Mrs. E. F. Arneson Renamed to Nurse Examining Board

City Population Estimated as Over 53,890

The city water department Wednesday "unofficially" entered the current Statesman guessing contest that aims to predict the size of Salem's population as will be shown by the 1950 census.

Water officials estimate the population to be 53,890. The estimate is based on the number of water connections in Salem, 11,227 at the first of the year, multiplied by the average number of persons living at each place where there is a connection.

The water department, however, is not competing for the cash prizes.

Long Range Planning Claimed Investment for Future Growth

Salem requires wise dreaming and planning not only to assure a worthy future but also to catch up with the rapid growth of the past 10 years, City School Superintendent Frank B. Bennett asserted Wednesday.

In a talk before Salem Rotary club he paid tribute to the men who stood in the wilderness and decided Salem's location and then culture.

The superintendent said his only criticism of the past planners was that "the confines of their dream were too narrow"—failure to extend the wide and straight streets farther has meant costly changes in order to obtain arterial streets, parks and other improvements essential to modern living.

The same danger exists today, he added, that "we set our sights too low," because the next 10 years will determine the course of the next century in Salem more than any other period.

Bennett pictured the capital city of today as in transition from village to city, having outgrown its water and sewerage systems, its schools and its park facilities. The Chamber of Commerce's long range plan and advertising was credited with bringing many of the newcomers to this area.

He declared public officials "would not be worth their pay if they did not plan and dream wisely for the future and would be derelict in their duty if they did not tell the truth to the public."

Implementing such plans will cost money, he reminded, but "as an investment that will pay dividends, rather than as a philanthropy." He added that "we can have the type of development that will attract people who appreciate the beauty and the culture and will remain to help develop them."

Bennett typified the Salem area's problems by outlining the local school district's situation.

He said birth rate and immigration had combined to practically triple the district's school-age population. The pupils now in senior high school, he pointed out, were born in the mid-1930s when Oregon's birth rate was below even the low national average.

By 1947, he said, Oregon's rate had more than doubled and had exceeded the national average. After declining somewhat in 1948-49, the rate in Marion county jumped for the first months of 1950.

Hollenberg Retires After 30 Years in Highway Service

Roy V. Hollenberg, traffic manager and accountant for the state highway commission in Salem, retired this week after over 30 years of continuous service, it was announced Wednesday by R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer.

Hollenberg began his employment as a clerk in 1919, and has been advanced to payroll clerk, bookkeeper, and finally to the position of traffic manager in 1935.

Hollenberg received his business education in Chillicothe, Mo., before coming to Oregon.

Abney Granted Continuance; Bail Posted

Preliminary hearing for Dean Abney, middleweight boxer from Jefferson charged with helping two Aumsville youths dispose of loot from a robbery, Wednesday was set for April 13.

Abney appeared in Marion county district court. The two Aumsville youths, Donald William Erickson and George Wright, both 18, also were granted a week's continuance in their case.

Wright and Erickson are charged with burglary of \$200 in rolled nickels from the Aumsville tavern and coffee shop March 22. Abney, formally charged with receiving and concealing stolen goods, has admitted in a signed statement that he helped dispose of the nickels.

All three defendants are now free on bail, set at \$1,000 each for Wright and Erickson and \$750 for Abney.

Catholic Center Opening Set For April 14

Official opening of the Salem Catholic center on North Cottage and Shipping streets, will take place April 14 to 16 during a mardi gras program.

The new building, now completed, is of reinforced concrete and measures 110 by 62 feet. It will be used as an activity center for both Catholic parishes in Salem, for Catholic lay groups and for public rentals. It will serve as a permanent home for the Knights of Columbus, who sparked the fund drive for the building.

Also using the building for meeting purposes will be the Catholic Daughters of America, Junior Daughters, Order of Foresters and Boy Scouts and other organizations.

The mardi gras and bazaar, open to the public, will be held from 6 p.m. to midnight on April 14 and 15, with a clam chowder dinner served Friday night and a spaghetti dinner on Saturday night.

A Knights of Columbus initiation will take place Sunday afternoon in the new hall followed by a banquet that night. A breakfast for candidates and members will be held Sunday morning followed by a dedication ceremony for the building.

Richard Schmidt is program chairman assisted by Roy Marker. Dr. Kenneth McNiece is chairman of the Sunday night banquet. General chairman of the mardi gras is Don Doerfler, grand knight of the local council.
