Knives Thud to Floor as Police Raid Gambling

PORTLAND, March 12 (AP)—Pocket knives thudded to the floor like drum-beats early today when police raiders of a gambling game identified themselves after entering a dwelling.

City Operatives arrested 12 men and women and reported 5 others escaped during a scuffle with one man.

Police explained the knives were dropped by players trying to avoid arrest on a charge of carrying a concealed weapon. Jolly Malone, 22, failed to step away from a big hunting blade and later admitted its ownership.

Three persons were charged with gambling and 9 were charged with visiting a gambling place at 81 N.E. San Rafael street. Malone was also tried for carrying a concealed weapon and Austin Beidelam, 26, who had tussled with officers, was charged with disorderly conduct. Bail was \$100 on all counts.

Gambling cards, chips, a slot machine, whisky, beer and wine and a handful of pocketknives were seized.

SILVERTON — Mrs. Petra Johnson, 80, died Sunday at her home here, 411 S. Third st.

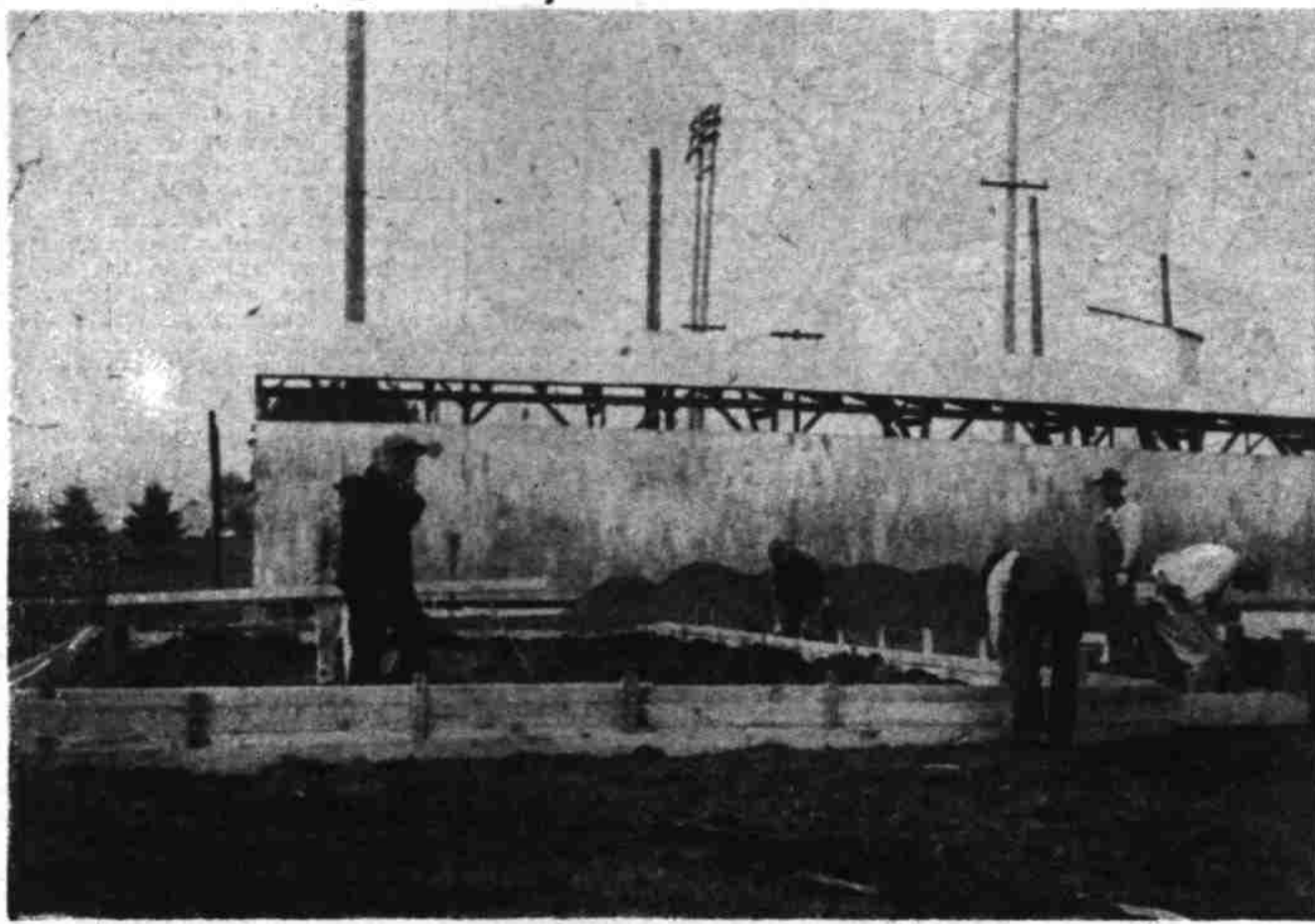
She was born in Norway and had lived in Silvertion many years. Announcement of services will be made later by Ekman funeral chapel.
