Canby Area Cattlemen Vote Jersey Sale

CANBY, May 5 — Clackamas County Jersey Cattle club, which has attracted wide-spread interest in recent years, has voted to hold an annual club Jersey sale, reports Harry F. Lane, president.

The first of these sales will be held on the Clackamas county fairgrounds at Canby, Saturday, May 13, beginning at 11 a.m. daylight time. There will be an intermission for lunch which may be procured on the grounds. Arrangements have also been made to hold the sale under cover in case of rain.

All the stock will come from herds of Clackamas county breeders. Approximately 35 head of pedigreed Jerseys, only one of these being a bull, will be auctioned to the highest bidder. Anton Malar, veteran Jersey breeder of the county, will auction the sale. Ernest McIlvanna is handling the arrangements for the sale. Myrtle Forbes Couche, secretary of the Clackamas County Jersey Cattle club, will act as clerk and John I. Gale will lead the animals in the ring.

In Lebanon E. L. Whetstone, a Lebanon resident, will take charge of the office in a new building, 24 by 40 feet, in the business section. Vehicle and driver licensing, tax refunds and financial responsibility matters will be handled there for the motoring public.

Three Salem won \$10 awards in an art and photography contest conducted recently by Scholastic magazine. Entries will be exhibited at the National High School Art exhibition in Pittsburgh, Pa., May 6-29.

Winners include: Jack Schrader, Leslie junior high school, colored drawing ink; Vilma Carrow, Salem high school, design for fabric; and Louise Matter, Salem high school, colored pencil drawing.

Voter Totals Listed for Two Marion Towns

Silverton and Woodburn voter-registration statistics released Friday show republicans leading democrats by a bit more than 200 in each city.

Totals at the Marion county clerk's office show that 1,323 Woodburn residents registered to vote while 1,819 Silverton voters registered.

Silverton, Woodburn and Salem are the only cities in the county where an exact check of voters can be computed. Precincts in other cities overlap with surrounding territory.

Woodburn's breakdown by parties shows 753 republicans, 545 democrats, 16 independents; 6 prohibitionists, one progressive, one socialist, and one listed under miscellaneous.

Of Silverton's voters 1,017 are registered as republicans, 793 democrats, five independent, one progressive and three miscellaneous.

Salem figures, revealed earlier, show 20,370 registered voters in Marion county. Another 1,570 westside residents are registered in Polk county making a total of 21,940 eligible to vote in Salem municipal elections.

Salem Above Average for Obeying Law

NEW YORK, May 5 — Salem was found to be a more law-abiding community last year than were most cities in the United States.

This is according to figures produced by the Federal Bureau of Investigation following reports made to it by over 4,200 police agencies throughout the country.

Salem police were called upon during the year to handle a total of 766 crimes of all sorts, equivalent to a rate of 1,440 offenses per 100,000 population. This was well below the average rate of 1,884 per 100,000 found in cities of more than 25,000 population.

The Salem record also compares favorably with the returns from all cities, regardless of size, which was 1,777 crimes per 100,000, and with those of the Pacific States, 3,384 per 100,000.

The offenses were tabulated by the FBI in six major categories. In Salem, larcenies led in number, with 560 recorded. The other local figures were: burglaries, 199, auto thefts, 32, robberies, 19, assaults, none, and murders, none.

By the end of 1949, reports the FBI, crime across the nation reached the imposing total of 1,763,290 cases, an increase of 76,620 over 1948. All categories rose except homicide and auto theft. Most marked was the situation in rural areas, where the crime incidence

The letter had been mailed more than two weeks before on April 20. The envelope bore that date on the postmark and was back-stamped with a May 4 Salem cancellation. Judd was at a loss to explain the delay enroute, but said it made extra work in changing totals.

The predominant past played by youth in offenses involving property — burglaries, larcenies and the like — is indicated from the fact that about half of those crimes were committed by persons under 25 years of age.

Four Departments In State Granted Increase of Funds

Appropriation increases totaling more than \$600,000 were granted to four state departments Friday by the state emergency board. All the appropriations will be paid for by fees collected by the departments.

The following increases were granted: Department of agriculture, \$346,269; state fair, \$41,705; state educational agency for surplus property, \$176,233; and state

liquor commission, \$63,000.

The emergency board also gave \$22,000 of its own funds to the state division of vocational rehabilitation, \$29,000 for Bang's disease control and \$7,714 to the state blind commission for purchase of books for the blind.
