So They Say

Foreign Terms for Cooking Designate Mode of Cooking or Ingredients Used

Foreign terms in cooking have come to frequent use in the United States and the woman who cooks, or the person who eats out may find a knowledge of the more common terms handy.

The use of a foreign word either before or after the designated food, usually implies an accompaniment or form of serving. Here are some, such prefixes or suffixes:

Alexandria—means with asparagus.

Au Gratin—with browned crumbs (not with cheese as many think).

Aux fraises—with strawberries.

Au jus—with own juice or gravy.

Au naturel—in its own form, or natural.

A la—in the mode or style.

A la creole—as the creoles do, with tomatoes and green peppers.

Blanquette—meat in a rich cream sauce.

Bechamel—with Bechamel, a rich cream sauce.

Bisque—a cream soup, it also means ice cream served with chopped nuts.

Bonne bouche—a mouthful or bite. Usually, though not always, a rich candy-like frosting.

Bouchée or en bouchée—usually refers to small pastry shells size for one bite.

Bouillabaisse—bill of fare.

Compot—fruit stewed in syrup.

Café noir—black coffee.

Café au lait—coffee served with hot milk.

Coated with a sauce stiffened with just enough gelatine to keep it from running.

Conde—with cereals, usually rice.

Demi tasse—small coffee cup, or the coffee served in the cup.

En bouchée—on skewers.

Espagnole—Spanish, with tomatoes, olives, pimientos.

Florentine—with spinach.

Farce—stuffed.

Fricassee—small pieces of meat stewed in gravy.

Fermière—braised with sliced vegetables.

Filets—tenderloins of meat, or boneless fish.

Glacé—iced or glazed.

Garni—garnished, sometimes with other than edible objects.

Jardiniere—cut in strips.

Jardiniere—mixed with vegetables.

Lyonnaise—as served in Lyons, with onions.

Maitre d hotel—usually with parsley.

Mignon or Mignonne—small portion, usually tenderloin.

Petits fours—literary "little ovens," but freely translated as little pastries that come from the oven.

Provençal—dishes containing oil or garlic, sometimes both.

Princess—with rice.

Pollannaise—with browned breadcrumbs, buttered.

Rissoles—minced meat fritters, made with pastry, fried or baked.

Ragout—stew. Meat simmered with vegetables and highly seasoned.

Roulade—boneless meat, rolled and tied, braised or roasted.

Rechauffe—warmed over.

Soubise—with onions.

DALLAS — A tomb of early Polk county pioneers was broken into by vandals last week for the third time within the past four or five years. It is thought the vandals in search of valuables rumored to be buried with the early settlers.

After the entry was discovered the remains of William C. and Martha J. Brown were placed in graves beside the tomb. The action was taken by W. H. Brown of Dallas, George C. Brown of Yakima, grandsons, and other relatives.

The pioneers had lived in Dallas more than 50 years, where William C. operated a general store. He died in 1909—his wife, ten years earlier.

New Dallas Grade School Near Complete

DALLAS, April 4 — Construction of the new Lyle elementary school at Levens st. and Ellendale road will be completed July 1, according to S. E. Whitworth, city school superintendent.

The new unit is scheduled for use next fall, sharing the load now carried at the elementary and junior high schools on Main street. Space will still be at a premium, however, as the school population increased considerably during the past year.

Equipment for the \$250,000, eight - unit school has been ordered for July delivery, it was announced. Rooms have been provided for the first five grades with all phases meeting the standards of the state department of education.

Exterior work is nearing completion by Barham Bros., Salem contractor, and inside finish work is now under way. Heating equipment and the rough wiring have been installed.
