Lammers Wins 'Reservist of Month' Title

A Salem navy reservist who hasn't missed a drill in 2 1/2 years and who has helped the local reserve division set at least one district elimination event at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon in Waller hall on the Willamette university campus.

Lammers is a radarman first class who does personnel classification for the local surface division 13-28. His classification records were the first in the district to be completed and are lauded as "in the best shape." This is the first time a selection has been made by the Salem division, and Lammers was a unanimous choice of the officers. He was commended at Thursday night's drill by Lt. Comdr. Coburn L. Grabenhorst, commanding officer. His picture and an article will be in the district's April magazine.

Lammers, who resides at 1825 N. Summer st., is a state highway department employee. Before the war he was an insurance underwriter in Chicago. He came to Salem in 1946, is active in the Veterans of Foreign Wars and a Cub Scout pack leader.

One of the volunteer reservists even before the division was organized here in September, 1947, Lammers has a 100 per cent attendance record. He has cruised every year and spends an extra evening each week in personnel work. He plans to change his rating to that field from radar.

Office Sends Census Blanks To Farmers

Delivery of agricultural questionnaires to farmers, in connection with the 1950 federal census, is in progress.

Salem postoffice notified Census Supervisor Cornelius Bateson of the Salem district headquarters that a supply of the forms has been received and will be distributed direct to every boxholder on rural or star routes and in small towns.

Bateson urged farmers to cooperate with the census by answering the questionnaire so that it is ready for the census enumerator when he calls after April 1. The census takers will ask farmers the standard population questions and check over the agricultural forms when they call.

"Although the agricultural form is a long one, only one-fourth to one-third its questions will apply to the average farmer," said Bateson. Most farm families should be able to complete it in one-half hour, he said.
