### Agreement Averts Strike Of Bus Drivers

PORTLAND, April 20—(AP)—A last-minute agreement averted a strike of AFL drivers and shopmen on Overland Greyhound lines from Portland to Salt Lake City tonight.

Commissioner F. I. Fickett of the federal mediation service said company and union officials had reached a tentative agreement. A union official said details were to be worked out tomorrow, and then submitted to a vote of the 225 drivers and shopmen involved. The union said the strike was "indefinitely postponed."

The strike had been scheduled to begin at 12:01 a.m. Friday. Company and union officials held a five-hour session that resulted in the agreement.

The principal point of dispute was a pension plan. The union also asked some changes in working conditions.

W. H.
