

Oregon Planes Land at Cuban Destination

HAVANA, Cuba, March 4—(AP)—A tour of light airplanes sponsored by the Portland, Ore., Chamber of Commerce brought 82 planes to Havana today.

They came here on a 90-mile over-water flight from Key West, on the southern tip of the Florida keys, without incident.

The planes, carrying from two to four passengers, came in groups of eight or more. The last group checked in at a downtown hotel in Havana shortly before 5 p.m. (EST).

At the Rancho Boyeros airport, center of domestic and international air traffic in Cuba, the visitors got welcomes in Spanish and English.

They rode down palm-lined boulevards to hotels, and spent the afternoon sightseeing.

The visitors had flown here in short hops from Portland, covering much of the southwestern United States, the gulf coast, and Florida from one end to the other.

L. S. White of Portland, chairman of the tour, said "everything is in fine shape, and everybody is well."

Severe Cold Nips Eastern Coast of U.S.

Bitter cold nipped New England and the north Atlantic states again Saturday, but forecasters looked upon it as one of winter's dying gasps.

A great thaw has started in the midwest. Warmer weather is working into the east. A blanket of old snow extends across Pennsylvania, northern Ohio, northern Illinois, northern Iowa, eastern South Dakota and North Dakota. The southern border of this snow line is expected to retreat some 200 miles over the week end.

But the frigid blasts brought record cold in the northeast. The temperature plummeted to 41 degrees below zero at Wanakena, N. Y., the state's northernmost point. The reading was the lowest of the winter. Portland, Me., had -21, lowest ever recorded there in March. The previous low for the month was -13 on March 6, 1948.

The mercury slipped to -20 in Albany, N. Y., and -17 in Caribou, Me. Some below zero readings were reported in Pennsylvania's mountain regions.

Temperatures climbed steadily in the midwest, where a cold wave hit earlier in the week. Readings in the 40's and 50's were forecast for most of the area on Sunday.

Spring-like weather was expected to cover most of the country from the Mississippi river valley to the Pacific coast.

Plan Provides Distribution of Surplus Spuds

WASHINGTON, March 4—(AP)—A tentative agreement to spend a few more million dollars on surplus potatoes "rather than see them rot" was reached late today by a senate-house conference on farm price supports.

Senator Elmer Thomas (D-Okla.) told reporters the agreement was still subject to final approval of the seven senators and seven house members trying to work out a compromise on emergency legislation covering potatoes, cotton, wheat and peanuts.

The new proposal by senate majority leader Lucas (D-Ill.) would allow the government to pay freight or transportation costs of moving the spuds to tax-supported state and local agencies for human consumption.

The potatoes, acquired under the government price support program, would be given away without cost.

"We decided we should spend a little more money rather than see them rot," Thomas explained. "Nobody knows how much this would cost because that depends upon how many would be used."

Weyerhaeuser Dickering to Buy Ship Line

TACOMA, March 4—(AP)—Negotiations are in progress for the purchase of the Pacific Coast Direct Line by the Weyerhaeuser Steamship company, it was announced here today by J. P. Weyerhaeuser, jr., president of the latter firm.

The Direct Line has worked closely with the Weyerhaeuser company for a number of years under a charter agreement whereby the former has operated the Weyerhaeuser vessels on west-bound trips from the east coast. Effect of the consolidation will be to streamline the operation of both lines by placing them under a single management.

The two lines will continue to offer a shipping service between the east and west coasts on a fourteen-day frequency. This means Weyerhaeuser vessels on both sides of the continent will leave for the alternate coast at rate of one every two weeks.

USAF Plane Pancakes onto Lake Michigan

MILWAUKEE, March 4—(AP)—An air force plane with six men aboard pancaked onto cold Lake Michigan tonight.

No survivors had been found hours later although an air-water search was launched immediately.

Searchers planned to patrol Lake Michigan all night in their hunt for survivors.

Aircraft and surface vessels dropped flares in ever widening circles in their quest for the men aboard the plane which fell into the lake after radioing it was low on gas and might have to make an emergency landing.

Six fighter planes from the national guard were due to take off from Mitchell field at dawn to aid in the search.

Neither wreckage nor survivors had been sighted at midnight by rescue workers aboard commercial and service planes, and coast guard and fire department vessels.

The plane, a small transport craft, was completing a non-stop flight from Washington, D.C.

Cesar Werth of suburban Cudahy said he was driving home near the lake shore when the plane flew low over his car headed eastward toward the lake. He said it continued to lose altitude until it pancaked into the water about a mile from shore.

"The landing lights were plainly visible after the crash," he said, "but after a while they became dimmer and finally could not be seen."

GM Employee Vote Favors Union Shop

DETROIT, March 4—(AP)—In the biggest election of its kind ever held, General Motors workers voted nearly 8 to 1 for a union shop.

The National Labor Relations board announced today that 171,629 of GM's 230,050 eligible employees approved a union shop. There were 21,950 opposed and 5,774 ballots were challenged.

The results cleared the way for the CIO United Auto workers to bargain with General Motors for a union shop, one of its major demands this year. Negotiations will start in less than a month.

The union announced yesterday that it will seek the equivalent of 31 cents an hour in economic benefits from GM. It also plans to seek several other non-economic benefits in addition to a union shop.

Bidault Slows Red Filibuster On Arms Aid

PARIS, Sunday, March 5—(AP)—The French national assembly early today beat down a series of communist amendments to Premier Georges Bidault's anti-sabotage bill and recessed until 3 p.m. (6 a.m. PST).

When it reconvenes, the assembly will go to work immediately on the compromise bill accepted tentatively by the non-communist parties, with a view to passing it quickly.

Bidault has demanded that the bill be pushed through to give the government more machinery with which to counter the communists' threat to block delivery to France of American arms under the arms aid pact.

The recess was taken at 4:15 a.m. after the deputies had been in virtually continuous session for more than 36 hours. The session was broken up twice by fist fights and police were called to eject the communists from the chamber.

The bill to be taken up this afternoon is designed to give the government a better weapon against saboteurs by abolishing the death penalty and consequently making convictions easier.

While dockers at Bordeaux, Calais, Dunkerque and at Algiers in North Africa went on a 24-hour strike at the call of the communist-dominated General Federation of Labor, the assembly had voted yesterday to limit debate and end its marathon session at 1 p.m.

Plenty of Amendments

But when the assembly resumed at 4 p.m. the flow of communist speeches continued. The closure, voted 315 to 180, was a victory for Bidault, but each of the 180 communist deputies was still allowed by the rules to speak five minutes on each proposed amendment.

and the communists were ready with a lot of amendments.

Either because the communists were embarrassed by the newspaper headlines on "scenes of riot" or because they were satisfied with the publicity, they calmed noticeably after first morning newspapers appeared today.

These newspapers told how desk tops were ripped off, clothes torn and one guardsman was bitten on one hand by a woman communist member in the wild all-night session.

The car was heavily damaged and the bridge railing was bent.

2 Tree Farm Areas Formed

EUGENE, March 4—(AP)—Two new tree farm areas were reported today by Willamette Valley Tree Farms, Inc.

Elected to full membership in the corporation were the 26,000-acre Valseltz tree farm, owned by Valseltz Lumber company, and the 12,000-acre western tree farm owned by Saginaw Timber Co., Dant & Russell, Inc., and Inman-Poulson Lumber company.

That brought the tree farm area of the corporation to 495,000 acres.

Allies to Halt Refugee Flow Into West Reich

FRANKFURT, Germany, March 4—(AP)—The western allies stepped in tonight to halt Polish dumping of homeless refugees in west Germany that might be aimed at upsetting this country's already strained economy.

The high commission of the United States, Britain and France announced it suspected the communist government in Warsaw of double-dealing in an exodus of 125,000 Germans from Poland's postwar western territories, the former German land east of the Oder-Neisse line.

The west German government was ordered "to take all necessary steps to prevent entry into federal (West German) territory of all organized transfers of refugees not included in the categories mentioned" in a letter of November 28.

The letter of November 28 provided that 25,000 with relatives in west Germany would be admitted. A list had been drawn up, to be sure that all the newcomers would have homes and persons to care for them.

"At the last moment, however, the Poles said we would have to negotiate with the (German) east zone communist government so that we got only those with relatives here," a top American official said. "Yesterday the first train (with 889 refugees aboard) arrived unexpectedly. None of those aboard appears to be on our list with relatives in west Germany."

The official said the high commission therefore decided to stop the entry of any refugees not on the prepared allied list. This means that when a second train arrives at the Russian-British border Monday, hundreds may be turned back. East Germany is to absorb 100,000 of the refugees. Labor is in demand there under the communist expansion program.

Rogge Leaves For Moscow

NEW YORK, March 4—(AP)—Former Assistant Attorney General O. John Rogge left by plane today for Moscow where he said he expects to make a world peace appeal before the Soviet parliament.

"I hope to be able to appear before the parliament," he said, "and make proposals on the outlawing of atomic weapons and of all weapons of mass destruction, and on the necessity of a world disarmament program."

Rogge said he is a member of the executive committee of the world congress of the defenders of peace. He said that he planned to meet members of the committee in Paris before leaving for Moscow. A visa to enter Russia is awaiting him in the French capital, he said.

Setiate Honors Barkley On 37 Years in Congress

WASHINGTON, March 4—(AP)—Senators paid tribute today to Vice President Barkley on the 37th anniversary of his coming to congress.

Barkley served as a member of the house from March 4, 1913 until he was elected to the senate 14 years later. He remained in the senate until he took office as vice president last year. He now is the chambers presiding officer.

Anti-Red Bill Approved by Senate Group

WASHINGTON, March 4—(AP)—Legislation cracking down on communist front organizations in this country won approval today of the senate judiciary committee.

By a 12 to 1 vote the committee adopted a bill introduced by Senator Mundt (R-SD) which would:

1. Require the registration of 54,000 card-carrying American communists and officers of communist front organizations. They must report their aliases as well as their real names.

2. Call for the filing of financial reports disclosing sources of income of red organizations and where the money is spent.

3. Compel the communist groups to label material sent through the mails as propaganda and require advance approval when communist views were carried on the radio.

4. Deny communists the right to work for the federal government and deprive them of U.S. passport privileges.

Stiff penalties are provided in the measure — \$2,000 to \$5,000 fine and two years in jail.

The Mundt bill defines communism as a conspiracy to overthrow the government and set up a dictatorship in this country. On that basis it would outlaw such conspiracies.

State Victor in Damage Suit

ALBANY, March 4—(Special)—A \$58,750 suit in inverse condemnation was decided in favor of the defendant Oregon state highway commission Friday in Linn county circuit court.

Judge V. L. Olliver granted the defendants' motion for judgment of involuntary non-suit, holding that plaintiffs had not proved their case.

The suit was brought by Carl and Lola Barclay against members of the highway commission. It alleged that a revetment built by the highway department in 1945, in the South Santiam river just above Sanderson's bridge near Crabtree, had directed water onto the Barclay property and made it useless.

Attorneys were Ray Murray and Clayton Hess of Portland for plaintiffs and Clifton W. Enfield and Samuel A. Hall for defendants.

Mechanical Typesetters Put Out Paper

PASCO, Wash., March 4—(AP)—The Tri-City Herald, using mechanical typesetters, was putting out its Sunday edition tonight without the aid of printers.

About 15 members of the International Typographical union (AFL) walked out last night after a disagreement with Publisher Glenn C. Lee over a new contract.

Indications tonight were that the Sunday paper would be about two hours late in going to press. A newspaper spokesman said no printers had returned to work, contrary to reports heard in Yakima.

The printers are asking \$90 for a 38 1/2 hour week. Lee said his counter-offer was \$85 for a 40-hour week.

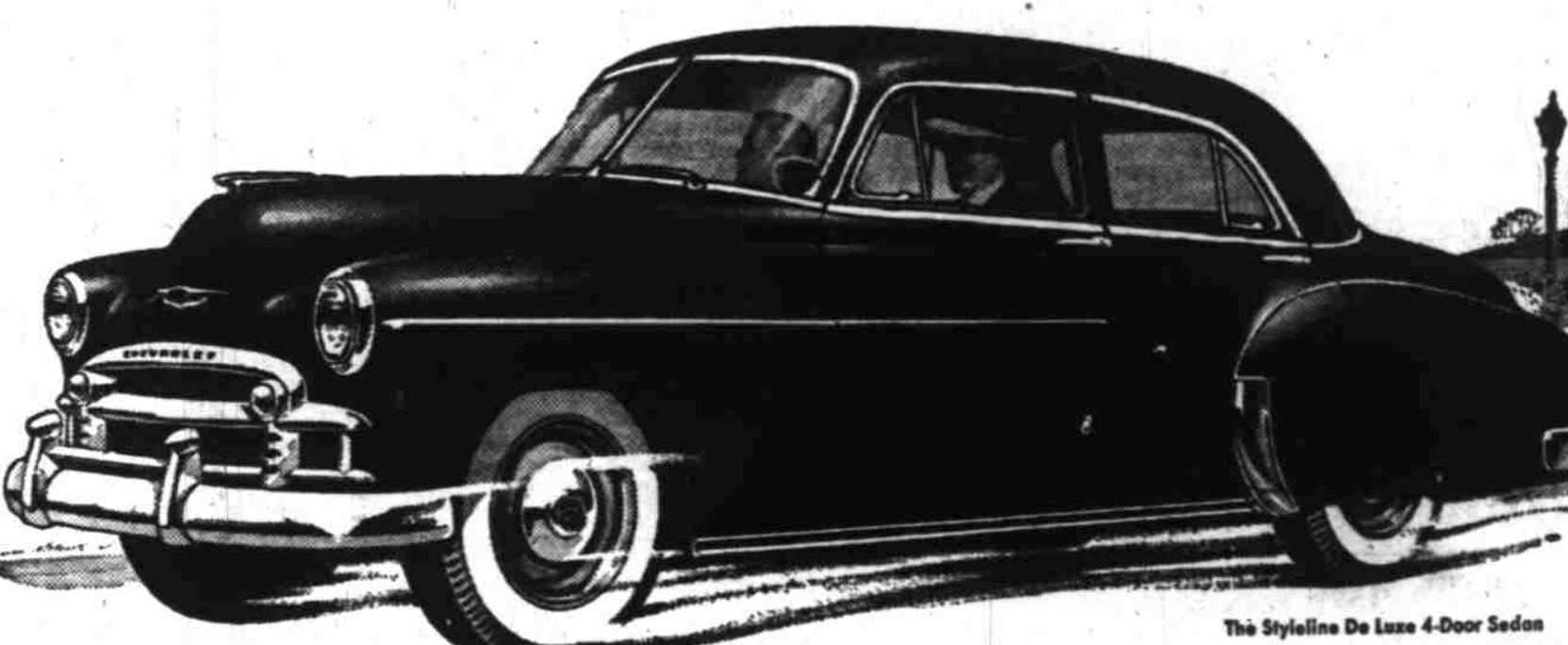
