#### **Drainage Ditch Complete Along Stayton Street** Statesman News Service

STAYTON - A variety of power tools were used in Stayton this week by the Salem Sand and Gravel company to install a new storm sewer on the east side of Third street from Florence street to the Salem ditch.

Ten-inch concrete culvert pipe was used for the main line. Six inlet boxes will be located along both sides of Third street along the line. Installation of gratings was underway Friday and it was believed the job would be com-pleted entirely by the first of the week when the paving is done over the excavated area.

The big puddles of water and ace on Third street which caused shoppers no end of annoyance last winter will be drained by the new system. Cost of the job will be \$1525. Half of the cost of the new drain will be paid by property owners on the east side of the street.




