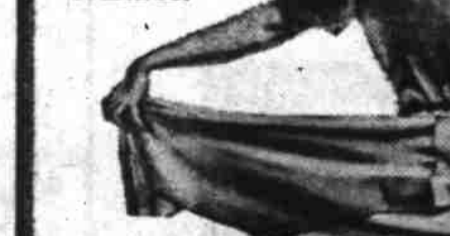

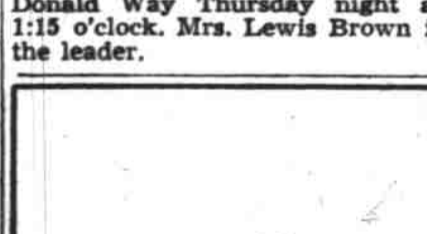

SMALL MIRROR DOES

That too small mirror may do after all, even if it wasn't made to go with the big chest. Give up the idea of centering the mirror over the chest—hung horizontally it's too low as well as too narrow, and hung vertically it falls too far short of the chest width on both sides. Stick to the vertical hanging, but line up one side of the mirror with the side of the chest. Then place a big lamp beside the mirror and the two together add up to enough size to balance the big piece of furniture. Formal balance is always pleasing and it's easier to work out room design when one half of a grouping can be exactly like the other half. But as your decorating skill sharpens you'll try more informal balance like this, to solve problems and to work out a more interesting ideal room.
