Adult Education Gives Opportunity For Women to Learn Crafts, Sewing

Looking at the booklet on adult education as offered by the Salem schools we find that the public is offered a whole lot more chance of becoming educated than "when I was a girl". The fees are low, the classes usually beginning at 7:15 and each instructor an expert in his line.

Take a glance at the courses offered adults at high school conducted mostly out at the high school.

Betty J. Holmes instructs a class in ceramics in room 218 on Wednesdays. There'll be constructing, decorating of figurines, tiles and other pieces.

Marian Buchanan teaches dressmaking in room 102 Monday nights. Tailoring is being taught by Esther Greer also on Monday night in room 101. There is one class now, and a second may be organized if enough wish to join.

Flower arrangement class is being instructed by Mrs. Virgil Sexton on Monday nights in room 218. This class acquaints the pupil in basic principals of flower arrangement and shows the importance of flowers in home beautification. An afternoon class may be arranged if demanded.

Frances Houston, interior decorator, will instruct in home decoration in room 222 Monday nights. This course offers information on room composition, floor treatment, color and so forth.

Leathercraft by J. F. Swigart is taught in Leslie junior high school on Tuesdays. Metal craft instructor is Frank D. Schram, who teaches in room 224 high school on Wednesdays. There is room for several more in this class.

Florence Ragsdale is the instructor in the slip covering class at Old Washington school Thursdays. This class will begin this week, and a limited number will be registered.

Textile painting under Jean M. Guthrie is being given in room 205 Mondays. There's a variety of projects offered here.

The upholstery class on Monday and Wednesday are well patronized. John Schukart is instructor.

Of course there are other courses too, which should interest women, cinematography (home movies) jewelry and gem cutting practical nursing and beginning and advanced woodworking. Sunken Living Room Has Two Levels, Which Presents a Problem in Decor

A sunken living room makes a grand impression, but it also presents a problem in decoration. You usually enter an apartment through a small lobby, and go down a few steps into the dropped room.

The problem is how to make both levels look like one unit, yet make the most of the extra depth of the lower section.

A young couple I visited recently worked out a very good scheme for their foyer and living room, and I am passing it on to my readers as a good example of careful planning. Their upper level foyer must serve as a dinette because the kitchen has no space for a table. The foyer forms a curve from the door of the kitchen, to one side of the living room, around to the hall leading to the bedroom at the

other side. A wide expanse of wall appeared from the kitchen to the front door. This they covered with a scenic wallpaper, giving the impression that you're looking through a large picture window into a tropical scene.

The scene suggested a solution to another problem. That was how to make the wrought iron banister separating the living room and foyer and banking the stairs look like it belonged inside a home. They bought a set of iron and glass chairs and table and selected a tropical leaf pattern for their draperies and sofa cover. The walls of the living room and the foyer outside the scenic portion are a soft green. The living room is done in tones of green with a little red here and there for accent.

The furniture in the living room and in the foyer, aside from the table and chairs, is in a light wood and the carpeting a middle tone between beige and grey. The overall effect is one of charm and livability and it is all most restful.
