

Senators Ask More Money For Detroit

WASHINGTON, May 12—Senate appropriations subcommittee action today increased the house figure for Detroit dam to \$20,000,000, Sen. Gurney (R-SD) reported.

Gurney said the subcommittee voted a 10 per cent overall cut in President Truman's budget for flood control and rivers and harbors projects in the fiscal year starting July 1.

The president budgeted \$798,492,000. The house last week trimmed this to \$599,145,000, and set the Detroit dam figure at \$13,000,000. Effect of the senate subcommittee action is to increase the amount voted by the house by more than \$100,000,000.

The senate subcommittee also increased figures for McNary dam from \$35,000,000 to \$37,500,000; for Lookout Point dam and reservoir from \$10,000,000 to \$15,720,500; and for Willamette basin protection from \$200,000 to \$450,000.

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The subcommittee also put in \$115,000 for planning Cougar reservoir in the Willamette valley.

Offers Ease Woodworkers' Strike Threat

PORTLAND, May 12—(AP)—The threat of a CIO Woodworkers' strike eased tonight at the Long-Bell Lumber company followed Willamette valley employers in offering health and welfare benefits sought by the union.

The union said the agreement probably would set the pattern for other CIO contracts throughout the Pacific northwest lumbering industry.

The union had threatened to send its 40,000 members on strike Monday, but this threat was eased as the Willamette valley operators association, representing about 50 firms in Oregon, agreed on a new contract in the early morning.

Hours later, the Long-Bell firm of Longview, Wash., agreed to a similar contract. It covers about 2,500 employees.

James E. Fadling, president of the woodworkers, said the union won its health and welfare demands, but compromised on its demand for paid holidays.

The agreement provides that employers pay 7 1/2 cents per man hour to insurance companies or hospital associations designated by the union, to finance health and welfare benefits.

It also provides three paid holidays — Memorial day, Fourth of July, Labor day — instead of the six originally asked by the union.

Rail Firemen's Strike Stays In Deadlock

CHICAGO, May 12—(AP)—Chairman Francis O'Neill Jr. of the national (railway) mediation board said tonight the locomotive firemen's strike is "just as deadlocked now as at the start."

O'Neill made the comment at the end of a meeting between the board and representatives of the struck rail lines.

He said the striking firemen's union had not made a new offer.

Earlier in the day, hopes for an early break in the strike against four key lines arose when the union was reported to have made a new peace offer.

The number of workers idled by the strike neared the 200,000 mark, meanwhile, and there were fresh outbreaks of violence as some of the struck lines attempted to expand their skeleton service.

The brotherhood of locomotive firemen and engineers called the strike against parts of the Pennsylvania, New York central, Southern and Santa Fe systems to back its demands for an extra fireman on some big diesel.

A bullet was reported fired into the cab of a New York Central diesel freight as it pulled out of Elkhart, Ind. The front diesel engine of another New York Central freight was reported derailed in the Collinwood yards in Cleveland. The train was being operated by white collar workers.

Fight Over Firing Ends in Death Of Road Foreman

KLAMATH FALLS, May 12—(AP)—A fight between a road foreman and a just-fired truck driver ended in a death today.

Samuel V. Godard, the foreman, and John Holloway, the truck driver, got into a fight after Godard discharged Holloway.

District Attorney D. E. Van Vactor said Godard apparently picked up a shovel, hit Holloway with it, then collapsed on the

ground, dead. Godard's death was attributed by the district attorney to a heart attack. Holloway was taken to the hospital with a bad head cut.

Democratic Senator Charges Budenz As 'Publicity Seeker'

WASHINGTON, May 12—(AP)—Senator Chavez (D-NM), a Roman Catholic, today denounced Louis Budenz, accused of Owen Lattimore, as a lying publicity seeker who "advertised his conversion to Catholicism" and who "has been using the cross as a club."

This was immediately challenged by Senator McCarthy (R-Wis) who defended Budenz as courageous, truthful, accurate—the victim of an "outrageous attempt to smear."

Chavez also assailed in a senate speech what he termed the "wild, irresponsible charges" of McCarthy, who presented Budenz as a star witness in the senate's investigation of the state department.

Budenz is a former managing editor of the Communist Daily Worker who re-entered the Catholic church five years ago and announced renunciation of the communist party. He now is a professor at Fordham university, a Jesuit school in New York. He could not be reached at once for comment.

Chavez said he still regarded Budenz as a communist.

The senator declared that Budenz "possessed no evidence" when he testified three weeks ago. Budenz asserted that Lattimore, a far eastern affairs expert and occasional state department adviser, had been a member of a communist cell and had been referred to Morrison-Knudsen Co. by \$4,372,521 by Guy F. Atkinson Co.

"I speak as a Roman Catholic," Chavez said, adding: "Budenz has been speaking with special emphasis as a Catholic, investing his appearances and utterances with an added sanctity by virtue of the fact that he recently went through the forms of conversion to Catholicism."

"My ancestors brought the cross to this hemisphere. Louis Budenz has been using this cross as a club."

McCarthy, who was not present as Chavez spoke, said in a statement that the New Mexico senator "was apparently used and duped."

U.S. Drafting Note to Force Czech Ousters

WASHINGTON, May 12—(AP)—A note demanding a mass ouster of Czechoslovak diplomats from the United States has been drafted at the state department.

The demand is expected to be given the communist Czech government in the immediate future in retaliation for the ejection from Czechoslovakia of two-thirds of the American diplomats there.

If the United States acts on the same two-thirds scale, it will mean about 20 of the more than 30 Czech diplomatic employes in this country will have to get one-way tickets home. State department officials said there were about 67 U. S. diplomatic employes in the embassy at Prague and the consulate at Bratislava.

Officials said the contemplated slash here — which is subject only to a final approval by top state department officials — would result not only in a reduction of the five-man staff at the embassy in Washington but also in the closing of one or more of three Czech consulates, operating in New York, Pittsburgh and Cleveland.

The Prague government cracked down on the U. S. diplomatic and consular missions following the trial and conviction of six Czechs on spy charges. The defendants gave the communist court testimony that four embassy officials had organized and aided spies.

BRITISH CLAIM ATOM SUB

AMSTERDAM, The Netherlands, May 12—(AP)—The first sea lord of the British admiralty said today Britain has an atom-powered submarine in the experimental stage. Adm. Lord Fraser of North Cape did not elaborate on his statement, made at a news conference during an official visit to The Netherlands.

Joseph Dam Bids Opened

SEATTLE, May 12—(AP)—A bid of \$2,176,813 cleared the way today for awarding of a contract soon for the first construction phase for Chief Joseph dam on the Columbia river.

The bid by Peter Kiewit Sons Co. of Omaha, Neb., and Longview, Wash., was \$539,000 below the government's fair cost estimate.

Col. E. C. Itchner, district army engineer who opened the bids, said the contract award will be made after study. Four other bids also were received from the first phase of the \$234,000,000 project downstream from Grand Coulee dam.

They ranged from \$2,823,352 by Morrison-Knudsen Co. to \$4,372,521 by Guy F. Atkinson Co.

Top Commie Starts 1-Year Jail Sentence

WASHINGTON, May 12—(AP)—Eugene Dennis, general secretary of the communist party, began serving a year's sentence in jail today — with another five years hanging over him.

Federal Judge David A. Pine ordered the 44-year-old red leader committed at once to pay the one-year penalty he imposed on Dennis for contempt of congress in 1947. A \$1,000 fine goes with it.

Dennis fought the case through the supreme court in vain. Now he is fighting the second sentence — five years and \$10,000 fine handed him in New York for conspiracy to overthrow the government. His appeal is pending there.

Dennis pleaded he was entitled to remain free in order to prepare the appeal in the New York case in which he acted as his own attorney.

The defendant appeared with Joseph Forer, his lawyer in the contempt case. Forer told Judge Pine it wouldn't be fair to send Dennis to jail now because of the pending appeal.

"If I followed your suggestion," Judge Pine said, "a criminal could stay out of jail forever by committing another crime and then representing himself."

Dennis is paying the penalty because he refused to answer a subpoena of the house unamerican activities committee. He had volunteered to testify against proposals to outlaw the communist party, but he then had refused to answer such preliminary questions as where he was born and names he had used. So he was dismissed and the subpoena followed.

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Jet Plane Flies New Speed Mark

GLOUCESTER, Eng., May 12—(AP)—A meteor jet fighter sped 1,000 kilometers (621 miles) over a closed course today at a claimed world record average of 510.9 miles an hour.

The present recognized mark of 462.9 for the distance was set by Lt. Henry A. Johnson of the U.S. air force at Dayton, Ohio, on May 18, 1946. He flew a P-80 jet.

Jim Cocksey, test pilot for the Gloucester Aircraft Co. company, piloted the meteor on its record run.

Astoria Finds 2 More Bodies

ASTORIA, May 12—(AP)—Two more bodies have been found in Clatsop county, making three such discoveries within a week.

Two 15-year-old boys playing in a secluded area of west Astoria came across the body of Vain Loukula, 60, Astoria, who had been sought since Monday. Coroner Raymond O. Luce said the man had committed suicide.

The body of an unidentified man was found near the Clatsop county line by D. M. Gilbert, Vernonia. The body, dead a long time, had apparently washed down from higher up on the South fork of Wolf creek, officials said.

An autopsy is being performed on John Buhakka, Roseburg, Wash., whose body was found Monday on the south jetty.
