state. The ABC was advised today by the supreme court Justice Benedict D. Dineen that the hearing would open Monday.

Corum mentioned the attorney general's suit in his column which read in part:

"Here is a strange commentary and an unhappy one, on one of America's most popular and widespread sports.

"James Francis Thorpe, known around the world as Jim, the old Sac and Fox Indian warrior of the gridiron, cinder path and baseball diamond and recently voted America's athlete of the half century, couldn't win a recognized title competing in it.

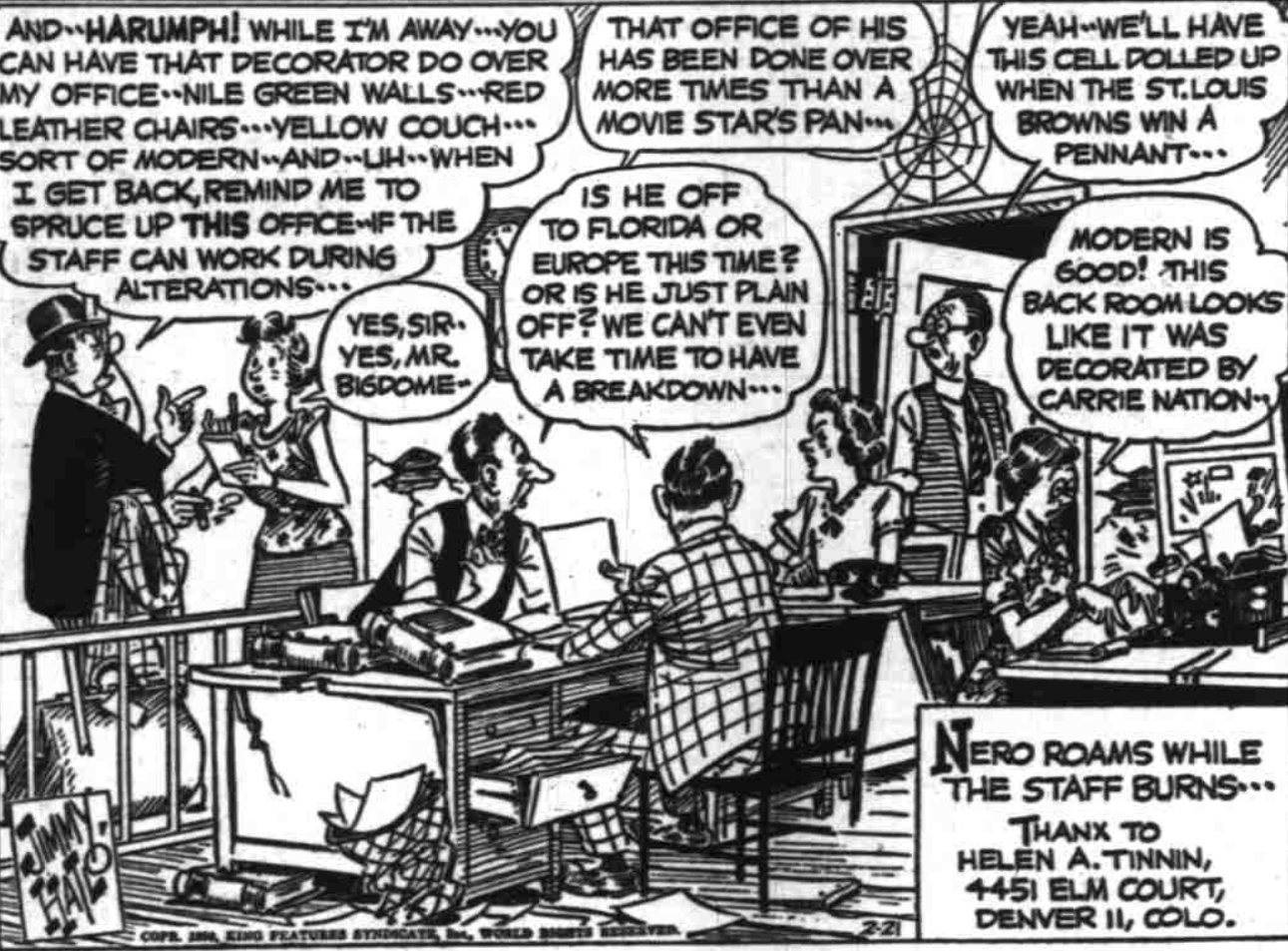
"Neither could Joe Louis. Nor Duke Kahanamoku, the human submarine from Honolulu who introduced the crawl stroke in swimming to America.

"Any championship not designed to produce the true champion is not and cannot be a true championship."

In Chicago, Jan. 23, the ABC countered charges of racial discrimination by saying it is a private club to which no person has any "inalienable right" to belong.

# Fight Card Wednesday

All competitors slated for the 28-round VFW boxing show at the armory Wednesday night wound up the heavier portions of their training sorties Monday. Matchmaker Tex Salkeld reported. The 18 shoved gladiators will make with a 10-round main event, a six-round special and a trio of four-rounders. Salkeld Monday also lined up an opponent for Middleweight Harry Hughes of Eugene in the six-round. It will be Mickey O'Dowd of Pe--and, a veteran of 25 fights, most of them in the middle west.

The main event sends Indian Dick Wolfe, state welter champ, again Al Cliff, hard-hitting and ditto-working Portland negro. The top four-rounder has Dick Collier of Salem tangle with Bob Schaffer of Eugene in the middleweight class. Welter Jimmie Bluebaby of San Jose goes against Bill Carson of Portland in another four, and in the 8:30 opener it will be Lightweight Wes Hanson of Portland against Gordon Nordstrom of Vancouver.

Both Wolfe and Cliff will weigh slightly less than 150 pounds for their mainer. The card will be first of the year for the armory ring by the pros, as two others since Jan. 1 were canceled because of bad weather conditions.

# Senators Lose Gene Peterson

Pitcher Gene Peterson, the in-and-out righthander from McMinnville, will not be with the Salem Senators the coming season, it was announced by Manager George Emigh Monday. Peterson has applied for his voluntary retirement from baseball and is occupied in a paint business in McMinnville.

The former Linfield college ace was with Salem two seasons. Wildness proved his greatest obstacle in attempting to win consistently for the club.

Emigh also announced that Catcher Buster McMullan, with the club for 46 games in 1948, has again been signed. He hit .310 for the Senators during his 1948 appearances and did some outfielding and pitching besides catching. He is a left-hand batter. McMullan was out of baseball last season.

Pitcher Dick Walbe, six-foot, one-inch 200-pounder from Hillsboro has also been signed and will report to the Corvallis camp next month.

Emigh has lined up a 10-game spring training schedule for the club, with Oregon State, Portland U, Pacific, Linfield and Willamette. Some of the games will be played in Waters field.

# French Fighter Eyes Pep Title

NEW YORK, Feb. 20 (AP)—Ray Famechon, 25-year-old European featherweight champion, arrived in New York tonight for a March shot at Willie Pep's world 126-pound crown.

Famechon and Pep will clash March 17 at Madison Square Garden, if a few details can be worked out. Pep's manager, Lou Viccupoli, is demanding Famechon post his share of the purse and \$20,000 additionally as a guarantee for a return bout in case the champion loses.

The stocky Frenchman said he had won 61 of 63 bouts as a professional.

# Boxing Figures Handed Tribute

NEW YORK, Feb. 20 (AP)—The New York Boxing Managers guild tonight honored Jack Dempsey, Dr. Vincent A. Nardiello and Ed Vanevery at their fourth-annual breakfast dinner.

Dempsey received a plaque as winner of the Associated Press mid-century poll in which he was voted the standout fighter of the last 50 years. Nardiello, New York state athletic commission physician, was honored for his service to boxing during 1949, particularly his work in Madison Square Garden bouts.

Van Every, veteran boxing writer, was presented with a plaque for his service to boxing over a long period.

NEW YORK, Feb. 20 (AP)—Holy Cross' all-conquering basketball team today became the first quintet in the nation to enter a major post-season tournament when it accepted an invitation to the National Collegiate Athletic association tourney in New York.

Winners of 22 straight, the Crusaders were named to represent district No. 1. The announcement was made by Ray Oosting, Trinity college athletic director who is chairman of the district selection committee.

The tournament's eastern playoffs will be held at Madison Square Garden on March 23 and 25. The eastern playoffs will be held on the same dates at Kansas City. On March 28, the eastern and western winners will meet in New York for the title.
