Golden Jubilee Banquet for Federation

The number of women holding responsible positions with the state has been steadily on the increase, said Gov. Douglas McKay in a talk given at the Golden Jubilee banquet of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs at Multnomah hotel in Portland Thursday night. The banquet was part of the federation convention being held for three days of this week.

Gov. McKay listed 38 women on boards and commissions, three on legislative interim committees, 49 in county welfare commissions, and said one is state librarian, another assistant attorney general. Many more hold important positions in the various departments throughout the state, he said.

He urged women to take an active interest in politics, and said through such organizations as the Oregon State Federation can come pressure for better response at the polls. "I worry more about apathy in the home towns than I do about foreign powers," the governor said.

Gov. McKay presented Mrs. Henry Roe Cloud of West Linn with a certificate as Oregon Mother of 1950, and expressed the hope that she may be chosen American Mother. Mrs. Cloud responded briefly, declaring that as an Indian woman and representing a minority group, she feels that the significance of her being selected as Oregon Mother is an indication of understanding of those minority groups and a tribute to her own people.

Mrs. Roe Cloud introduced two of her four daughters, Mrs. Lillian Freed and Mrs. Mary Hughes both of Portland. Two other daughters, Mrs. Anna W. North and Mrs. Ramona Butterfield reside in the east.

Special greetings were given at the banquet by Mrs. William Chandlee, president, to women who have been members of clubs since before 1910. Among those honored were Mrs. F. A. Elliott and Miss Gertrude Savage of the Salem Woman's club, Mrs. A. E. Austin, Woodburn and Mrs. George Hubbs, Silverton.

Past state presidents were honored at the banquet, some responding to introductions with short talks about achievements of the federation during their tenure of office. A review of the past 50 years of women's clubs in Oregon was given as presidents of the various clubs placed lighted candles on a large birthday cake.

Pie-Making One of Opportunities For Family Cook to Adventure

Life would be rather dull, if we housewives had to cook pork chops and mashed potatoes exclusively. Variety in cooking is what saves the homemaker from disinterest, and makes the family meals something to talk about.

Pie, for instance, can be its own sweet, simple self, or it can be a glamorous concoction which stimulates woman's creative urge. Rhubarb time brings many a pie to the table. This vegetable, that's-treated-like-a-fruit is at its best in pie—and fresh at that. But rhubarb can make a more fancy pie too, as will be proved by those trying

LILA'S RHUBARB CUSTARD PIE
2 cups rhubarb
2 eggs
1/4 teaspoon salt
Line pie plate with the crumbs. Cut rhubarb in 1/2 inch pieces. Pour boiling water over the rhubarb, drain and put into pie tin. Beat yolks and sugar which has been mixed with flour and salt and pour this over the rhubarb. Cover with a meringue made from the egg whites. Bake in a moderate oven for 45 minutes.

And another:
PINEAPPLE COTTAGE CHEESE PIE
1 1/2 cups creamed cottage cheese
4 tablespoons melted butter
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon flour
Press cottage cheese through sieve twice. Separate eggs. Combine all ingredients but egg whites. Beat egg whites and fold in mixture. Pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake in moderately hot oven 350 degrees for 50 minutes or until nicely browned and the filling firm. Spread with Pineapple Glaze and return to the oven for 5 minutes or until glaze is set.

PINEAPPLE GLAZE
1 No. 2 can crushed pineapple
1 apple
2 tablespoons cornstarch
Drain pineapple thoroughly. Combine cornstarch and sugar. Add pineapple juice and cook slowly, stirring constantly, until thick and clear. Add well-drained pineapple. Cool and spread by spoonfuls over cheese filling.
