

Louis Budenz Claim Scorned By Lattimore

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—Owen Lattimore today decided charges that he was a member of a communist cell and scoffed at Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) as a man whose knowledge is limited to "what he has learned from Charlie Chan movies."

Cited by McCarthy as the No. 1 Soviet spy in the United States, Lattimore turned a torrent of sarcasm on his accusers at a news conference in which he declared: "As a loyal American citizen who is not and never has been a communist or anything but an American, I say it is long past time to clean out the cesspool from which this campaign of character assassination, intimidation and vilification emanates."

Lattimore directed some of his sharpest barbs at former communist leader Louis F. Budenz, who swore before a senate investigating committee yesterday that Lattimore had helped direct an American-hatched plot to betray China to the communists.

Lattimore's counterattack capped a day which saw these other developments:

1. Senate investigators subpoenaed Dr. Bella V. Dodd of New York, a former member of the U.S. communist politburo, to confront Budenz next Tuesday on his testimony that high communist officials had described Lattimore as a communist.

Dr. Dodd had made a sworn affidavit that in her four years in the red party's top circles from 1944 to 1948 she never met Lattimore and never heard of him.

2. The senate inquiry committee, headed by Chairman Tydings (D-Md.), also subpoenaed two former FBI operatives named by McCarthy to help substantiate his charges against Lattimore. FBI Undercover Agent

The two are John J. Huber of Mt. Vernon, N.Y., described by McCarthy as a former FBI undercover agent who worked inside the communist party for 10 years; and Lawrence Kery, now a New York Journal-American reporter.

With Dr. Dodd, they have been ordered to appear before the Tydings committee next Tuesday when Budenz will undergo further questioning.

3. Republican Senator Flanders of Vermont, told the senate that "certain links" seemed to be established between the Moscow party line and United States policy in events leading up to the red conquest of China.

Flanders said that as a result of Budenz' testimony, McCarthy's case against the state department has taken "a more serious turn."

Lattimore told newsmen that Budenz' testimony was "gossip and hearsay."

Radio-Video Issues Active

NEW YORK, April 21 (AP)—Radio-television issues were the life of the party again today in the stock market.

TV stocks sold at higher prices most of the day, despite heavy profit taking, and closed with gains running to around three points.

Rail and automobile shares made a late bid for favor. A liberal sprinkling of low-priced issues also made a good showing. Elsewhere gains and losses were pretty well scrambled, with changes either way limited mainly to fractions.

Business was fast through the day and turnover piled up to 2,710,000 shares from 2,590,000 Thursday. It was the eleventh full session in a row in which sales have amounted to 2,000,000 or more shares.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks inched up .1 of one point to 76.2. The rise was due entirely to the industrial group, because both rails and utilities were unchanged on average.

Wheat closed 1 1/4-1 3/4 higher, corn was 1/4 to 1/2 cent higher, oats were 1/4-1/2 higher, soybeans were 2 to 4 1/4 higher and lard was unchanged to 3 cents a hundred pounds higher.

Failure of rain to fall in the southwest caused buying in new crop wheat deliveries. The five day weather bureau outlook saw no rain for the dry area.
