

Bill Asks Milk Sales Limited To Milk Pasteurized in Salem

(Story also on page 1.)

A bill to prohibit the sale in Salem of any pasteurized milk which is not pasteurized inside this city has been introduced to the Salem city council.

Alderman Thomas Armstrong said after last night's city council session that he had brought in the bill at the request of Curly's dairy officials. It will come up for final action at the council's April 10 meeting.

The council last night sold a \$66,754 Bancroft bond issue to First National bank of Portland at an average annual interest cost of 1.42 per cent. The total interest cost to the city of \$4,568 over the 10 years was lowest of four bidders, including also U. S. National bank, Blyth & Co., Fordyke & Co. Daylight Saving Bill.

A new bill was brought in to give Salem daylight saving time between April 2 and September 24 this year. It will be up for disposition at the April 10 meeting.

Another bill proposes any new apartment houses must provide off-street parking space — enough to park one car for each apartment unit over two in the building. This proposal by Alderman Fry was apparently aimed at the 120-unit apartment building at South High and Kearney streets where 60 off-street parking spaces were reported to be included in the plans.

Asks Streets Vacated

Attorney Norman Winslow asked the council to vacate 11 streets and alleys for the Salem district school board on school properties. Some opposition was expressed by aldermen, especially at vacation of an alley at the property of the old high school building at High and Marion streets where most of the building is now rented to non-school offices.

Vacation of Raynor street at the end of Leslie junior high's athletic track was approved; bills for the other 10 vacations have not yet been acted upon.

Salem VFW members won a word of praise from the city council for its early, comprehensive request for special concessions during the veterans' convention, coming here this summer. The council approved free parking for cars bearing official delegates' stickers, soliciting for convention program advertising, street decorating and two parades.

Some of these things have been done before without the courtesy of asking the council's permission," one alderman said. The only turnout by the council was a VFW request for six exclusive parking places at the Senator hotel during the convention.

HUBBARD, March 27 — Two men were treated at Woodburn hospital Monday for injuries incurred in an automobile collision about a mile west of Hubbard.

Neither was seriously hurt. The injured were listed as A. W. McKay, St. Paul, driver of a west-bound Nash, and Arthur Colburn, Donald, driver of a southbound 1949 Buick. Both were given first aid by Mrs. E. C. Rose, Hubbard route 1, who resides near the scene of the accident. Mrs. Rose took them to Woodburn hospital where they were released after treatment for head lacerations and shock.

Both cars were heavily damaged in the crash. A three-year-old boy, asleep on the back seat of the Colburn car at the time of the accident, escaped injury.

Butter Price Drops in Salem

Butter was selling for about 71 cents per pound in Salem stores Monday following a recent drop in butter and butter-fat prices.

A four-cent per pound decrease, announced Saturday, brought the buying price of premium butterfat down to 63 cents and 67 cents. Wholesale quotations on grade A butter came to 68 cents under the new price while eggs and poultry prices remained the same Monday.

Boise Man to Head Metropolitan Insurance Office

Clifford E. Thomas is expected to arrive here from Boise, Idaho, this week to become Salem manager for the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co., effective next Monday.

Thomas, who has managed the company's Boise office, will succeed L. V. Clark, who leaves Salem to take over the San Bernardino, Calif., office. Edward Murphy, another Metropolitan representative who has made his home in Salem, will be reassigned to Boise.

Split Revealed In Arab League

CAIRO, Egypt, March 27 — (AP)— Hashemite Jordan brought the long-existing split in the Arab world into the open today by boycotting the Arab league general council.

The league's political committee promptly met in an urgent secret session and retaliated by formally inviting representatives of the Gaza "all-Palestine government" in exile to attend its meetings.

The invitation to the Gaza representatives was a direct slap at the Jordan kingdom. The Hashemite king has incorporated nearly all Arab-occupied Palestine into his realm, though not by formal decree.

The seven-nation Arab league was organized to weld the Arab states of Jordan, Egypt, Syria, Lebanon, Iraq, Saudi Arabia and Yemen into a solid bloc.

Elephant Gets Death Sentence

SARASOTA, Fla., March 27 — (AP)—The circus passed the death sentence today on "Dolly," the elephant that calmly crushed to death five-year-old Edward Schooley.

Henry Ringling North, vice president of Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey circus, said the 27-year-old working elephant would be destroyed before the big show breaks winter quarters Thursday.

A big pit will be dug, "Dolly" will be led into it and given a huge overdose of some narcotic. When she dies, she will be covered over where she falls.

Heavy Damage Toll Left by Midwest Wind

KANSAS CITY, March 27 — (AP)— Violent winds, kicking up dust in the Midwest and reaching tornado proportions in the south, caused at least ten deaths over the weekend and left heavy property and soil damage.

Tornadoes struck at the Little Rock, Ark., area and at Paden, Miss. A small twister also was reported at Ellsinore, Mo.

No one was killed in the tornadoes but dust storms in Kansas, Texas and Nebraska caused eight traffic deaths. Two young brothers, Phillip Bell, 9, and Kenneth, 7, were killed in Kansas City by a tree, blown over during the storm.

The Baptist church at Paden was blown away by a tornado there today and the courthouse was among 12 to 15 buildings badly damaged. Three persons were reported injured at the Midway community, 15 miles from Paden.

As winds diminished in Kansas, wheat growers began sowing the wheat. The crop does not appear to be hurt, as much as first reported, but thousands of acres of rich topsoil was blown away. Topsoil loss was heaviest in Kansas, Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle. High winds also swept New Mexico and Nebraska.

Skies cleared over most of plains states today but wind still continued at some points, whipping up local dust storms.

NAM Officials To Conduct 2-Day Meet

"How to explain the free enterprise system to the public," will be the purpose of a two-day conference here Thursday and Friday, Jack F. Shields, regional manager of the National Association of Manufacturers, told 50 Salem business men here Monday night.

The conference will be conducted by two NAM representatives and is sponsored by the Salem Chamber of Commerce.

About 30 of those present registered for the conference which all Salem business, professional and labor leaders are invited to attend. Hours will be 10 a.m. to noon and 1 to 3 p.m. each day. There is no tuition fee or charge.

Shields said the sessions would provide "reliable information which will equip those attending to answer the critics of free enterprise."

The conference also will take up government spending, foreign aid, the Taft-Hartley law and other items of public interest, Shields stated.

Death Reduces Labor Majority To Three Votes

LONDON, March 27 — (AP)— The labor party's majority in the house of commons was reduced to three today by the death of F. A. Cobb, labor member from Yorkshire.

Cobb's death means a third election must be held to fill seats won by labor candidates in the general election of February 23.

One seat was thrown open by the death of Adam McKintay, the Scot labor member from West Dumbartonshire.

Another vacancy occurred when a labor member resigned to make way for Solicitor General Frank Soskice, who was defeated in the election.

Soskice's nomination for the by-election in the Neepsend division of Sheffield, where the labor member had won by a 19,000 majority, was received at the town hall today. His opponents are conservative-liberal John Philip Hunt and communist E. Leslie Moore. This by-election will be held April 5.

Mrs. FDR, Russians Clash

LAKE SUCCESS, March 27 — (AP)— Soviet delegates verbally attacked Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt twice today and walked out of two more United Nations commissions after failing to oust nationalist China's representatives.

The No. 2 man on the Soviet delegation, Semyon K. Tsarapkin, rushed out of the commission on human rights after a sharp tangle with Mrs. Roosevelt.

Tsarapkin accused Mrs. Roosevelt of carrying on what he said was a United States campaign to use the U. N. for its own political purposes.

A low-ranking Soviet delegate, Nikolai Klimov, delivered in the U. N. transportation and communication commission later in the day a long attack on United States policies toward China.

He accused Mrs. Roosevelt of having made a "demagogic" statement in the human rights body.
