

Right, Leftist Unions Race at Westinghouse

PITTSBURGH, April 27 (AP)—Right and left wing unions ran a neck and neck race tonight in an NLRB election to determine which one will represent 55,000 workers at Westinghouse Electric Corporation.

The independent United Electrical workers claimed bargaining rights in 15 plants on the basis of returns up to midnight. The new CIO International Union of Electrical Workers has 14 plants to its credit. Workers in 40 plants voted.

The CIO-IUE led on the actual voting with 12,587 votes to 8,820 for the independent UE.

The election was conducted on a plant-by-plant basis.

This means the union which gets the most votes in an individual plant will have the right to bargain for new contracts with Westinghouse in that plant.

Conceivably, the new CIO union may come out of the election with fewer contracts but representing more of Westinghouse's employees.

The independent UE was ousted from the CIO last year after CIO President Philip Murray described it as a left wing organization which was communist dominated.

Murray and his leaders promptly organized the new electrical workers union and is striving to obtain, through a battle of ballots, to become the dominant labor organization in the electrical industry.

U.S. to Refinance Budget Deficit For Present Year

WASHINGTON, April 27 (AP)—The government will borrow approximately \$100,000,000 in new money next week for the fourth time in as many weeks.

Secretary of the Treasury Snyder disclosed this today in inviting bids for \$100,000,000 in 91-day treasury bills to be dated May 4.

That will refinance \$1,002,780,000 in 91-day bills maturing May 4 and leave nearly \$100,000,000 for use in financing the budget deficit. The deficit is now expected to reach \$5,400,000,000 in this fiscal year, ending June 30.

BOOK BALANCE

CHICAGO, (INS)—Municipal officials of South Berwick, Me., paid with their blood to keep their town out of the red in 1949, the Municipal Finance Officers association reports. According to the association, South Berwick's town manager and four of its seven selectmen recently donated a pint of blood each to help defray the cost of a hospital bill of a 79-year-old townsman and to keep from overspending their budget. The town's three other selectmen were unable to be donors because of physical condition.

Man Saves Wife by Allowing Auto to Roll Across His Body

SEVIERVILLE, Tenn., April 27 (AP)—A 75-year-old man threw his body beneath the wheels of his rolling car to stop it at the top of a mountain today—probably saving the life of his wife.

The wife, Mrs. Alonzo A. Fassett of Detroit, said her husband, run over by one wheel, acted as a human brake for about five minutes while she scrambled from the vehicle in terror and sought aid from a passing motorist.

Standing by the hospital bed of her husband, who suffered shock and severe bruises, she related the near-tragedy occurred at dawn at Newfound Gap, an observation point in the Great Smoky mountains national park near the Tennessee-North Carolina line.

She was in the car, she said, while her husband stood outside watching the sun rise. "I couldn't stand to look off from the dizzy height," Mrs. Fassett added.

The car began to roll, she continued, and she screamed. Being

10 Doukhobors Sentenced for Nude Parading

TRAIL, B. C., April 27 (CP)—Penitentiary sentences of 2½ years were imposed today on 10 Doukhobor women convicted of nude parading.

Venue and date of the trial were kept a closely-guarded secret by authorities who feared disturbances by other members of the Sons of Freedom, offshoot of the Doukhobors.

Eighteen women and 22 men face charges arising out of recent burnings and nude parading at Krestova, east Kootenay headquarters of the Sons of Freedom. Provincial police guards stood at each entrance to the little court room here to prevent any possible demonstrations. Only four Doukhobors attended the trial, although for several days Trail streets have been crowded with members of the strange religious sect.

Bursts into Tears
The women stood unmoved as Police Magistrate Parker Williams pronounced sentence. One of them burst into tears, however, when they were paraded back to the cramped jail at the city hall basement.

Prior to the opening of the court, the women knelt and kissed the floor after chanting prayers. On the table between them and the magistrate stood the traditional loaf of whole wheat bread, a glass of water and a shaker of salt, which all Doukhobors take their oaths.

The 10 pleaded innocent to a charge of parading in the nude April 23 and told the magistrate through an interpreter:

"It is Christ's will. What he places in our hearts we must fulfill."

Do Not Testify
Asked if they wished to testify, the women told the court: "God is the only one we can give evidence to."

One Doukhobor woman said they wanted to join their "suffering men." (Two of the women's husbands had been sentenced to jail previously).

The women were clad in shawls and a motley array of clothing, hurriedly gathered by police at the time of the arrests.

Sixteen buildings have been destroyed in recent days by Sons of Freedom fire raiders, most of them in the shantytown of Krestova, 23 miles west of Nelson. Another home was burned today in the Slokan valley.

Plane Stocks Soar Higher

NEW YORK, April 27 (AP)—Aircraft stocks sparked a snappy advance in today's market.

Final prices were up fractions to around two points, though in some cases below the best levels reached during the session.

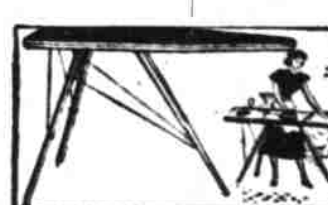

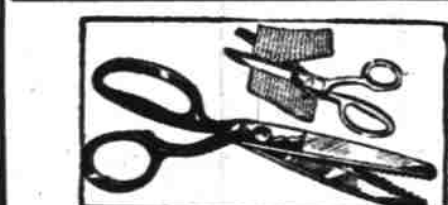

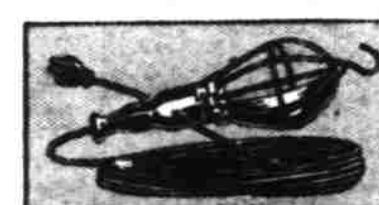
