School District Consolidation Election Slated

A school consolidation election was scheduled and two district boundary changes denied Monday by Marion county district boundary board.

Balloting was set for May 22 in the districts of Mehama, Stayton, Oak, Glen, Howell and Fern Ridge in Marion county and Cole, Mt. Pleasant and Queener in Linn county, on the proposed consolidation into Stayton elementary school district.

As a result of hearings March 17, the board denied transfers of property from Lake Labish to Brooks and from Pioneer to Gerwald districts.

Unemployment Commission in New Building

Moving the state unemployment compensation commission--largest state activity in the Salem district--into the new Public Service building was near completion Monday night. Some records and furniture remained to be moved Tuesday.

The state industrial accident commission is scheduled to commence its move to the new structure Wednesday, with the public utilities commission to follow.

Other state activities to be housed in the five-story, \$2,000,000 office building are the state board of control, state civil service commission, state police headquarters and one or two other smaller state units.

Board of Control Meet Delayed Until Thursday

Meeting of the state board of control, slated for today has been postponed until Thursday due to the absence of Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry, a member of the board.

Board officials said a number of matters are slated for consideration, including the new tuberculosis ward at Oregon state hospital.

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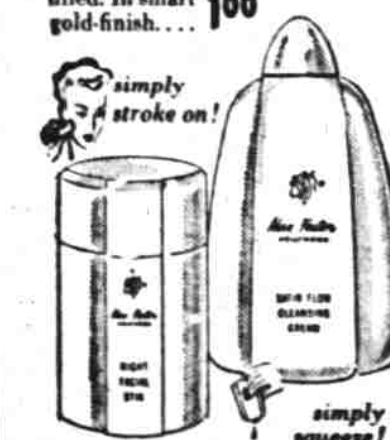
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
