Cross-Country Firing Slated

Bauer Sisters Make Debut in Pro Ranks

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif., April 28 (AP)—Star women golfers, comprising the leading professionals and a number of low shooting amateurs, tee off here tomorrow in the start of a unique cross country links marathon.

It is the first of its kind ever attempted, worth \$17,000 to the pros and with trophies for the amateurs. The 144-hole event will be played in four stages, 36 holes over the Pebble Beach course, tomorrow and Sunday; 36 more at Prairie View, Ill., May 6-7, 36 at Cleveland, May 13-14 and the final two rounds at White Plains, N. Y.

The winning professional of each tournament will receive \$3000 and the low scorer for the full 144 holes will get a receipt for an additional \$5000.

National Open Champion Louise Suggs of Atlanta heads the list of pros who will try for the rich pot offered by the initial Weather-vane open tournament.

The lengthy links battle also will mark the professional debuts of the youthful Bauer sisters, 16-year-old Marlene and 22-year-old Alice. The Midland, Tex., girls, who have come to the front in sensational fashion, recently joined the play for pay ranks.

Others who will battle the tough Pebble Beach layout for a share of purse include Mrs. George Zaharias, Prairie View, Ill., Patty Berg, Chicago; Betty Jameson, San Antonio, and Mrs. Betty Mims Danoff, Dallas, Tex. Amateurs of low handicap rating include Edean Anderson, Helena, Mont., and Grace De Moss, Corvallis, Ore.

The tournament is being played under the auspices of the ladies' U. S. A. of the United States.

Harold Hauk's Salem high baseballers pocketed their third Big Six league victory in four starts Friday at Waters Park as they pounded out a 16-4 win over the Springfield Millers with the aid of their biggest offensive of the season, a 21-hit barrage.

While the Viks were exploding baseballs all over the place Sonny Walker checked the Millers on five hits and whiffed 13 of 'em. He walked three.

The big chunk of dynamite in the SHS attack came in the fifth as 10 runs paraded over the plate. Seven hits and a pair of enemy errors manufactured the big fifth for the locals. Doug Rogers knocked in three runs with two singles during the explosion, Jim Stewart contributed a two-run double and Jim Rock knocked in a brace of tallies with a three-base smash.

The Millers' starting hurler, Jack Johnson, was routed in the middle of the 10-run outburst and Fred Harrington replaced him.

Stewart and Rogers each collect three hits to lead the Vik hit bing.

Welter King Easy Victor

DETROIT, April 28 (AP)—Welterweight Champion Ray Robinson pounded out a unanimous 10-round decision over Detroit middleweight Ray Barnes tonight in a pretty one-sided scrap before 8,954 fans.

Robinson had big margins on all the cards of all three ring officials. Referee Johnny Weber called it 10-0, while Judges Joe Lushan saw it 10-0 and Andy Brown 10-0.

The 156½-pound champion gave away four pounds to the young Detroit whizzer whose biggest assets were good physical condition and the ability to take a lot of punishment.

Robinson scored the only knockdown of the fight when he caught Barnes with a terrific left hook midway in the sixth round.

Two new records were made, one by Salem's Buzz Covalt in the quarter mile. He romped off the one lap in 52.4 seconds, besting the mark of 53 seconds that stood since 1935 and was made then by Charles Coleman of Salem. Eugene's Dean Parsons spun the discus 148' 4" for the other mark.

Hurdler Bruce Mathis of the Viks with 10 points each, high for Vern Gilmore's team. McKenzie won the broad jump and was in a three-way tie for first in the high jump with Larry Paulus of Salem and Cook of Cottage Grove. Harold Goheen got a tie for first place in the pole vault also, at 11 feet.
