

Sweet Home Man Drowns

SWEET HOME, May 2 — Toy Story, 35, pond man for Santiam Logging company here, was drowned in the mill pond about 8 o'clock Monday night.

Other workers noticed his hat floating on the water but did not see him. They called the local fire department, which recovered the body, but all efforts at resuscitation failed. Story had been employed by the firm since March 1.

Survivors include the widow Leona and two young daughters, Beulah, 4, and Caroline, 18 months, all of Sweet Home. Funeral arrangements are in charge of Howe-Huston Funeral home of Lebanon.

The deputy said Barnett departed in the car Wolf was driving following the purported interference with Wolf's arrest.

Death Claims Mrs. Prill At Scio Home

SCIO, May 2 — Mrs. Anna C. Prill, 77, well-known wife of an Oregon pioneer doctor, died at her home here today after a lengthy illness.

She came to Scio in 1896 with her husband, Dr. Albert G. Prill, who survives. Dr. Prill has practiced medicine in Scio for over a half century. Mrs. Prill was active in civic and social affairs. The deceased was born June 24, 1872, in East Otto, N.Y., and was married to Dr. Prill in July 6, 1889, at Springfield, N.Y. The couple came to Oregon in 1890 and to Scio in 1896. They have resided here since.

In addition to the widow she is survived by several nieces and nephews in the east. She was a member of the Methodist-Episcopal church of New York. Funeral arrangements are being made by the Howe-Huston funeral home in Lebanon.

Calpac Firm Foreman Gets 'Idea' Bonus

An idea for more efficient processing of vegetables brought a \$1,400 bonus to Ruben J. Wagnier, 4625 Claxter rd., from his employers, the California Packing Corp., 1250 Mill st., this week.

Wagnier, a preparation foreman at the Salem plant of the canning and food processing concern, submitted his plan through the company's employee suggestion system.

The suggestion was adopted by the plant in January, 1949. During the past canning season several thousand dollars were saved by Wagnier's scheme.

Wagnier was presented his bonus check Monday by Percy Blundell, Salem plant superintendent. At the same time service awards were made to 15 employees. Receiving five year service pins were, Alice Johnson, Willard La Fienne, Maurice Dunigan, Lawrence Marquardt, Raymond Werowski, Clarence Bergquist, George Hoover, Audrey Nyswaner, Mrs. Mary Rhodes and Mrs. Mary Brown. Ten year pins went to Harvey Schuebel, Fred Heinke, Austin Walker, 15 years, and Arndt Henne, 25 years; while G. H. Nets received a four-diamond pin for 35 years service.

Cal-Pac has had the employee suggestion award system in effect since 1944. There have been 4,418 suggestions submitted by employees for plant improvement; more efficient processing or packaging and better methods of working. A total of \$50,979 in awards had been made up to March 31 of this year. Wagnier's \$1,400 award is the fifth largest made by the corporation.

In an interview at the Press club, recorded for radio broadcast, the president of the CIO Longshoremen's union denied that communism is a threat to the labor movement.

In answer to questions of interviewers, the longshore boss denied that he ever said that labor had nothing in common with employers or that he ever predicted a class struggle in this country.
