## Senator Asks Subpoenas for Former Agents

WASHINGTON, April 18—(AP)—Senator McCarthy today asked subpoenas for two former FBI agents to bolster his "stand or fall" case alleging that Owen Lattimore is Russia's No. 1 spy in the United States.

A Senate subcommittee investigating McCarthy's charges of red influence in the state department is scheduled to hear on Thursday another witness suggested by the senator. He is Louis F. Budenz, former communist leader, who is to be asked what he knows of Lattimore.

Lattimore has angrily denied all of McCarthy's charges and called him a liar.

In other key developments:

1. Senator O'Connor (D-Md.) criticized Lattimore's recent suggestion that the United States help clear the way for the Chinese communists to join the United Nations. Lattimore made this suggestion last Saturday in a speech before the American Academy of Political and Social Sciences in Philadelphia.

O'Connor said it would be a "grave mistake" for the United States to follow Lattimore's advice because it would be giving "aid and comfort to communism" and "Moscow would rejoice."

2. In Moscow, the newspaper "Evening Moscow" quoted Lattimore as demanding that the U. S. state department drop its opposition to seating red China at the United Nations.

3. The full Senate foreign relations committee took no action on the Tydings subcommittee report that President Truman has refused to open federal loyalty files in the investigation of McCarthy's charges.

The assumed title C. G. Long & Sons was filed by C. G. LeRoy C. and Donald C. Long, all of Salem route 2, box 433. Business consists of wholesale and retail sales of building materials, according to the certificate filed.

## State to Print 650,000 Copies of Voter Guide

Approximately 650,000 copies of the candidates' pamphlet will be needed to supply all registered voters at the primary election May 19, Dave O'Hara, in charge of the state elections bureau, said Tuesday.

O'Hara said the state received \$6115 covering candidates' statements in the pamphlet and \$7,309 for candidates' filings. This will not come anywhere near covering the cost of printing and circulating the pamphlets, he declared.

## Valsetz Woodworkers Strike to End Today

DALLAS, April 18—(AP)—The 12-day-old strike of 200 CIO woodworkers at Valsetz will end tomorrow, the loggers going back on the job, assured of time-and-a-half pay for Saturdays.

Employees of the Western Logging co., they walked out April 6 in demand for the premium pay. Bill Bess, union agent, said settlement of the dispute was reached at a conference in Portland last night.

## Property Holders On Mill Creek Have Fishing Right

Persons either owning or leasing property on Mill creek in Marion county can fish in the stream so long as he is on his land and it is fishing season, Attorney General George Neuner ruled Tuesday.

The 1949 legislature restricted fishing in Mill creek to children under 18 years of age. Neuner said this law does not apply to persons who own or lease property on the creek.

The opinion was sought by District Attorney E. O. Stadter, jr., Marion county.

## Legionnaire Warns of Red Creed Danger

Communists in America are sworn to fight for the Soviet Union and "force and violence" remain a vital part of their creed regardless of lip service otherwise, Capt. William Brown of the Portland police department told the Salem Kiwanis club Tuesday.

Captain Brown, who heads the American Legion's committee investigating subversivism, said communists were attempting to instill their doctrine into children by any means possible. He presented and read from several publications and documents to point out communist aims the world over.

The captain, declaring Russia the most "class-conscious" country on the map, said 30,000,000 persons were in slave labor camps at the present time. From his own experiences as a security officer in Europe, he cited instances in which Soviet officers would not talk to officers of lesser rank, no matter what country they represented.

The Russian army was described as "a sad-sack outfit" which showed to good advantage in the war only because it had access to military equipment of other nations and because it used its manpower without regard to huge losses.

## Plane Locates Disabled Tug

SAN FRANCISCO, April 18—(AP)—After nearly nine days adrift in the Pacific, the disabled tugboat Omar was found by a plane today. It is to be towed to port. Its crew of six men is believed none the worse for the days and nights at sea without power or radio communication.

The 60-foot-tug, its engines knocked out in a storm Monday of last week, was sighted at 8:45 a.m. today by a coast guard B-17. The 255-foot cutter Chautauque arrived at 1:58 p.m. and made ready to take the Omar in tow, probably for San Francisco.

Several crewmen standing on the small tug signaled "no emergency" when a patrol plane circled low and dropped messages, offering to prop medicine and food.

The Omar was found 525 miles southwest of San Francisco, somewhat southeast of the area coast guard, air force and navy planes have combed for seven days—ever since it last sent its bearings in sputtering radio messages.

## Bomb Blast Hurts Marine Guard in Syria

DAMASCUS, Syria, April 18—(AP)—A U. S. marine guard was wounded slightly tonight by a bomb tossed at the American legation here.

Staff Sgt. Elbert Cassell of Bedford, Va., was cut about the hands and face by glass which was shattered by the bomb explosion. The bomb, thrown over the back wall of the embassy compound, shattered glass windows and doors in the legation and dug a six-foot crater.

U. S. Minister James H. Keeley hurried to the legation from his home to confer with police officials. No arrests were made immediately.

Although no official explanation was forthcoming, there is known to be rising anti-American and anti-British feeling in Damascus because of tense relations between Israel and the Arab nations.

## Weather Eyes Given Awards For Services

Faithful and long recording of daily temperatures and precipitation in the mid-Willamette valley has won special service U. S. weather bureau awards for seven persons, the bureau announced Tuesday.

Leading the list is Frances M. Husted of Jefferson, a cooperative observer for more than 30 years.

The awards are lapel buttons or pins bearing a miniature department of commerce seal. Forty-three Oregon observers won them for more than 10 years' service.

The weather bureau provides equipment for about 200 such observers in Oregon, thus gaining the bulk of the weather information available in the state.

Those in this area who received 10-year awards are Seth T. French, Albany; Mrs. Mabel Parker, Detroit; J. W. Martin, Falls City; Arthur Fairhill, McMinnville; W. J. E. Vick, Molalla, and Claude E. Sawtelle, Willamina.

The first, and so far only oriental fruit moths found in Oregon were discovered last year in some of the residential fruit trees within The Dalles. Officials and orchardists are hopeful that this destructive pest of fruit crops will be halted before it spreads to commercial orchards.

Rombough, who succeeds Dr. Kermit Peterson, will serve a one-year term. Other officers installed included: Glenn Chaloupka, first vice president; Ted Bamford, second vice president; Benn Marquis, third vice president; and E. H. Kinney, secretary-treasurer.

Corsages were presented to the wives of both the incoming and outgoing presidents at the dinner meeting which was attended by about 75 members and guests. Guests included a delegation from Optimist clubs in both Portland and Vancouver, Wash.

Entertainment was furnished by a group of boys from the Paul Armstrong School of Dancing.

## Walnut Imports From China Cut

WASHINGTON, April 18—(AP)—The state department has informed Rep. Walter Norblad (R-Ore) that the large imports of walnuts from China would cease next month in view of the withdrawal of the Chinese government from the general tariff and trade agreements.

Norblad had protested the steadily increasing Chinese walnut importation which had reached almost a half million pounds in January, the latest month for which statistics are available.

## GOP Questions Truman Policy

WASHINGTON, April 18—(AP)—President Truman started setting up regular machinery today for a bi-partisan foreign policy but bumped into republican questions on how far he will go.

Moreover, there were objections in his own party to the way he went about it.

These were the moves and their early results:

1. The president and Secretary of State Acheson called Senator Bridges (R-NH) into an unusual White House conference on joint planning in foreign relations.

2. In a statement afterward the president pledged that he and Acheson will consult the republicans at all stages and take their views into "serious account" with the aim of keeping up "a true bi-partisan foreign policy."

## Enlistments Open in Air Force, Army

The return of openings for enlistments in the army and air force, with some special choices available, was announced Tuesday by M. Sgt. Hugh Smith, commanding Salem's recruiting station.

Sergeant Smith said that after several months of "no vacancies" men could sign up for three years in the army or four years in the air force. This is open to men 17 to 34 years of age, whether or not high school graduates and whether or not veterans.

Graduates, he said, can select before enlisting one of 64 army technical schools, and men making their first enlistment can make a choice from several branches. Particular vacancies pointed out were for specially qualified men in various units in the continental U.S. and for skiers in the 14th regimental combat team (mountain troops) at Camp Carson, Colo.

**JAMES BRUCE RESIGNS**

WASHINGTON, April 18—(AP)—James Bruce, wealthy business man-diplomat, has submitted his resignation as director of the foreign arms aid program. The White House confirmed today that Bruce has urged President Truman to let him return to private life.

## Senate Presidency Passed by Engdahl

PORTLAND, April 18—(AP)—State Sen. Carl Engdahl, Pendleton, said today he would not be a candidate for the senate presidency in 1951.

At present Sen. Paul L. Patterson, Hillsboro, is the leading candidate for the position. He claims pledges from seven of the nine holdover senators.

## Two Wilsons Scheduled For Arraignment Today

VANCOUVER, Wash., April 18 (AP)—Utah and Turman Wilson, accused of the kidnap-slating of Jo Ann Dewey, 19, are scheduled for arraignment here tomorrow.

They will appear in superior court before Judge Charles W. Hall. Both have insisted to newsmen that they are innocent.

## WOODBURN STUDIES DST

WOODBURN, April 18—The Woodburn city council tonight tabled a bill proposing that this city go on daylight saving time when Councilman Tom Workman voted against the measure on a third reading. The bill will be voted on at the May 2 meeting at which time unanimous approval will not be required.
