Police Catch 2 Boys Missing At Woodburn

Two of four boys who escaped Thursday night from Woodburn Boys school were picked up by state police Friday afternoon in a stolen car at Arlington in eastern Oregon.

State police said the pair, Orville Hansen, 14, and Wayne Batdorf, 15, stole two cars along their escape route. They took a car owned by Martin Albers at Aurora Thursday night abandoned this auto at The Dalles Friday morning and continued east for about 50 miles in a second stolen vehicle to Arlington where they were stopped.

Superintendent James Lamb of Woodburn said the boys probably would be returned today to the school.

The other two escapees, Wildon Boyer and John Wilson, both 14, were believed to be in the Newberg area. They were still at large Friday night.

About 80 Woodburn boys are away from the school with official sanction to visit their homes for Easter.

Lamb said about 90 boys were granted a Christmas holiday on the honor system and that every one of them returned to the school.
