Need for More Hospital Space Said 'Critical'

Carl Nelson appointed Thursday on the Salem hospital development program funds campaign committee told fellow committee members that the need for additional hospital facilities is "critical."

Nelson, who was retired as a marine aviation colonel in 1947, will serve without pay in spearheading the reactivated drive to bring subscriptions to \$1,100,000 this summer.

He is a graduate of the University of Oregon and joined the marine corps in 1930. During the late war he served in Hawaii, Solomons, Philippines and Okinawa. He was later a special advisor to the state board of aeronautics.

Nelson, who recently completed a study of hospital conditions in Salem, said "I am appalled by the situation, particularly by conditions at Salem General hospital where it has been necessary to place patients in the halls in addition to declining admittance to persons needing hospitalization."

"Even in the midst of warfare," Nelson declared, "the incapacitated at least had a tent over their heads and some privacy, which is better than I have observed in many instances locally."

The Salem hospital development office is located at 375 Center st. Mabel Griebenow is in charge of the office.

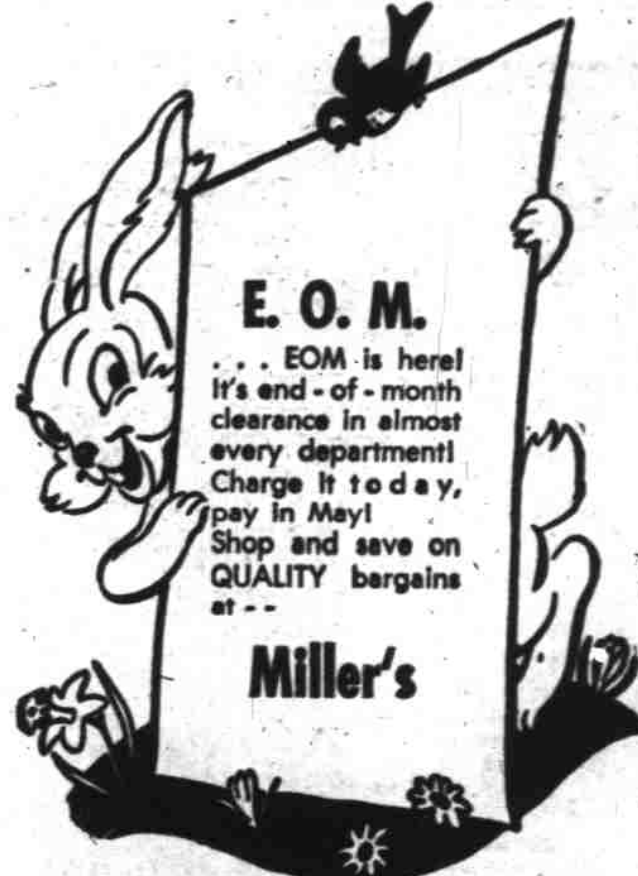
