Oven Meals on Today's Program

"Oven Meals" will be the subject of a project leader training meeting conducted by Eleanor Trindle, Marion county home extension agent, at the Portland Gas and Coke company at 10:30 today. Project leaders from sixteen of the county's twenty-eight extension units will be present to receive training on this subject. During April they will give the same demonstration for their own groups.

Miss Trindle will prepare two different oven meals which will both include a meat, a starchy vegetable or cereal, a second vegetable and a dessert. She will discuss the various types of oven meals and give menus to illustrate them. Information will also be given on the successful use of automatic timers for oven meals.
