

Fred Wilt Runs Fastest Outdoor Mile in Winning Boardwalk Race

4:05.5 Gallop Clips Record

Ashenfelter Close; Wind Aids Runners

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., April 30.—Fred Wilt ran the fastest outdoor mile ever turned in by an American in winning the Boardwalk race in 4:05.5 today.

Horace Ashenfelter, ex-Penn State, finished second, seven yards behind the government agent in a race down the straight boardwalk track from the steel pier to Convention Hall. They had 18-20 mile-an-hour wind boosting them along.

Wilt's time bettered the American citizen's outdoor mark of 4:06 set by Bill Hulse of the New York AC in 1943 at Berea, Ohio. Hulse finished second that time to Sweden's Gunder Hagg. The Swede holds the world mark of 4:1.4.

Glenn Cunningham of Kansas and Gil Dodds of the Boston A.A. are the only Americans who have run faster than Wilt did today. Both did it indoors.

Cunningham ran a 4:04.4 paced mile on Dartmouth's big indoor track in 1938. Dodds set the world indoor mark of 4:05.3 in New York's Wanamaker mile in 1948.

Robin Roberts posted his third victory without a loss in the second game. The bonus beauty fanned 11 and scattered eight hits. The Braves collected nine safeties off Dick Donovan and Bob Hall including home runs by Gran Hamner and Mike Goliat.

Lefty Bill Wight turned in a masterful 5-0, two-hit triumph over the Detroit Tigers in the first of two at Chicago. Both Tiger bryws were doubles — by Dick Kryhoski and Johnny Lipton.

The White Sox overcame a 7-0 deficit and tied the Tigers, 7-7, in the second game, which was called at the end of nine innings because of darkness.

A pair of home runs by Hank Majeski, one with two on in the seventh and with the bases empty in the ninth, featured the Chicago's comeback. Hook Evers and Dick Donovan cracked homers for Detroit in the third inning.

Four games were rained out. Brooklyn and New York was washed out in the national and a doubleheader between Cleveland and St. Louis and a single game between New York and Washington in the American.
