Nearly 1,000 At Elementary Education Meet

OREGON COLLEGE OF EDUCATION, April 30 — Nearly a thousand educators and school administrators from all sections of Oregon attended the annual Oregon college conference on elementary education here Saturday.

Dr. H. M. Gunn, OCE's president, was conference host. Every sectional meeting in the general conference was held before capacity audiences. Several leaders in education in Oregon expressed the opinion that the turnout indicated a strengthening of determination among the state's educators to grapple with their many problems.

Dr. Henry J. Otto, University of Texas curriculum and administration expert, addressed more than 700 persons in Campbell hall as main speaker of the general conference. Dr. Otto outlined the history and philosophy of curriculum development.

Dr. Otto flew here from Texas for the conference. Dr. Paul E. Elserer, University of Oregon psychologist, addressed a sectional meeting on "teacher anxiety and pupil learning." Dr. C. A. Howard, president emeritus of OCE, presided.

Mrs. Beatrice Pegham Krone, University of Southern California music expert, gave two hour-long demonstrations of techniques for musical learnings in elementary school. Alice Pendlebury of Manchester, England, now an OCE exchange professor of arts, spoke to a group on relation of American and English teaching and life.

She was also a featured speaker at an evening banquet session of the three education honoraries, Phi Delta Kappa, Pi Lambda Theta, Delta Kappa Gamma. Dr. George B. Martin of Willamette university's school of education presided.

The conference under general chairmanship of Emma Henkle, OCE's coordinator of elementary education.

Among those attending were Dr. Rex Putnam, Dr. Elmo Stevenson, Southern Oregon College of Education, and Dr. Rod Langston, new president of Eastern Oregon College of Education. Many OCE alumni returned for the conference.

Marion County Chest X-Ray Total Mounts

Chest x-rays of 7,830 Marion county residents were taken during the first three weeks of April, representing 39 per cent of the adult population in towns where the x-rays were made, Marion County Tuberculosis and Health association announced Saturday.

Mrs. Ruby Bunnell, executive secretary, singled out Scotts Mills, where the 262 x-rays taken covered 79 per cent of the town's adults, for special mention.

A total of 228 persons were called back for further checking, representing about 3 per cent of the x-rays made.

Number of x-rays taken by three traveling units from April 1 to 21 included Monitor 218, Aurora, 328, St. Paul 205, Hubbard 347, Mt. Angel 1,050, Brooks 324, Hopmore 272, Silverton 1,577, Victor Point 145, Central Howell 248, Woodburn 1,180, Gervais 618, Chemawa 650 and Salem 557.

Boy Scouts Build Bridges, Towers at Circus Saturday

Bridges of several types, observation towers and buildings are among projects to be featured at the annual Boy Scout circus Saturday evening at Waters park, Salem Lions club, sponsor, has announced.

Several projects of unusual nature will include at least one of a surprise nature, showing advanced ingenuity for boys of scout age. The pioneering program numbers are the last of the evening program, after which spectators are invited to visit the field to inspect the finished exhibits.

Boys from 8 to 18 will converge on Salem from Marion, Linn and Polk counties which comprise the Cascade area Boy Scout council, representing more than 3,500 scouts. Australia May Cut Diplomat Staff in Russia

SYDNEY, April 30 —(AP)—The Sydney Morning Herald's Canberra correspondent said today it is likely Australia will reduce the status of its diplomatic representation to Moscow soon.

He pictured the government as dissatisfied with the slight benefits obtained from having an ambassador in Moscow. He added that Percy Spender, the external affairs minister, probably will be satisfied to leave Australian representation in Moscow to the present Charge d'Affaires, Alan Blakeley.

Ambassador A. S. Watt returned here from Moscow two months ago and it is not considered likely he will return.

Rendezvous Brings Medical Aid to Seaman

VICTORIA, B.C., April 30 —(CP)—The Canadian Destroyer Sioux late Saturday night made a successful rendezvous in the north Pacific to bring medical attention to a seriously ill Greek seaman.

A brief message received at the Esquimalt naval base here said the unidentified sailor, feared suffering from a ruptured appendix, had been transferred to the warship from the Greek freighter Maria G. Couloucoul.

The ships met some 300 miles from here. The Sioux was scheduled to arrive here today to bring the seaman to hospital.

It was not known whether he was operated on at sea. Earlier, a navy spokesman said this would not be done unless absolutely necessary. The Sioux carried two doctors.

The warship left Victoria early Saturday morning. So hurried was her departure that a few crew members were left on the jetty.

Movement of Lumber by Rail Sets Record

The greatest movement of lumber in the history of Oregon is now being handled by the Southern Pacific railroad, F. C. Nelson, freight traffic manager, announced Sunday.

Nelson said forest product handlings, exclusive of logs, broke all-time March records with 17,619 carloads and that daily average loading in April exceeded that of March.

He estimated that about 18,000 cars were handled during April. An all-time daily record was set April 26 when 925 cars of lumber were loaded in the Portland division.

Car supply has been excellent and there have been as many as 4,000 empty cars on the division, Nelson said.
