Salem; Dallas Open In Wednesday Games

the annual State High School basketball tournament to start which opens Tuesday evening. So were 20 others who will take part in the 32nd classic.

This will be the fourth year the outstanding teams from the 16 districts in the state have invaded the famed "Iglou" to battle for the state championship. In the three previous years Marshfield, Corvallis and Roosevelt of Portland have been the winners and all three of the teams are back this year for another try at the title.

The tournament will be a homecoming for seven of the 16 coaches. Don Maybee of La Grande, Roger Wiley of Bend, Hank Anderson of Grants Pass, Bill Borchert of Marshfield, Hank Kuchera of Eugene, Irwin Elder of Scappoose and Rollie Rourke of Roosevelt of Portland are all graduates of the University of Oregon.

The tournament schedule calls for two games Tuesday evening and six more games Wednesday to complete the first round. Corvallis meets Milwaukie in the opening game and Hillsboro tackles the tough Marshfield club in the second game of the opening double header.

The schedule for Wednesday morning pits Dallas against Jefferson of Portland in the first morning game and Salem meets Scappoose in the second tussle. In the afternoon Seaside and McLoughlin high of Milton-Freewater open the program and Bend is matched with Grants Pass in the second game.

In the evening double-header, La Grande draws the defending champions from Roosevelt in the opener and Eugene meets Central Catholic in the final game of the first round.

The 1950 tournament is the first time that two teams, Seaside and Grants Pass, have ever competed for the state championship. All of the other teams have made at least one trip to the classic.

Final Round In City Loop

Salem's City Basketball leaguers swing forth for their final round of play this week at Leslie, with the American division scheduled for tonight, starting at seven o'clock, and the Nationals on Wednesday night.

The Woollens won both the first and second halves of play in the American division and may tangle with the Nationals champs for the overall title later. 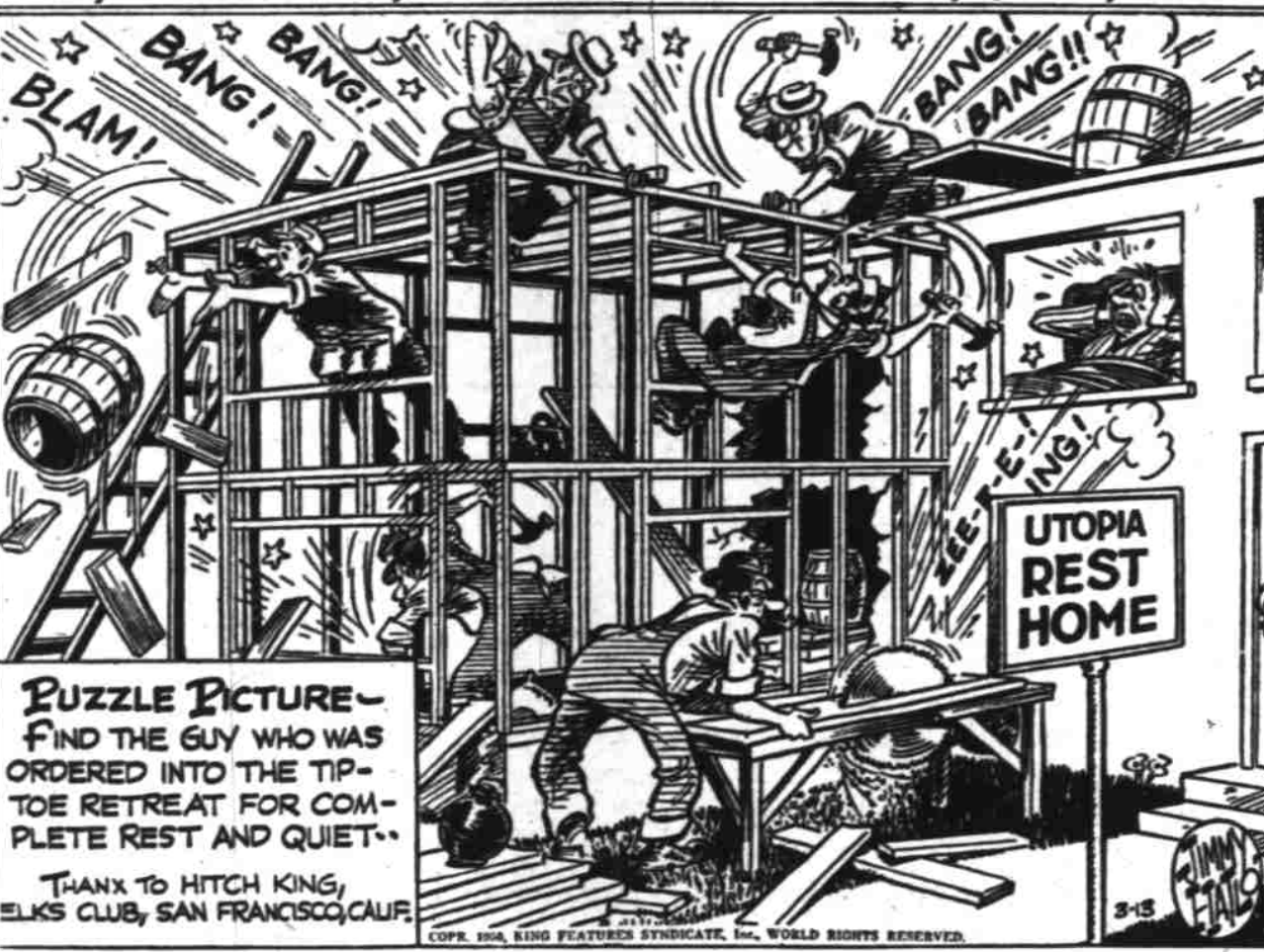

Four Clark teams had a handicap total of 11,373 to the Bearcats 11,270. Willamette held the edge on scratch scores however 8,991 to 8,559.

Individual honors were all Willamette's. Howard Lorenz fashioned a 222 game and a 527 series to grab individual honors. Willamette No. 1 totalled a scratch 2344 for team leadership and Willamette No. 3 led with a 795 high team game.

PGA Sanctions Cavalier Mix

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., March 12 (AP)—The \$10,000 54-hole open of the third annual Cavalier Specialists' Golf tournament today was given official sanction and blessing of the Professional Golfers association, it was announced by George Schneider, PGA tournament bureau director.

It thereby becomes the only 54-hole open golf tournament on the professional circuit to have PGA approval. Schneider pointed out.

The open feature of the Specialists will be run off at the Cavalier Yacht and Country club course at Virginia Beach, with 18-hole play April 22 and 36-hole windup April 23.

The team match, pitting 16 of the nation's top specialists in the shot for which cash is best known, carries a purse of \$500 or \$125 for each winning player.

It also was announced today that half of the team personnel already had been selected. The announcement, coming from Tom C. Utterback of Richmond, Cavalier Specialists' Tournament director and member of the PGA advisory tournament committee, lists the top four drivers and top approaching - and - trouble iron players.

The drivers are Jack Burke, Jr., of White Plains, N. Y.; Ed Furgol, of Royal Oak, Mich.; Chick Harbert, of Detroit, and Clayton Headler, of Charlotte, N. C. The approaching - and - trouble iron players are Dick Metz, of Virginia Beach, Va.; Henry Ransom, of St. Andrews, Ill.; Johnny Palmer, of Badin, N. C., and Jim Turnesa, of Elmford, N. Y.
