Mrs. Jennie M. Hayes
ALBANY — Mrs. Jennie M. Hayes, 83, died at her home here Monday following a brief illness. Funeral services will be held from the Fisher Funeral home at 1:30 p. m. Wednesday, March 1. The Rev. Roy D. Strong will officiate. Burial will be in the Union cemetery at Crawfordsville.

Jennie Glass was born Oct. 8, 1856, the daughter of Samuel and Margaret McClung Glass. Her father came to Oregon in 1852, riding most of the way from his eastern home on horseback, while her mother had come the long distance with her parents in 1850. The two families had settled at Crawfordsville and Mrs. Hayes spent the greater part of her life on the farm on which she was born and which had been the home of her parents. She was married to Matthew E. Hayes at Crawfordsville Dec. 7, 1894. In 1922, they moved to Albany where Mr. Hayes died in 1949. One son, John Glass, died at the age of nine years. Mrs. Hayes was a member of the United Brethren church. Surviving is a cousin, Mrs. Ivy Smith of Crawfordsville.

Glen R. Gimeson
ALBANY — The Fisher Funeral home is sending the body of Glen Robert Gimeson to Orleans, Neb., where funeral services will be held, probably on March 3.

Glen R. Gimeson died a few minutes after being taken to the Albany General hospital Saturday evening, Feb. 25, following an auto accident west of Albany on highway 20. The car which he was driving hit a truck as Gimeson and two companions were returning to Philomath. His two companions, Elmer Ward and Lawrence Kotke, escaped with minor injuries.

Glen Gimeson was born Aug. 23, 1926, in Oxford, Neb. Before coming to Oregon eight months ago he lived in Seattle. Since coming here he had been employed in a lumber mill in Kings Valley. Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Otis Gimeson; five brothers, Merle, Donald, Junior, Russell and Earl; two sisters, Mrs. Edna Olson and Marion Gimeson; and his grandmother, Mrs. Florence Gimeson, all of Orleans, Neb.; another brother, Leo, with the U. S. army in Germany, and another sister, Mrs. Robert Bunch of Kings Valley. Another brother, Dean Gimeson, died while in the service in World War II, and young Gimeson himself served in World War II from Dec. 13, 1944, to July 8, 1946.

She lived in Portland after her marriage and in 1894 moved back to Aurora where she had since resided.

Surviving are two sons, Ben of Eugene and Fred of Aurora; two daughters, Mrs. Hattie Ehlen and Mrs. Ezra Hurst both of Aurora; six grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

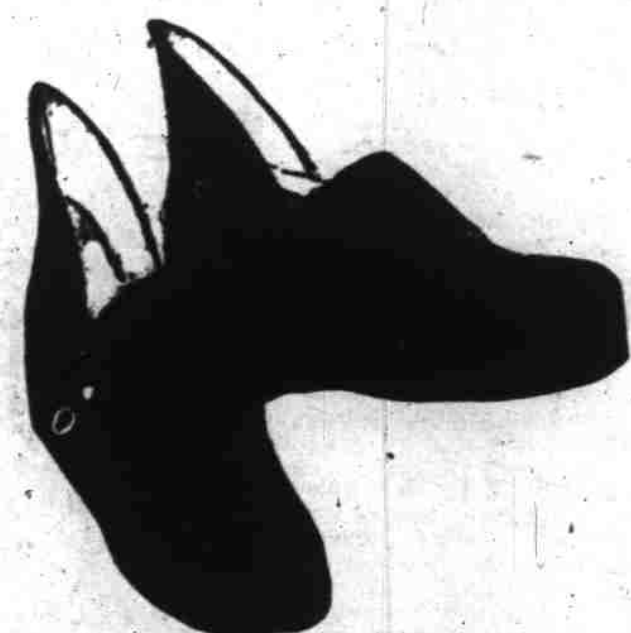
