Production of Hybrid Chicks Jumps Yearly
During the current year 7,000,000 hybrid chickens have been sold at an average price of 29 cents per chick. This is approximately one-ninth of the total number of chicks sold in Iowa this year.

Hybrid corn was first sold in Iowa in 1926. By 1932, Wallace said, it formed one-half of one percent of the total corn crop in the state. By 1936 this had grown to 14.4 per cent, to 96.9 per cent in 1941, and to 100 per cent by 1946.

"The usage curves of corn and chickens coincide almost exactly, both for Iowa and the nation," Wallace said in an interview during a business trip to Chicago. "In seven years I should guess that 75 per cent of the entire corn belt chicken flocks will be hybrid."

In-breeding of corn has greatly increased the per acre yields, he added. He foresaw these similar advantages from hybrid chicks: "More production per bird—hybrid chicks will produce, on the average for a year, four dozen more eggs per bird than will standard lines."

Better egg quality—"Eggs are of uniform size and shape—and this can be controlled by breeding—the shell texture is good, and the interior quality is high. This means the farmer gets the maximum price per egg rather than a spotty average depending upon the spotty output of standard lines."

More uniform output—"hybrids are relatively unaffected by such things as cold weather and molting, which lower egg output. They also are more disease resistant."

Wallace estimated hybrid chickens this year have increased Iowa farmers' income by \$4,500,000. For Illinois he estimated the increase at \$1,560,000, and said similar boosts can be found in other egg-producing states.

"This is solely the result of greater production per bird," he went on. "Intangibles such as heavier eggs and more uniform quality have not been considered."

The chicks, he said, are produced by exactly the same method as is hybrid corn—by controlled mating of brother and sister.

Thus, if chick "A" comes of a line carrying good interior egg quality—freedom from blood spots, for example—and chick "B" line produces good-sized eggs, the two are mated. The desired quality is fixed in succeeding generations by mating brother and sister of the A-B hatch.

In corn, pollination is rigidly controlled the same way to achieve the same ends. Biologically, it is the in-breeding which fixes the desired characteristic.
