

Locals Drop 5-4, 2-1 Tilts

Failure to Collect Hits Hurts WU's

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, April 7.—(Special)—University of Oregon's Webfoot baseballers, aided by some effective hurling, swept both ends of a doubleheader with Willamette's Bearcats today by 5-4 and 2-1 scores.

The Bearcats managed by four blows in each seven-inning game but, at that, weren't much worse than the Ducks in the hitting department. Coach Don Kirsch's crew collected eight in the opener off Frank Gatchell, Howie Olson and Mike Glenn, but gathered only three in the nightcap which saw Larry O'Dell, Bob White and Larry Stocks doing the Willamette pitching.

The Bearcats broke the scoring ice in the initial tilt with a tally in the first frame as Catcher Andy Harrington straightened out a DeWayne Johnson offering for a double and subsequently scored as Dave Perlman was safe on an Oregon miscue. The Ducks came back with three in the second at the expense of Gatchell, the burst coming on four bunched singles and a fielder's choice.

In the fourth the Oreons wrapped up the ball game with a brace of runs manufactured mainly on an error, Johnson's single and Darrell Nelson's two-base wallop off Olson. This flurry left Olson charged with the loss.

Four consecutive walks issued by Johnson forced in Perlman with another WU tally in the fifth and the "Cat" closed out with a pair in the sixth off a single by John Skimas, a couple of free passes and a fielder's choice.

Willamette registered first in the tight second game, Ray Osuna singling off Joe Elkins in the second frame to score Bud Killinger who had walked.

The Webfoots punched for both their runs in the fourth off Bob White, after being held scoreless by O'Dell in the initial three frames. The Duck tallies were manufactured by Phil Settecase's single which scored Duane Owens and Darrell Nelson.

"Cut hurler Larry Stocks blanked the Webfoots through the 5th and 6th.

Winning 13 of the 14 events, Vern Gilmore's Salem high track gang racked up their second straight dual meet victory of the season Friday by steamrolling the Newberg 98-24, on the Olinger lot. The Salem Jayvees and Stayton Packers duelled in conjunction with the varsity meet, the Packers emerging with an easy 86½ to 35½ win.

None of the times were outstanding in the Vik-Newberg competition.

Bruce Mathis and Harold Gohsen were top point gatherers for the Gilmore squad as each emerged with a pair of wins. Mathis topped the two hurdle events, duplicating his performance against Albany, and Gohsen notched first in the javelin and pole vault. Don McKenzie took the century in a slow 10.8 time and Buzz Covall captured the 440 but was off his opening 52.4 mark against Albany as he ran the event in 53.1.

Dick Adams of Salem took the mile in 4:41. Layton Gilson won the shotput and finished second in the javelin. The 220 went to Dwight Rankin, Jack Kleinsmith nabbed the discus, Burt Harp leaped 18 feet, 9 inches to take the broad jump and Larry Paulus and Merlin Schulze tied for first in the high jump with 5' 6" marks.

Howell Said Near End of Idaho Road

SPOKANE, April 7.—(AP)—The people cornered had "no comment" tonight on a published report that Football Coach Dixie Howell may be close to a parting of the ways with the University of Idaho.

Herb Ashlock, sports editor of the Spokane Chronicle, wrote in his column today that after the 1949 season Howell played his own way to the national coaches meeting in New York and "did a little shopping on his own."

Howell is under contract to coach the Vandals this fall. The contract expires in December.

Ashlock said "the root of the trouble, I suppose, can be traced in part to the Vandals' football record" (won 3, lost 5 in 1949).

He said Howell was also "somewhat irritated" when Idaho canceled two scheduled football games with California schools in order to play teams closer to home.

J. A. Buchanan, president of the university, said he had no comment on the story. So did Athletic Director George Greene. Howell said the same thing but he used a few more words.

"I have no comment to make. Comment should come from other sources at the university. I am in no position to speak," Dixie said.

Howell, who was a star halfback in his college days at Alabama in the mid 1930s came to Idaho three years ago.
