Bates Backed For Jersey Club Position

QUINCY, April 16 — Floyd Bates, Salem, president of the Marion County Jersey Cattle club, today received his third endorsement in five days for western director of the American Jersey Cattle club, Marion County at its Sunday meeting here went on record favoring him for the position.

Wednesday at a meeting at Salem, he was endorsed for the position by the directors of the Oregon Jersey Cattle club, and Saturday night at Vancouver, he received the endorsement by the Washington State Jersey Cattle club.

Completes Term
Should Bates be elected, he will succeed Peter Henning of Arlington, Wash., who this year completes his term of office as western director.

Leonard Lee, vice president of the Marion County club, presided while the motion was put favoring Bates. Neal Miller, Woodburn, who heads the promotion for Bates, briefly outlined the work Bates had been doing for the Jersey breed of cattle.

Plans were also made at the Sunday meeting for the annual Marion County Spring Jersey show to be held at Salem May 22. This will be the second of the Jersey Jubilee Week shows held in Oregon. The string opens at Albany with Linn-Benton Jersey Cattle club holding its show.

All cattle, before being displayed at the Marion county event, will be tested for both tuberculosis and Bangs disease, and only disease-free cattle will be permitted to enter. Bates pointed out, is only a precaution, as very few diseased cattle have been found in Marion county in recent years.

Leth to Judge Show
Walter Leth, Monmouth, will judge the Marion county show. The local club will go along with the state in competition for the trophy offered every year for the best show. This provides for the local club paying its share of the expenses of the three judges, W. A. Savage of Canada, Jens Svith of Grants Pass and Calvin Monroe of the state 4-H club offices, who will visit all of the shows to pick the winner for the Hulbert trophy.

Because of the regular meeting day falling the day prior to the county show, the club voted to skip this meeting again in June.

Markets for Wood Products In Change

SILVERTOWN — Market for woodland products is changing, Charles Ladd, farm forester with the state department of forestry, told members of the Silver Creek Soil conservation district, at the week's meeting.

Shortage of commercial timbers throughout the United States was given as the reason for the change. Special forest products such as maple lumber, alder lumber, yew fence posts, car stakes, cascara bark and sword fern were gaining rapidly in demand. Ladd explained that the farm foresters are available to help interest farmers in the district.

Phil Brogan, also with the forestry service, explained the forest fee and yield tax law. Farmers with tracts of land 40 acres in size or larger may apply for classification of this land under this law, Brogan said.

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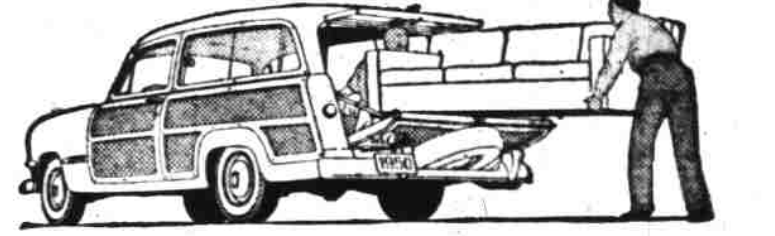
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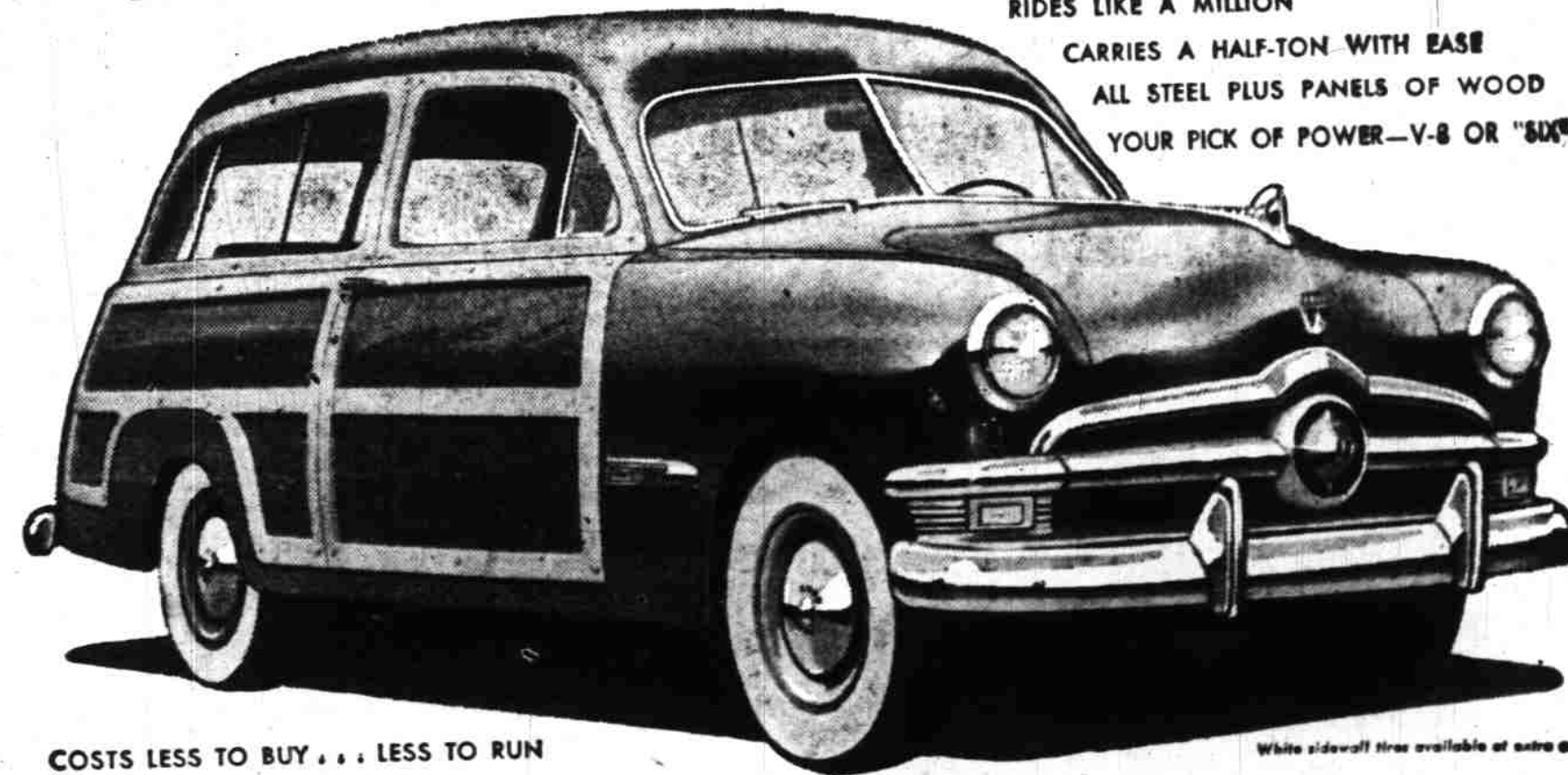
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
