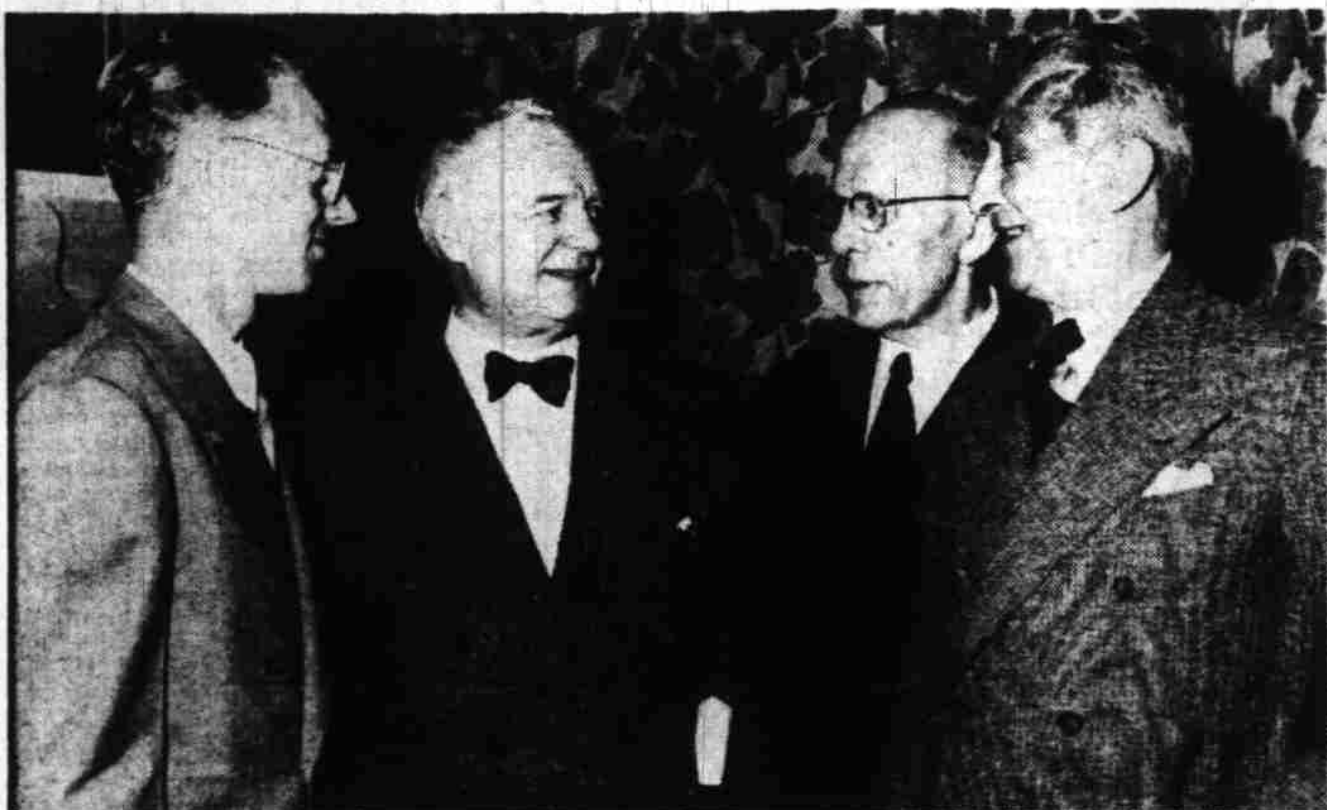

SILVERTON—Funeral services for Mrs. Anna Iverson, 89, who died here Monday, will be held Thursday at 11 a.m. at the Memorial chapel of the Ekman Funeral Home with the Rev. Joseph Luthero of Trinity Lutheran church officiating. Burial will be in Evans Valley cemetery.

WASHINGTON, April 18—(P)—In less than two hours here, a federal district judge cleared former Missouri congressman Roger C. Slaughter of charges that he violated the lobbying act.

Slaughter waived a jury trial and District Judge Alexander Holtzoff rendered the decision. The government presented only two witnesses, Slaughter none. The former house member was

28-Year-Old Son Seeks Relief From Domineering Mother

SEATTLE, April 18—(P)—A son's tearful plea for relief from what he said was the unrelenting domination of his mother led Monday to perjury charges being filed against her in federal court.

The son, six-foot, 28-year-old R. B. Massey, told the court he "hated to do this to my own mother. But I want to do right." He is on parole from a two-and-one-half year sentence on a perjury charge growing out of an army enlistment.

He was convicted in Utah federal court. His mother, Mrs. Pearl Massey, was placed on probation after being convicted of concealing, harboring and assisting an army deserter.

Since then, the son said, she has persistently sought to prevent him from living up to terms of his parole.

Federal Probation Officer Robert A. Stewart corroborated Massey's statement. He told Federal Judge Lloyd L. Black that the mother had prevented her son from seeking employment. When Massey moved, Stewart related, Mrs. Massey wouldn't let him use a telephone to notify the probation

indicted in 1948. The government charged that he got \$25,000 salary and \$18,599.13 expenses for trying to influence legislation in the 80th congress on behalf of the Chicago and Kansas City boards of trade and the Minneapolis grain exchange; and \$7,500 salary and \$2,258.44 expenses from the North American Export Grain association of New York, for similar work.

Slaughter maintained that his services were those of an attorney, and did not include lobbying work. His counsel conceded he had not registered as a lobbyist.

Walter Pearson Takes Issue With Flagg, Sales Tax

EUGENE, April 18—(P)—State Treasurer Walter Pearson Monday declared verbal war on the sales tax and George Flagg, public utilities commissioner.

Pearson, a democratic candidate for governor, said he would veto any sales tax, if he were governor.

Then he told the Lane county democratic central committee that "George Flagg should be fired."

He took Flagg to task for allowing two telephone rate increases. He also found fault with Flagg's approval of rate cuts for a private power firm at The Dalles, to meet competition from a people's utility district. He said Flagg at the same time allowed the same private power firm to increase rates in Portland.
