Party Talk

Spring "Last Meetings" Call For Recipes for "Covered Dishes"

This is the season of final meetings—of covered dish dinners—of casseroles and salads in bowls. Here are several dishes suited to gatherings where appearance, flavor and nourishment must be considered.

ESCALLOPED TUNA
(Serves 6 to 8)
4 tablespoons butter
4 tablespoons flour
2 cups milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup American cheese
1/2 green pepper, minced
1/4 cup stuffed olives, sliced
Make a white sauce with butter, flour and milk. Add salt. Add cheese, blend. Add olives, green pepper and tuna fish. Arrange layer of bread cubes on bottom of buttered casserole. Pour half of tuna fish mixture over bread. Spread another layer of bread cubes over tuna fish. Cover with remaining tuna fish. Top with cornflakes, sprinkle with cheese. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 20 minutes.

APRICOT COTTAGE CHEESE SALAD
(Serves 8)
1 package lemon-flavored gelatin
2 cups boiling water
2 cups stewed dried apricots, mashed
1 cup cottage cheese
Dissolve gelatin in water. Cool until it begins to thicken. Add apricots. Pour half into mold, allow to harden. Spread cottage cheese on hardened gelatin. Pour remainder of gelatin over cottage cheese. Chill. Cut in squares and serve with boiled dressing.

CHOCOLATE CHIP CUSTARD PIE
(10-inch pie)
4 egg yolks, beaten
1/2 cup sugar
1 tablespoon gelatin
2 cups milk, scalded
1/4 cup cold water
1 teaspoon vanilla
Beat egg yolks and sugar, add milk, cook in double boiler until thick. Add gelatin softened in water, add vanilla. Cool. Pour into crust. Sprinkle with chocolate. Add cream of tartar to egg whites and beat stiffly. Add sugar. Continue beating until very stiff. Spread over chocolate. Chill 1 hour.

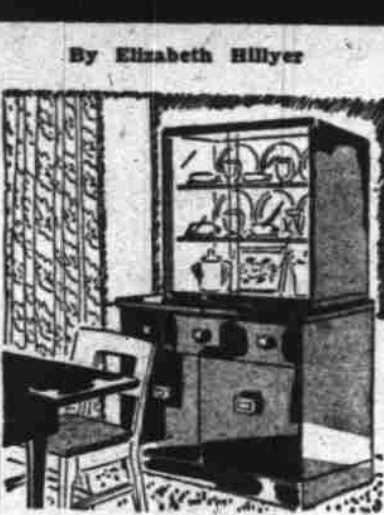

WHAT ABOUT BLACK

Thinking of refinishing that furniture in black? Black finishes are very much in fashion, but make sure before you start that the new color will improve both the furniture and the room. Black will make the piece look larger than it does now if it's set against a light wall. The furniture will also look more important, so it should be a piece that is good enough in design and quality to deserve emphasis. But if it is accent you want, or if black is not too strong a contrast, go ahead with the black finish. Just remember that what's fine for a limousine is not the handsomest thing for furniture. A charcoal, or slightly gray black is often better than a deep black, and any duller finish is better than glitter. Plan to use dull finish materials and cut down shine even more if need be with careful sanding.

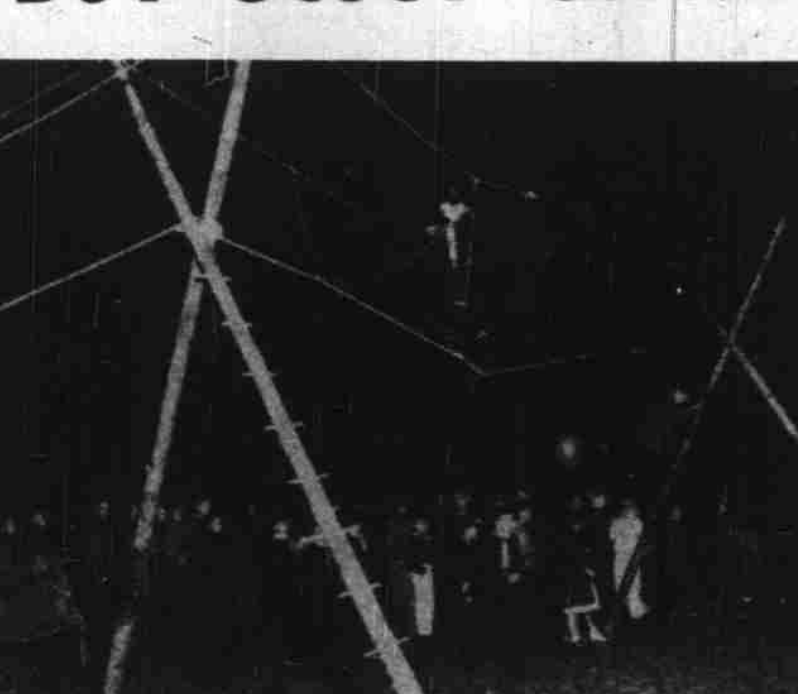
