Time for Sauce

Fancy Toppings Turn Simple Dessert Into Something Elegant; Know Several

Sauces often make the dessert.

You can take a very simple one-egg cake and make a pretty nice dessert from it by topping it with a fancy sauce. You can add lusciousness to plain ice cream, put color on white cake and turn simple mixtures into glamorous concoctions by a mere adding of a fancy sauce.

One of the first fancy whipped cream toppings we can remember was the peanut brittle one, which went on cake and even topped baked apples to give them interest. We used to merely fold crushed peanut brittle into whipped cream. The topping was easy and satisfactory.

Another old time favorite is the peppermint stick-cream combination.

But there are innumerable other sauces too. They're handy to have in one's recipe file.

Here's an orange sauce. You can make French toast, saute bananas in butter and put on the toast, then top with this sauce, for a right elegant dessert dish.

ORANGE SAUCE
1/2 cup sugar
2 tablespoons lemon juice
2 tablespoons flour
2 tablespoons orange rind
Dash of salt
1 tablespoon butter

Mix sugar, flour and salt, add remaining ingredients and cook for 3 to 4 minutes.

Here's the making for a strawberry-pineapple sundae deluxe:

CARAMEL PINEAPPLE SAUCE
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup boiling water
Melt sugar to light brown, add water and cook a few minutes, cool, then add pineapple. Put over ice cream, add strawberries and top with nuts.

Bananas whipped and folded into egg white make a good sauce for plain cake or for ice cream.

WHIPPED BANANA TOPPING
1 mashed banana
1 egg white
Dash of salt

Slice banana into a bowl, add egg white, sugar and vanilla and beat until smooth and fluffy. Chill. Makes about 1 1/2 cups.

Here's an orange sauce for angel cake:

BETTY'S ORANGE SAUCE
(for angel cake)
6 egg yolks
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 cup pineapple juice

Juice of 2 oranges
Rind of 1 orange
1/2 cup crushed pineapple

Stir together and cook over hot water until thick. This makes quite a large quantity and will keep in refrigerator. When ready to serve, fold some of it into whipped cream and pour over angel cake.
