Soybeans on Upward Trail In Grain Mart

CHICAGO, April 24 (AP)—Soybeans zoomed upward the 10 cents a bushel daily limit today on heavy short covering and commission house buying.

May soybeans sold at \$2.94 1/4 a bushel, the highest price for any soybean contract since July, 1948.

Wheat and corn moved upward in sympathy with soybeans and also on unfavorable weather conditions. Wheat gained around 3 cents a bushel in some cases. All deliveries of wheat, corn and soybeans reached new seasonal highs.

Wheat closed 2 1/2 to 2 3/4 cents higher, corn 1/2 to 1 1/4 up, oats 1/4 higher, rye 1/4 to 3/4 higher, soybeans 5 1/2 to 10 cents higher, and lard was up 10 to 15 cents a hundred pounds.

The main bullish influence in wheat was continued dry weather in the southwestern winter wheat belt over the week-end. Temperatures were high, accompanied by high winds, in parts of Kansas.
