Hoover Slaps Morse Record In Congress

Dave Hoover, candidate for the republican nomination as United States senator, told a group of supporters in Salem last night that "Sen. (Wayne) Morse's record of legislative achievement is a myth."

Hoover declared most of Morse's bills had died in committee. He also challenged statements that Morse's experience qualified him for re-election, declaring that "Thomas Jefferson at the age of 31 didn't have any experience when he wrote the Declaration of Independence."

About 20 persons met in the Senator hotel for a dinner at which Lloyd Rigdon was announced as Hoover's Marion county campaign chairman. After the dinner Hoover left for Dallas with Mrs. Hoover to appear at a republican meeting.

Award of a scholarship to Oregon College of Education to Doris Lane, senior at Salem high school, was announced Friday by the local school faculty. The grant for one year's tuition, renewable, was from Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers scholarship committee.

Miss Lane is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Lane, Salem route 9. She plans to teach, with her hopes now for teaching in the fourth and fifth grades, with some music instruction.

She is a member of Vikettes and was their princess in the school Civics Club carnival, was treasurer of her junior class and is vice president of her senior class, belongs to the Christian Youth fellowship, Civics club and National Honor society. She won three state 4-H championships, one of which gained her a trip to Chicago in 1948.
