## Veterinary Hospital Slates Open House

Salem Veterinary hospital, 3380 Portland rd., will show off its recent remodeling and expansion project at an open house today from 2 to 7 p.m., according to Dr. Sydney P. Levene, owner.

The hospital has been more than doubled in size by the \$10,000 project, said Levene, and can handle more than 60 animals at one time. Quarters for all animals have been improved, and the hospital is air-conditioned to minimize contamination.

Dr. Levene, a graduate of Kansas State Veterinary college, has operated the hospital since 1942. It was established here in 1937.

## OSEA Plans Membership Drive in State

A membership drive and proposed changes in the state retirement act occupied a meeting here Saturday of the state board of directors of the Oregon State Employees association.

A campaign to boost state membership from its present 4,000 to 6,000 this year was decided on. J. D. Wilson of Salem, membership chairman, was named by President Edward Chidsey of La Grande to direct the drive.

Wilson plans to set a 1950 quota for each of the 49 OSEA chapters in Oregon.

The state board endorsed a request Saturday for all local chapter presidents to sound out legislative candidates on their attitude to the OSEA recommendations on the state retirement act.

The OSEA favors legislative approval of at least three changes—that credit for all prior service be granted (now 20-year maximum); allowance be at the rate of \$4 per month for each year of

service (now \$2.50), and to increase to \$4,200 the maximum salary the state will match (now \$3,000).

These proposals were previously adopted by the general OSEA council but failed to pass the 1949 legislature. The board will next meet May 17 in Salem. Saturday's meeting was at the Senator hotel.

## Macleay to Show County Officials Effects of Dump
