

Special Group In Senate to Probe Crime

WASHINGTON, April 11—(P)—The senate democratic leadership decided today to take the investigation of crime away from rival regular committees and give it to a specially picked group.

Separate inquiries had been proposed by the judiciary and commerce committees, and the conflict was near the stage of open fighting.

The decision of the senate democratic policy committee came less than three hours after an announcement that the commerce group planned to call city mayors for testimony on interstate transmission of gambling information.

The decision brought angry rumblings from a number of republicans. Senator Ferguson, Michigan republican who won attention some years ago investigating crime in his home state, said:

"I said yesterday that I'd been seared out of this investigation and today I have been."

Ferguson is a member of the judiciary committee, but does not expect to be picked for the special committee. He has said that if he had a part in the inquiry he would want to look into the Kansas City crime situation, and also into the situation in his own city of Detroit.

Senator Wherry of Nebraska, republican leader, asked reporters: "Is this to be an investigation or is it to cover up?"

Senator Kefauver (D-Tenn.) who has introduced a crime inquiry resolution and is expected to be chairman of the special committee, said a thorough investigation would be made.

"We don't want any stones unturned or any holds barred," he told newsmen.

He said he expects the committee to visit several cities to investigate crime first hand. Asked if these would include Kansas City in the president's home state, Kefauver said:

"As far as I am concerned, there is no going to be any shying away from Kansas City."

Columbia Basin Floods Seen in Month of May

PORTLAND, April 11—(P)—Warnings of floods along the Columbia river next month went out today.

The upper tributaries, around Bonanza Ferry on the Kootenai river, above Flathead lake on the Flathead river, and near St. Maries on the St. Joe river, got special warnings.

High water also was forecast for the lower Columbia—where damage was extensive two years ago. Little damage is expected this time there.

The warnings came from the Portland weather bureau's river forecast center, which said the only thing that would prevent damaging floods in the upper tributaries would be warm weather in April and early May.

That would increase the early snow run-off, lessening the danger of a high peak in late May. Heavier than normal snow packs cover all the inland mountains. From Canada, through eastern Washington, Idaho, and eastern Oregon, it all drains into the Columbia river and must pass between Vancouver, Wash., and Portland, en route to sea.

That will push the river to peaks of 23 to 24 feet here. Flood stage is 18 feet at Portland, 15 feet at Vancouver. Damage is expected to be slight, though, for the land principally affected is low-lying pastures. Some waterfront storage facilities also will be flooded, but supplies will be carted away in advance.

Bridges to Hold Citizenship at Least Month

SAN FRANCISCO, April 11—(P)—Harry Bridges will keep his American citizenship for a month at least.

The federal court today overruled a move by the government to strip the CIO longshore union president of citizenship at once. Bridges, 48, Australia-born, was sentenced yesterday to five years in prison. He was convicted last week of perjury and conspiracy—accused of winning naturalization in 1945 by fraud in denying he was a communist.

If the conviction is upheld on appeal, revocation of citizenship and deportation is possible. However, there is a possibility Bridges may become a "stateless person." He renounced Australian citizenship to become an American.

After government attorneys and the defense had debated the question of immediate revocation of citizenship, Federal Judge George B. Harris said today he would give the lawyers time to submit formal briefs, upon which he would rule at leisure.

He said it was possible, inasmuch as neither side cited legal authorities, that Bridges "might be caught between the grinding forces of the law" in this case.

Judge Harris told the government he has two weeks to file briefs, and the defense had ten days to answer these written arguments.

The judge noted that he had preserved the rights of the defendants by arranging bail "in the twilight zone of proceedings."

Bridges is free on \$25,000 bond, upped yesterday from \$5,000. The two other longshore union officers convicted with him and each sentenced to two years in prison, are on \$10,000 bond each. Their bail during trial, had been \$5,000.

The two, Henry Schmidt, and J. R. Robertson, were Bridges' citizenship witnesses. They were convicted of conspiracy.

The conviction of the three will be carried on appeal up to the U. S. supreme court if necessary.

State to Probe Earth Slides In Astoria Area

ASTORIA, Ore., April 11—(P)—The state geological expert was en route here today to see what can be done about a slipping hillside that has wrecked or damaged 21 homes.

The city council appealed to Gov. Douglas McKay after city engineer G. T. McClean said residents had lost confidence in local officials. The governor ordered Lewis Scott, highway department geologist, to come here to inspect Coxcomb hill.

But the council voted confidence in McClean and Public Works Supt. H. M. McCallister.

The Irving avenue hill started slipping in late January in the wake of heavy winter rains. Overnight it wrenched out house three feet from its foundation, leaving the fireplace chimney standing alone. It twisted others until they buckled.

Movers were called in to take threatened homes to safer sites. Six at the top of the hill were saved, as were four at the bottom.

The Lawrence Jackson home, which once fronted on Irving avenue, is now near Grand avenue. One hundred fifty feet from its foundation, it is riding the top of the slide and salvage experts think that if it continues to hold together, they can put it on skids and save it for another location.

Over the week-end the hillside moved 29.2 feet. This morning its 24-hour progress was 9.1 feet. A new threat is developing: the slide shows signs of spreading eastward. Part of a cliff north of Irving avenue moved down 6 to 10 feet, leaving a break 100 feet long. Four houses are considered in greatest danger from it.

Drainage efforts have failed to make any impression on the hillside's movement, and McClean said he thought last April's earthquake may have caused the trouble that the rains revealed. He said test holes showed broken-up shale to a considerable depth at the foot of the slide. This area was shaken more heavily than any other in Oregon by the quake, whose greatest severity was felt in western Washington.
