Production of Lambs Higher Than Last Year

For the first time in nine years, the early lamb production has been higher than it was in the previous year. The increase is estimated at about two per cent at the present time.

Except in California and the western parts of Oregon and Washington, weather and feed conditions for the early lambing areas were very favorable. Early lambs in Idaho have made good progress. Eastern Oregon and Washington conditions too were rather bad for early lambs during January and early February. Losses, however, appear to be lighter this year, and lambs in these areas are reported as "picking up rapidly." Lambs in the Willamette valley, in spite of a cold start, are reported also as "being very good" now.

Since the middle of February lamb and sheep prices at Portland and other coast markets have continued strong. Portland lamb prices, ranging around \$21 and \$21.50 in January and fore part of February, were \$1.50 higher a month later. During the past month they have raised another \$1.50 with the Easter market closing at around \$25.50.

Prices Advance
Slaughter ewes and medium lambs advanced even more rapidly, increasing about 50 cents more a hundredweight than did the choice lambs, until mid-March. The week of March 17, the medium grades were around \$21 and \$21.50, with top slaughter ewes making \$11.50 to \$12.50. The rise in price for ewes have been a bit slower since, but reached \$22 and \$22.50 this week for medium grade, and \$12.50 to \$13 for top slaughter ewes.

ket, still high for the most, advanced from \$27 in mid-March to \$28.75 for Easter week.

May Go to Market

The increase reported in number spring lambs may—or may not—change the picture of declining sheep numbers prevalent in recent years. Should prices hold good, the additional lambs may all go for market sheep this spring.

The number of stock sheep on hand in early 1950 was 27,064,000, or two per cent below the number on hand a year ago. However, although in 1939, the number of stock sheep declined for the eighth consecutive year, this two per cent decline was the smallest since the decline started in 1942 indicating that the liquidation in the sheep industry may be coming to an end.

As it stands now, the sheep population is 45 per cent below the recent peak of 49,346,000 head of just eight years ago—1942, and is the lowest of any of the 83 years in which sheep records have been kept.

Norblad Asks Federal Study Of Auto Laws

U. S. Rep. Walter Norblad, 1st Oregon district, Thursday introduced in the house a bill authorizing and directing the president to appoint a commission to study the differences between state laws pertaining to the operation and control of motor vehicles, he advised state officials here.

Norblad said he wanted to determine the effects of such differences upon the safety of the people and the best available means by which to make these laws uniform.

"This problem of uniform motor vehicle laws," Norblad said, "is of vital importance to the safety of the people." Norblad's bill provides for a commission of five members, to be appointed by the president, who would study the problem and report back to congress and the president by Jan. 1, 1951.

EUGENE, April 6—(AP)—An Oakridge mill hand today pleaded innocent to a charge of second degree murder in connection with the fatal shooting of Clyde Dubell, Oakridge police chief, March 19. Circuit Judge G. F. Skipworth set the trial for James Lloyd Thompson, 24, for May 8.

Bradley Drive Improvement Strikes Snag

A hearing this morning will decide the outcome of recent petitions to improve Bradley drive—but Marion county court members were doubtful Thursday of the outcome.

Bradley drive lies south of Salem between Liberty road and the Pacific highway. Residents there recently had petitioned the court to pave the street with the cost to be assessed to adjacent property owners.

The court reported Thursday, however, it had discovered that two lots along the street had been set aside for public park purposes and so could not be assessed. Unless residents along the street can find some way of financing costs which would normally be assessed against the park frontage, the bids probably will be dropped.

Bids will be up for acceptance at 10:15 o'clock this morning.

The court Thursday set June 10 at 10:15 a.m. as a hearing time on petitions seeking improvement of Shady lane north of Salem. Costs are estimated at \$9,458 or \$163 per ownership foot along the street.

Shady lane was recently included in a petition involving several other nearby streets, which were dropped when estimated expenses appeared too high.
