Method of Revoking Paroles Upheld in Circuit Court Case

Contention that a penitentiary prisoner's parole revocation was invalid because he had no hearing before the parole board was denied in a decision Friday in Marion county circuit court.

James Quentin Anderson of Klamath Falls was held "lawfully confined and detained," but his attorney said the case would be appealed to the state supreme court.

Prisoner Gets 20 More Years As 'Habitual'

George Washington Durham, a state prison inmate, drew a 20-year sentence in Marion county circuit court Friday for violation of the habitual criminal act.

Circuit Judge George R. Duncan ordered that the sentence be indeterminate and that Durham be credited for time served at the penitentiary since April 29, 1949. He had been handed a two-year sentence then on a burglary-attempt charge.

Durham's other felony convictions were listed as follows: Nebraska, 1928, second-degree burglary, larceny at scene of burglary and auto larceny; Multnomah county, 1934, burglary, 1938, receiving stolen property and possession of pistol after felony conviction; Union county, 1945, possession of pistol.

Also sentenced Friday were George C. Gilbert, Portland, who was meted a three-year sentence on a charge of passing a fraudulent \$15 check last September; and Dale Lee Palmer, who was placed on probation for three years on a larceny count.

Wright, Thompson Named to Council On Indian Affairs

Harvey Wright of Salem and Coquille Thompson a Willamette university graduate now residing at Grand Ronde were appointed Friday as Oregon's representatives on the governors' interstate council on Indian affairs.

Wright state director of Indian education is attending a meeting of the council this week end in Salt Lake City. Thompson has been prominent in affairs of the Grand Ronde tribe.

Work of the new council formed last year in Minneapolis, Minn., aims at eventual transfer of responsibility for Indians from federal to state government agencies.

Daniel H. Schulze Resigns Student Manager Duties

Dr. Daniel H. Schulze announced Friday he would resign next month as general manager of the Associated Students of Willamette university.

Schulze, a professor of German and religious subjects, said the move would allow him more time to fulfill teaching commitments and to deal personally with students who need help outside classrooms.

The professor, a Willamette faculty member for the past 20 years, took over the Associated Students post in 1947. President G. Herbert Smith said Friday no successor had been appointed.

Columbia Flood Threat in June Warned by Governor McKay

A serious Columbia river flood threat is expected about June 15 with a crest of 25 feet at Vancouver, Gov. Douglas McKay said Friday.

The crest of a disastrous flood two years ago was 30 feet but this one could be just as bad or worse and federal and state agencies are now preparing for a possible emergency, McKay said.

He said activities of army engineers, the interior department, state police, state civilian defense, National Guard, Red Cross and the Multnomah county sheriff's office are now being coordinated.

Hop Crop Study Shows U.S. Product in Demand as Export

The world's 1949 hop crop was lower than estimated last fall, according to reports released Friday by the U.S. department of agriculture following a final check-up.

Revised estimates place the 1949 hop crop of foreign countries, which before the war accounted for more than 92 per cent of the world's total, at only 110,120,000 pounds. Last fall the estimated crop was 500,000 more than this.

This places the 1949 crop at a million less pounds than harvested in 1948 and about 10 million short of the average annual pre-war harvest.

The only countries in which the 1949 hop crop was listed as more than that of 1948 were Germany, France, Canada and Australia. Production was lower in the United States, the United Kingdom, Czechoslovakia, Belgium, the Union of South Africa and New Zealand.

Export demand for United States hops was reported as continuing at a high level. This is largely due to the USDA reports, to the fact that American hops have become well established in many countries which before the war purchased the bulk of their import needs from central Europe.

With the rapid improvement in the quality of the American product, hops from the United States can compete favorably now with hops from any country, according to the department of agriculture.

Of special interest in hop circles, were the substantial shipments of United States hops to Czechoslovakia and Germany, traditionally two of the world's leading hop exporting countries. Other European markets which took larger quantities of United States hops in the first six months season, were Denmark, Greece and The Netherlands, Switzerland and Belgium-Luxembourg. Shipments to Austria, Eire and Portugal show substantial reductions, probably, the USDA explained, because of the heavy shipments to those markets during the previous season.

Col. Mark Hillary, executive secretary of the Salem Memorial Auditorium association, will leave next Friday on a tour of eastern cities to investigate their auditorium facilities.

Hillary is to visit St. Joseph, Mo., Richmond, Ind., Columbus and Zanesville, Ohio, Hershey and Williamsport, Pa., Kingsport and Memphis, Tenn., Little Rock, Ark., Oklahoma City, Okla., Amarillo, Tex., and Carson City and Reno, Nev.

He is to make a detailed inspection of each city's response to its auditorium needs and the use made of such facilities, as well as costs and locations in reference to city centers.

City officials in the various communities already have been contacted in order to facilitate the survey on Hillary's arrival.

Inducing Girls For Sideshow Cited in Arrest

A woman charged with inducing two teen-aged Salem girls to join a sideshow in a traveling carnival was lodged in Marion county jail Friday afternoon.

Genevieve Margaret Newman, 47-year-old manager of a girls' show in Douglas Greater shows, is charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor. She is being held on \$1,000 bail.

State police officers arrested the woman late Thursday night in Springfield on a Marion county district court warrant. She was lodged Thursday night in Lane county jail at Eugene. Two Marion county deputy sheriffs returned her to Salem Friday.

Officers said the two girls joined the show Monday night and worked Tuesday and Wednesday nights in Springfield. The girls one 18 and one 17, were released to custody of their parents.
