

First to Win Three Times

Ferrier Fades in Final; Takes 2nd

AUGUSTA, Ga., April 9 (AP)—Jimmy Demaret won his third, and record-breaking Masters Golf tournament today after Jim Ferrier had the title in his grasp and threw it away.

Playing golf as sensationally as his Easter gamb, Jimmy shot the final round in 69 strokes, three under par, for a 72-hole total of 283.

Ferrier, who started the day with a two-stroke lead over the field and four over Demaret, lost it all on the last six holes.

Two under par at that stage, he went over on five of the next six to finish two strokes behind the new champion with 285.

That made Demaret the first golfer ever to win the Masters three times. He took the title with a 280 score in 1940 and repeated with 281 in 1947. Only two others, Horton Smith and Byron Nelson, have won twice.

Ben Hogan, regarded as Ferrier's most serious challenger when the final round began, couldn't hold the pace, finishing with a 76 for 288, even par figures for the four rounds.

Par for the testing 6,900 yard Augusta National course is 36-46-72.

Comparatively few of the crowd of 18,000, largest ever to watch the Masters, saw Demaret score his triumph. But they were all on hand when Ferrier lost.

Sam Snead, last year's winner, took third place with a last-round 72 for 287. Nelson, who had a 74 today, tied Hogan for fourth place. Nobody else in the selected field was even close to the winner.

Lloyd Mangrum of Chicago came in with a 68 on the final round to place sixth at 291 and Open Champion Cary Middlecoff of Ormond Beach, Fla., and Clayton Heafner of Charlotte, N. C., had 292's.

Undisturbed by the crowd, Demaret played the steadiest golf of the tournament to win. He had rounds of 70, 72, 73 and 69, which included eleven three-putt greens. But Jimmy was long and straight off the tee, an important factor on this big, rolling course.

He was under par four times in a row on the 460-yard 13th hole, one of the longest on the course, and twice scored eagles there.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., April 9 (AP)—The St. Louis Browns defeated the San Antonio Missions 8 to 2 in an exhibition game today to sweep the three-game series between the two clubs.

Ed Schacht and Eddie Albrecht batted for the Browns, hitting their first home runs since they left the Browns club to seven hits—six of them by Schacht.

Billy Demars paced the Browns' attack with a double and two singles. The Browns had 12 hits altogether.

Schacht hit a home run for St. Louis while Bobby Estelle cracked a four-bagger for the Missions.

ORLANDO, Fla., April 9 (AP)—Washington splattered the pitching of Hank Wynn under Hooper and Carl Gehlbach for 16 hits, including eight doubles, a triple and a home run, to send the Philadelphia Athletics, 11-4, in an exhibition game today.

Ten Senators battered Wynn for six runs in the first inning as Third Baseman Bob Dillinger contributed two of his three errors. They picked up five runs off Hooper in the next three innings, then smashed Gehlbach for six runs in four innings, with Clyde Vol-

21 National Titles Six Women Golfers Enter Hall of Fame

AUGUSTA, Ga., April 9 (AP)—Six of America's greatest women golfers have been selected for the Ladies P.G.A. Hall of Fame.

Together, the great stars of yester-years won 21 national amateur championships and some of their records likely never will be approached.

Charter members of the Hall of Fame are:

Beatrice Hoyt of New York, Margaret Curtis of Boston; Alexa Stirling, a native of Atlanta, Ga., the late Dorothy Campbell, Hurd of Scotland who came to Pittsburgh from Scotland, Glenna Collett Vare of Philadelphia, and Virginia Van Wie of Chicago.

Original plans called for the naming of two active golfers. However, the committee decided that retired links stars should be honored first. Two additional golfers will be named annually.

Beatrice Hoyt was the first winner of the National Amateur championship held at match play in 1896. She repeated in 1897 and 1898.

Miss Margaret Curtis won three national amateurs in 1907, 1911 and 1912.

Alexa Stirling won the amateur three times in succession and was runner up her fourth try. Her victories came in 1916, 1919 and 1920. No amateurs were held during the first World War.

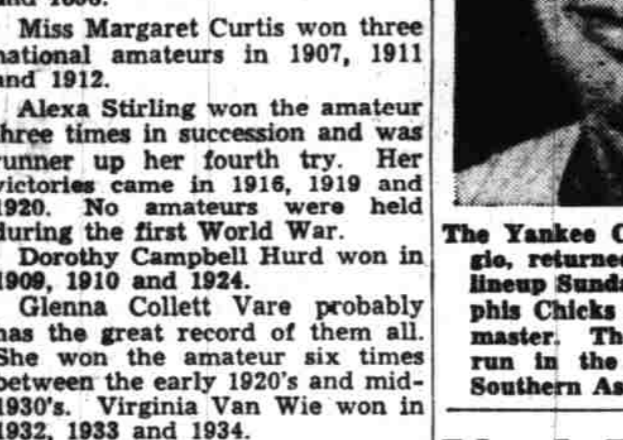
Six Complete 72-Hole Play

Harv Quistad with a net 282 led the list of qualifiers already turning in completed scores. He was followed by Burrell with 283, Leo Estey with 293 and Lawrence Alley with 295. Putnam and Parker had also finished the 72 holes of play.

Quistad also paced the field in low gross with a respectable 302. He plays with five handicaps for the tourney. Right behind again was Burrell with 303 on the same handicap.

Don Hendrie, the 10-handicap linksman who blistered the course with a 63 in his first round, still clung to the low honors with that count. Carding gross 10's were Carson, Needham and Sheldon.

The ball, hit by Wes Westrum, New York catcher, fell safely for a two-base hit.

Trainer Wally Bock of the Indians said Easter would be out for the duration of the exhibition season and might not be ready for the club's opening game of the season on April 18.
