

Dr. Sander Expected Only 'Reprimand'

MANCHESTER, N. H., Feb. 24 (AP)—Counsel for Dr. Hermann N. Sander succeeded today in blocking an assertion that the husband of the woman the country doctor is accused of killing "had nothing to do" with the mercy death.

Judge Harold E. Wescott ordered Sheriff Thomas E. O'Brien's remarks stricken after the defense raised vigorous objections. Earlier, the 13-man jury was told that the 41-year-old defendant doctor anticipated only a "reprimand" in the so-called mercy killing.

Dr. Sander is charged with murder. The state claims he killed Mrs. Abbie Borroto, 59, by administering four injections of air into her veins. She was suffering from cancer.

A hospital nurse said Sander told the county medical referee "he (Sander) assumed the medical association would probably reprimand him for it; tell him not to do it again."

Portland Gets New Tax Referendum

PORTLAND, Feb. 24 (AP)—The city council indicated today it would call on voters to decide at the May 19 primary election whether to increase Portland property taxes and water rates.

The proposed increases are intended to raise \$3,500,000 annually.

Turnout for British Vote Sets Record

LONDON, Feb. 24 (AP)—The slim margin of victory for Britain's labor party in national elections has seen a record count of 28,582,901 voters in 617 constituencies reported by today.

This represented 84 per cent of the eligible vote.

Of the total, labor got 13,209,400; the conservatives, 12,408,808; liberals, 2,810,376; communists, 91,746; independent labor, 41,127; independents, 58,856; Scottish nationalist, 9,708; Welsh nationalist, 17,580; Irish nationalist, 69,458; Sinn Fein, 23,362.

The percentages of the total popular vote for the leading parties: Labor, 46; conservative, 43; liberals, 9; communist, one-third of one per cent.

The figures in the 1945 election were: labor, 11,922,292; conservative, 9,058,020; liberal, 2,596,056; communists, 102,780.

State Removes Road Load Limits

Elimination of load restrictions on seven Oregon highways, imposed sometime ago by the state highway department in an effort to minimize frost damage, was announced by department officials here Friday. The order takes effect Monday.

Roads on which restrictions will be lifted include the Crater Lake, Wilson River, Nehalem, Netarts, Woodburn-Estacada, Kings Valley and Albany-Lyons.

Criminal Ward Hospital Inmate Fails in Break

Police recaptured a handcuffed inmate of the state hospital criminally insane ward Friday, minutes after he broke away from an attendant while being taken to the X-ray room.

Frank Bowman, 25, escaped at 10 a.m. and fled north across Center street. He was taken from under an unused chicken house in the block of Thompson avenue, 10 blocks from the hospital, about 10:40 a.m.

Bowman, though not a criminal, was quartered in the ward because of several previous escapes. He was being taken to the X-ray room for treatment of a shoulder injury when he broke and ran. State and city police converged on the area north of the hospital shortly after the escape. Residents of the area, informed of the escape, recalled seeing a man enter a yard on Thompson avenue. A close check of the area revealed where Bowman had crawled under the chicken shack.

City police officers located the mud-covered escapee under the building and he was returned immediately to the hospital.

GOP Interprets British Vote as Swing to Right

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)—Republicans today tabbed the Tory resurgence in the British elections as a sign of a world trend that may help the GOP regain control of congress in November.

Democrats in congress discounted the American effect of the elections which saw the labor party emerge with only a slim and precarious majority in the house of commons.

There was on immediate reaction from President Truman or Secretary of State Acheson. However, a number of administration officials indicated they were disappointed that the election had no clear-cut, conclusive result.

The attitude was that a government with such an uncertain base of support in parliament may find it difficult to take firm and vigorous action on international issues which will be coming up for settlement.

But the return of the conservatives to a strong minority position in England promised to curb some, although not all, congressional grumbling over American aid to a socialist government which has aimed at greater nationalization of industries.

Senator Taft of Ohio, chairman of the senate republican policy committee, told reporters he thinks the British vote represents a world wide trend toward conservatism.

Wallace Urges Peace Drive by Progressives

CHICAGO, Feb. 24 (AP)—Henry A. Wallace told progressive party leaders tonight they are in a position to win "a campaign for peace" if they make it clear the third party is not a communist puppet.

He called for official public talks between the United States and Russia to reach agreement renouncing use of atomic energy as a destructive weapon. He urged United Nations inspection to enforce such a pact.

Also, he proposed, North Atlantic pact nations should declare publicly they will not be the first to use atomic weapons.

Irving Bacheller, Novelist, Dies

WHITE PLAINS, N.Y., Feb. 24 (AP)—Irving Bacheller, 90-year-old author who wrote the novel "Eben Holden," died tonight. Hospital officials would not elaborate on the cause of death.

"Eben Holden," a literary sensation in 1900, was one of 28 novels written by Bacheller.

TO VISIT PLANTS IN EAST CORVALLIS, Feb. 24 (AP)—A field trip to three of the country's large pharmaceutical manufacturers was begun today by 32 Oregon State college pharmacy students.

They will visit Indianapolis, Kalamazoo, and Chicago, returning here March 6.

New Pair of Shoes News To Transient

When a transient awakened Thursday in Salem wearing a new pair of shoes he went directly to the city police.

The transient explained to police that he was doing a bit of drinking in Eugene, and didn't recall anything until waking up in a local hotel with a pair of new shoes on his feet. He said he didn't have the shoes when he started in, nor did he have any money. He reasoned he must of cashed a bad check somewhere along the line.

Meanwhile he is cooling his well-shod heels in the city jail on a vagrancy charge pending investigation by Eugene area police.

Truman to Delay U.S. Rail Strike

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)—President Truman has disclosed he will invoke an automatic 60-day stop to head off a threatened nationwide railroad strike, tentatively set to begin at 6 a. m., EST, Monday.

The brotherhoods composed of conductors and trainmen, representing between 200,000 and 250,000 workers, called the strike after rejecting federal arbitration on its wage-hour demands.

However, the railway labor act provides that a strike must be postponed for at least 60 days after the president appoints an emergency fact-finding board.

Remodeling to Result in New Sandwich Shop

A new sandwich and ice cream shop will be opened next month in the Breyman building on North Commercial street just south of the Quisenberry pharmacy.

M. H. Stuhr, who formerly operated Mar's restaurant on North High street, will manage the new Commercial street shop. Stuhr said Friday most of his plans for the shop are still in the preliminary stage.

E. E. Batterman, Salem contractor, now is remodeling that portion of the Breyman building which will be used for the shop. Batterman estimated the project would cost about \$5,000 and would be completed in about two weeks. L. P. Bartholomew is the architect.

Space for the new shop is being leased by Attorney R. Breyman Boise as administrator of the Breyman estate.

Senate Refuses To Lop Potato Price Support

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)—The senate refused today to cut off all government price supports for Irish potatoes, as proposed by Senator Lucas (D-Ill.). Both Senators Morse and Cordon of Oregon voted with the majority.

Instead, it tentatively adopted by a 43 to 35 vote to substitute a plan by Senator Aiken (R-Vt.) which would allow the supports to be continued under either of two conditions. Lucas called the substitute "futile and useless" and said it would do absolutely nothing to plug the drain on the treasury caused by propping up the price of potatoes, or reduce their surplus production.

Under the Aiken plan, potato price supports could continue if (1) regional marketing agreements have been accepted by two-thirds of the growers, or (2) marketing quotas are authorized by congress and approved by two-thirds of the growers nationally.
