

Marion County 4-H Club Spring Show to Start Monday in Salem

If you'd like to know how to bake a cake, stitch a stylish dress, whip up a tasty dinner at low cost or keep a home shipshape, just drop in on the 1950 Marion County 4-H Club Spring show starting Monday in Salem.

It's the big event of the year for hundreds of Marion county 4-H club members, who have been working hard for the past 12 months learning their projects. The five-day show will end Friday night, April 28.

The competition will start Monday at 9 a.m. at the old Washington grade school where the county's healthiest boy and girl will be chosen by health department personnel. The same day, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m., exhibits will be set up at the school.

Tuesday, exhibits will be judged at the school from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and demonstrations and special contests will be conducted at Hogg Brothers store's model kitchen.

The same schedule will prevail Wednesday. The public may inspect the exhibits both Tuesday and Wednesday from 8 to 10 p.m.

Red Cross to Give \$88,000 To Aid in Slide

SAN FRANCISCO, April 21—(AP)—The Pacific Area Red Cross today allocated \$88,000 to help finance a wholesale movement of 17 homes threatened by a landslide in Astoria, Ore. The announcement was made by Robert F. Shea, area deputy manager.

The movement of the houses to two areas about two miles away will start tomorrow.

Shea said.

"Red Cross financing of the house movement is somewhat unique in the annals of Red Cross disaster operations in that rehabilitation funds were being used before the actual damage had occurred to most of the houses rather than waiting for the worst to happen."

The operation confirms, however, the Red Cross disaster policy of repairing and rebuilding homes of disaster victims to the extent of their own inability to meet reconstruction costs. Only one of the 18 home owners would be able to finance the cost of moving his home without assistance.

Red Cross funds also will help rebuild four homes destroyed.

Women's Club Federation Adds Official

PORTLAND, April 21—(AP)—The Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs created a new office here today and voted a dues increase.

They also balloted on officers with results to be announced tomorrow. Only one contest was on the slate: That for the new office of third vice-president.

Nominated for it were: Mrs. Fred Gast, Salem; Mrs. David C. Slaght, St. Helens, and Mrs. Emery C. Ingham, Portland.

Unopposed for other officers were: Mrs. Mildred M. Zell, Wasco, president; Mrs. E. E. Hall, Portland, first vice-president; Mrs. Marion Weatherford, Arlington, second vice-president; Mrs. W. H. Spurrer, Pendleton, recording secretary; Mrs. George Alling, Salem, treasurer; Mrs. Guy D. Johnson, Portland, financial secretary.

The dues were increased from 30 cents to 50 cents monthly.

The scholarship and loan committee reported its funds now total \$50,000. The committee said some \$300,000 has been loaned to 1683 Oregon girls for education since 1908.

Habitual Criminal Verdict Returned Against Lovejoy

An habitual criminal verdict was returned against William H. Lovejoy, 54, of 675 S. 12th st., by a Marion county circuit court jury Friday. Lovejoy will be sentenced Monday.

Lovejoy recently was convicted of larceny in the same court. His previous convictions were in 1944, for larceny in Malheur county; in 1934, for burglary in Idaho; and in 1927, for violation of the national motor vehicle theft act.

Solon New Papa, Votes Tax Cut On Baby Powder

WASHINGTON, April 21—(AP)—In a move to ease the drain on proud papa's pocketbooks, the house votes today to eliminate the 20 per cent excise tax on baby oils, powder and lotions.

The motion to wipe out the levy — subject to house, senate and White House approval — was made by Rep. John W. Byrne, a 36-year old Wisconsin republican who became a proud papa for the third time yesterday. It was a girl this time.

Welfare Board to Pay by Check When Possible

PORTLAND, April 21—(AP)—The state public welfare commission decided today to pay relief recipients by checks rather than by requisitions, whenever that is possible.

The decision was made after the Oregon Independent Retail Grocers association complained of a scrip system used by some chain stores. The store issues scrip in exchange for the relief requisition, and the scrip holder then uses the tickets to buy as he needs them.

The grocers' association contended that gave the chain a competitive advantage.

Truman Asks Extension of Rent Controls

WASHINGTON, April 21—(AP)—President Truman said today that millions would suffer serious hardships if federal rent controls die June 30 as scheduled.

He appealed to congress for a year's extension of the law to head off "a wave of exorbitant rent increases" which he said would surely follow a sudden lifting of controls.

Families earning less than \$40 a week would be hardest hit, the Truman message said — many lines of business would be affected, relief costs would rise and pensions for the aged be less adequate.

Issue in Doubt

The appeal preceded the opening of public hearing on the issue, the outcome of which is in doubt. Recent voting tests made this clear.

The senate banking committee will begin five full days of hearings Monday. The house banking committee has none set.

A few weeks ago, congress slashed a rent office request for emergency operating funds from \$3,600,000 to \$1,400,000 — then tossed in \$2,600,000 to be used only for discharge pay of employees.

This action threw a shadow across the agency's future when the question of continuing controls comes up, perhaps next month.

Extension Proposed

Flat extension of the present law has been proposed, but its prospects look so thin to some democratic aides that compromise ideas have sprung up. These involve giving the city a deciding vote on retaining their own ceilings.

The main pressure for continuance of federal authority is from big city legislators. Officials of 10 cities told Mr. Truman yesterday that they are in general favor of retaining controls.

The presidential message said that 8,000,000 rental units in 40 states still will be under federal control on June 30, including 63 of the 92 cities with populations over 100,000.

"Rent control will still be a national problem," the president said. "The housing shortage will still be acute." He added it will be "some time" before supply balances demand nationally.

Mr. Truman said it is significant that all the 63 large cities to which he referred have had the option to remove controls but chosen to keep them.

Mr. Truman said that in several cities decontrolling rents last year a survey showed that the impact of resulting increases was heaviest on low income groups.

Ex-Oregon Con Held in Bank Robbery Try

MARYSVILLE, Calif., April 21—(AP)—An attempt to hold up the Bank of America in downtown Marysville today ended with the suspect captured by two bank employees after a three block chase.

Booked on suspicion of attempted robbery was a man who identified himself as Albert Aloysius Kiley, 33, a native of Yonkers, N. Y., and recently released from the Oregon state penitentiary.

Bank officials gave this account of what happened:

At 2:56, a man strode into the ride-out branch of the bank, approached Teller George Schwedhelm, and pushed a note through the cage.

The note instructed the teller to hand over all bills available; that the man had a gun.

The man before the window had a hand thrust in his pocket. (When arrested Kiley had no gun).

Schwedhelm ducked and shouted to others in the bank to "go get him."

The man fled down an alley. After him raced two other tellers, William Schmidt, Marysville, and Ed Wideman, Yuba City. They closed in just as Police Sergeant Dennis McAuliffe and Patrolman Hal Notestine arrived in separate patrol cars.

Kiley said he was 33 and a logger.

First Aiders Patch Thumb, Finger, Head

City first aid men were called to three Salem area addresses Friday to patch up a thumb, a finger and a three-year-old's head.

Mrs. Pearl Thomas, 2308 Rex st., split her thumb while chopping wood, and Mrs. Albert Hall, 638 S. Lancaster dr., rammed a piece of steel from a water faucet through her fingernail. Kathy Randall, 3, who lives at 686 N. 23rd st., fell on her head. None of the injuries were serious.

Motorcyclist Killed

NEW YORK, April 21—(AP)—Night club singer Georgeanne (Gigi) Durston said today that her romance with Elliott Roosevelt had flickered out.

Miss Durston, who came here from West Hartford, Conn., said: "Any plans that we may have had are ended."

But, Miss Durston added, she wouldn't say that Elliott and she had been engaged. "After all it was never officially announced," she commented.

The romance between the singer and the second son of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt has been reported by press and radio since December, 1949.

The singer, who recently ended a three week engagement in Pittsburgh, St. Louis and Millburn, N. J., said her plans had not gone so far as to acquire a trousseau in preparation for a wedding with Roosevelt.

Maturity in college graduates is required more urgently now than ever, Lawson McCall told 50 members of Blue Key fraternity here Thursday. McCall is secretary to Gov. Douglas McKay.

Delegates from 11 campuses in four states heard McCall speak at a regional conference of the fraternity at Willamette university.

"Educators who favor rigid control of student behavior will have to come to the assumption that the upper classman is mature enough to take care of his own personal problems," McCall said.

He coached athletics for four years during his service at Leslie and previously taught at Grant school and spent one year in the physical education department at Parrish junior high school.

Truman May Broadcast From Oregon

PORTLAND, April 21—(AP)—President Truman may broadcast from Pendleton on May 10, the Oregon Democrat said today.

The publication which is operated by Democratic National Committee member Monroe Sweetland, said the president probably will deliver a state-wide broadcast during his train's pause at Pendleton that day.

Mr. Truman will also give platform talks in other eastern Oregon towns before traveling northward to Grand Coulee for the May 11 dedication of the dam.
