Accident Study Cities Named By Committee

Six Oregon cities have been named as areas for a survey of industrial accidents by the governor's industrial safety advisory committee.

The cities, selected at the committee's February meeting in Portland, are Tillamook, Roseburg, La Grande, Bend, Prineville and Klamath Falls.

Aim of the surveys will be to create local safety committees which will aid the central committee in its program to reduce the number of industrial accidents in the state.

Three areas of action besides the local safety committee plan, have been selected by the central group in its anti-accident campaign.

Accident statistics will be studied, a survey of safety codes will be conducted and possibilities of establishing a specific course of safety training will be investigated. The committee will meet again March 17.
