Club Members Hear Dr. Gregg

"The United States and Russia, Two Worlds. Can They Be One?" was the topic discussed by Dr. Robert E. Gregg, dean of the School of Liberal Arts at Willamette university, when he addressed the Salem Business and Professional Women at their monthly dinner meeting at the Senator hotel Tuesday night.

Dr. Gregg traced briefly the history of Russian imperialism from the days of Peter the Great and Catherine II. He emphasized that today's communistic point of view in Russia is not a changed point of view from the days of the Czarist theocratic government, but that it is merely a sharper driving point of totalitarianism carrying still further the same general policies.

Dr. Gregg further compared international anarchy of today with the lawlessness of early frontier societies in which individuals often took the law into their own hands, but in which organized law eventually won out and a law-abiding policed community resulted.

Dr. Gregg suggested that the solution of present day situation probably lies in our standing firm and negotiating with Russia reasonably but firmly on European soil.

More for Your Money Combination Lavatory and Dressing Table Save Space in Your Bedroom

If you are looking for a way to save space in your bedroom, you will like the new combination lavatory and dressing table combination which can go in your bathroom. This type of plumbing fixture has been developed a great deal and really enhances a bathroom. It also gives you a chance to store all your cosmetics, linens for the bathroom, and your husband's shaving equipment in the one unit.

There are many colors available in this unit, including blue, coral, ivory, green, brown, red and white to match or contrast with your bathroom decor. These are the colors of the lavatory and you can choose a matching or contrasting color for



the dressing table part and the cabinet fronts. The table is in plastic and resists stains, burns and abrasion. The most popular type resembles the texture of linen or tweed, and the plastic finish also comes in mother-of-pearl or wood.

There are two styles available in this combination fixture. The first has a closed front with two drawers and three storage spaces. The second has an interrupted front with one less storage compartment and a knee-hole section on either right or left side to make it more comfortable when you use the fixture for "making-up."

The cabinet space can be used for towels, medicine cabinet or as a laundry hamper. The extra deep bowl in the lavatory makes it good for shampooing the children's hair.

You can also use this type of fixture in a bedroom, but it is more attractive as a powder or bathroom fixture.
