

Storms Bring Injuries to 64 In Middlewest

Tornadoes whipped through three states last night, injuring an estimated 64 persons.

In Kansas, a twister ripped through a former army air base near Great Bend, now used as a housing project, injuring an estimated 50 persons.

A twister at Perryton, Tex., injured 14 persons, two seriously, and tore down a high school stadium, several homes and a number of other buildings.

Also hit was Fort Supply, Okla. The tornado wrecked several homes and business houses there, but an hour after it struck there were no known injuries.

Another twister was reported between Arnett, Okla., and Shattuck, Okla. The only known damage was destruction of a barn.

The Oklahoma highway patrol said a tornado struck in the southern edge of Cordell, in the eastern section of Elk City and in Washita county — all in west central Oklahoma.

None was injured or killed.

At Cordell a barn and grocery store were damaged and two autos and a truck turned over.

Bill Calvert, Beckham county assistant storm relief chairman, reported "some buildings" blown down at Elk City but no one was hurt.

Charge of 50c Will Be Put in Effect at 4 Campgrounds

PORTLAND, May 4 —(AP)—The U. S. forest service is going to try charging for the use of four of its 1,104 national forest campgrounds in Oregon and Washington this year.

It's an experiment, asked by congress, to see whether some revenue can be brought in to offset the cost of maintaining recreational areas in the forests. The charge per car is 50 cents a day for camping or 25 cents for picnicking.

The charge will be made at Paradise Forest camp, Willamette national forest; Tollgate, Mount Hood; Government mineral springs, Gifford Pinchot; and Dalles, Snoqualmie. Other camps are free.

Blaze Destroys Spencer Home on Sauvie Island

PORTLAND, May 4 —(AP)—Fire destroyed today the home of Omar C. Spencer, a landmark on Sauvie island, north of here.

Spencer, president of the Oregon Historical society, said all furnishings were saved, including a private library reputed to be one of the most valuable in the state.

The two-story frame house was built in 1883 by Spencer's grandfather, William Henry Harrison Morgan.

Solomon Gets Slap, Support For Judgeship

SALT LAKE CITY, May 4 —(AP) A senate judiciary subcommittee left undecided today the question of whether to ask Gus J. Solomon, Portland lawyer, to appear before the full committee in Washington.

The senators did so after hearing a letter taking note of reports that Solomon had associated with allegedly left-wing organizations, followed by staunch defense of Solomon's loyalty from five prominent Portland, Ore., citizens.

Solomon has been nominated by President Truman for an Oregon federal judgeship.

Witnesses urging confirmation of the nomination were E. V. MacNaughton, banker; and Gunther E. Krause, Lamar Toozie, B. A. Green and Chester McCarthy, attorneys.

The subcommittee moves on to Denver tomorrow.

Sen. Withers (D-Ky) raised the question today of whether or not the committee should hear from Solomon in person.

Sen. Langer (D-Ind) questioned the witnesses closely about contents of a communication the committee had received.

The letter came from three Portland, Ore., veterans' organization leaders who said questions had been raised as to Solomon's membership in certain allegedly communistic groups. Signers were Luis E. Tarr, James McCarren and Alfred Kelly.

Polio Chapter In Debt \$1,920 So Far In '50

The Marion county chapter, National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, is already \$1,920 in debt this year despite the incidence of only one new polio case since January 1.

Bills for continued treatment of 1949 polio victims total \$2,546, while cash on hand totals only \$626, it was revealed Thursday night at the local chapter's monthly meeting at Salem Memorial hospital. No new polio cases were reported.

It was decided to by-pass the bills until the national foundation acts on a request for help from the local chapter.

Several projects to secure more money for fighting polio were discussed Thursday night, including a state employees' concert scheduled May 26 and 27 in Salem. Time of future meetings was changed from 7 p.m. to 8 p.m. to compensate for daylight savings time.

Good Hatch In Duckling Eggs
