Roy Also Achieves Tie for Balk Lead

PORTLAND, May 14 (AP)—Lefty Roy Helser blundered his way into a tie for the Coast League balking championship tonight, but managed nevertheless to pitch Portland to a 5-2 win over Sacramento.

Helser committed four balks, besides giving up nine hits, but he bore down in the pinches and blanked Sacramento in all but the sixth and ninth innings. The four balks gave him a total of 14 for the season, relegating him to a tie with another Portland, Red Adams, for the league balking lead. The win was Helser's sixth of the season, against two losses. Bill Evans, who went the route for Sacramento, committed three balks himself.

In other games the second-place Hollywood Stars pulled within two games of the front-running San Diego Padres by edging Los Angeles, 5-4 in a 10-inning mix. At the same time the Padres were being shutout by Seattle and Jim Wilson, 5-0. San Francisco piled it on Oakland, 10-4.

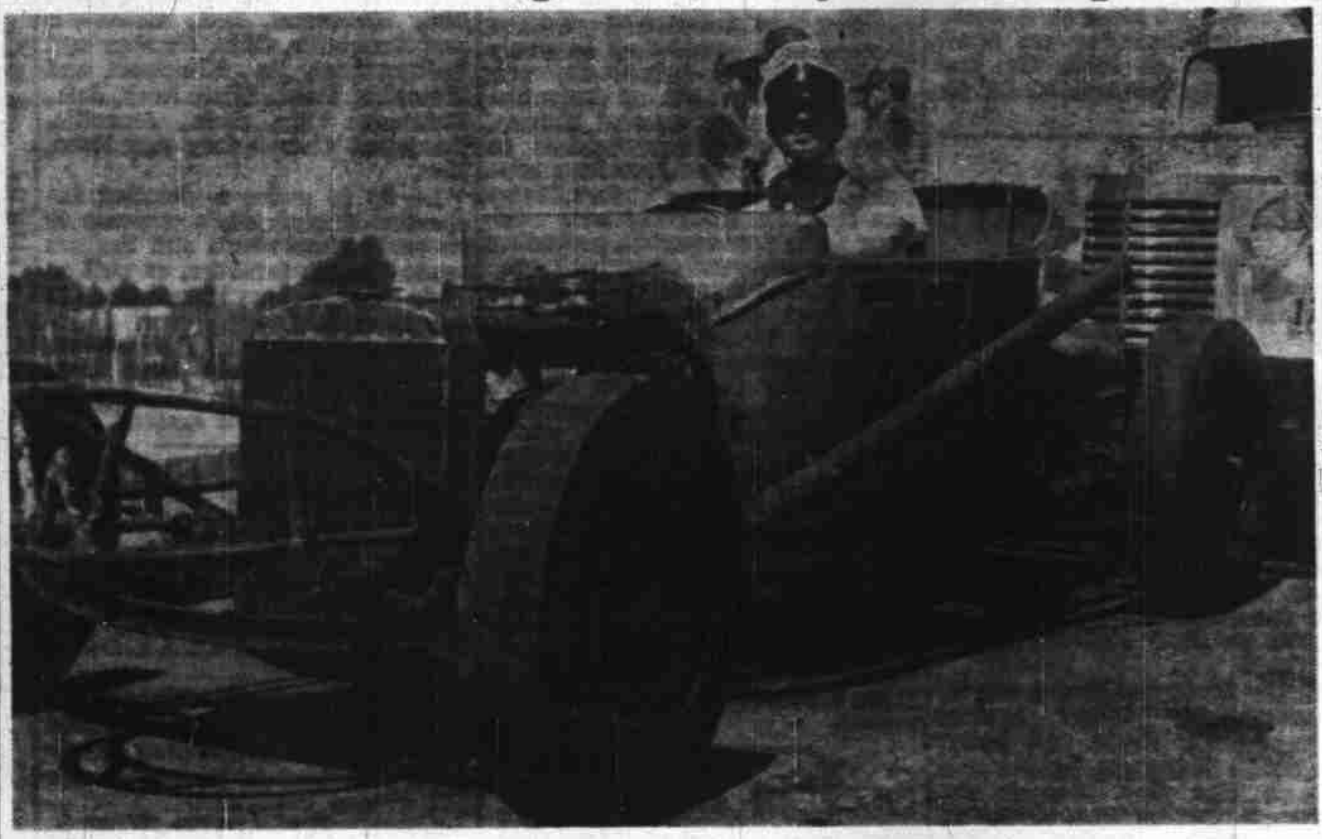

Local Auto Racing Campaign Opens at Holly-Bow Tonight

Over 20 Cars For Inaugural

Salem's 1950 auto racing season in newly-remodeled Hollywood Bowl gets away from the starting gate tonight, with time trials scheduled for a 7:30 o'clock debut. The main batch of races, including 3-lap helmet dash, four heat sprints of from six to eight laps each, Class B mainer at 25 laps and Class A mainer at 40 laps, will start immediately following all time-ins. The "A" main is expected to get under way at 10 p.m.

Over 20 roaring roadsters, oft better known as hot rods, and some of them brand new equipment this year, are ready for the inaugural. Most are from Portland and Salem, but at least half a dozen will be from the Seattle-Tacoma and Oakland, Cal., areas. The sponsoring Valley Sports outfit, locally operated this year, definitely will have the Washington and California prize seekers here.

Numerous "opening night" prizes have been arranged for both winning drivers and spectators. Queen Nancy Miller and her Cherry Festival princesses will help to open the program officially and Miss Nancy will ride into the premises in Harry Eyerly's "Jaguar", a sleek foreign car.

Tonight's races will be the first this year in Oregon to be sanctioned by the Oregon Motor Racing Contest Board, which is affiliated nationally. Consequently many of the top racing pilots of the Northwest will be at the wheels of the souped-up "rods". Such well known drivers as Louie Sherman, Ernie Koch, Randy Francis, Len Sutton, Crash Timmins, Max Humm, Dar Moore, Gordy Livingston, Corky Corcoran and others will be in the action.

Acting promoter Charley Heitz may also install a "grudge" race of five laps involving the three fastest cars from Oregon, Washington and California.

Pat Vidin, classed as the No. 1 auto racing starter on the Pacific Coast will be the local flagman tonight.

Salem will be well represented in the meet with seven locally-owned and driven roadsters. Owners Don Waters, Frankie McGowan (3 cars), Jack Griner, Bob Pendergraft and Charles Heitz have buzz buggies ready to go. The 1949 Roadster Champion Max Humm pilots the Waters No. 73 car, and the Heitz wagon, driven by Ernie Koch, is reputedly one of the fastest machines in the Northwest.

Overall painting, track patching, rest rooms and parking areas revamping and other remodeling labors on the bowl premises were completed in mid-week.

And surprisingly enough it was the veteran Catcher Joe Rossi, of whom one doesn't expect much galloping on the bases, who pilfered the Salem pockets.

Big Joe opened the second inning by walking, swiped second and rambled home on First-sacker Norm Grabar's double off the right field fence. Then in the sixth Rossi opened with a single to right, advanced to second on another costly base on balls issued by Steve, stole third and came on to score on Sol Israel's infield out.

Rossi accomplished enough right there to win the game, and of the five bingles Alan Strange's crew got, Joe collected two. The other Spoke tally came in the ninth on another walk, a double and Eddie Murphy's ground out.

The Salems threatened seriously in three innings after their producing first, but didn't have the punch to dent the hard-working Rocky. The biggest chance came in the eighth with the sacks jammed and one out. Bus McMillan grounded into a double play, however, and that was that.

Rocky gave six hits, two apiece to Wasley and Wally Scott. He had his wild moments also, but three Spoke double plays helped haul him home on top.

Suit Threats Removed

Harassed ABC'ers Vote Out Discrimination Rule

COLUMBUS, O., May 12 (AP)—Memberships in the American Bowling congress, limited to white males for the last 34 years were thrown wide open today. Convention delegates, following recommendations of the ABC "brass" and harassed by court decisions and other pressure, needed only 27 minutes to erase the controversial restriction from the books.

Only a few dissenting voices were heard as the 518 delegates to the 47th annual meeting gave the motion to oust the rule a rousing majority.

The vote came after Michael J. Dunn of Milwaukee, ABC legal counsel, told the delegates they must remove the membership restriction or risk losing the entire supervisory structure of the governing tenpin body.

Dunn hinted that the convention's action would put a halt to court suits now pending in Ohio, Illinois, Wisconsin and New York, and to others threatened in Michigan and Minnesota.

Although many delegates came to the convention with instructions to fight for retention of the "white male" rule there was no indication of opposition after the delegates heard Dunn's explanation and a request from the executive directors that the restriction be removed.

A Chicago court ruled three weeks ago that the restriction was discriminatory, fined the ABC \$2,500, and threatened to void the organization's Illinois charter if it were not removed.

Gophers Name Ike Armstrong

SALT LAKE CITY, May 12 (AP)—In a surprise move, Ike J. Armstrong, athletic director at University of Utah, today was named director of athletics at University of Minnesota. The 54-year-old Utah mentor will complete the school year and report to his new position July 1. He will replace Frank McCormick, who resigned.

The Utah board of regents released Armstrong from a contract which had three years to run at a salary of \$9,000 a year.

The personable athletic director, who is also head football coach, will wind up his 25th year at Utah next month.

NEW YORK, May 12 (AP)—The New York Yankees and the Boston Red Sox climbed to within a half game of the American league's pace-setting Detroit Tigers today.

The Yanks moved up by downing the Philadelphia Athletics, 3-2, in a night game while the Red Sox advanced with a 3-1 daylight triumph over the Washington Senators. The Tigers and St. Louis Browns were not scheduled.

Jerry Coleman and Tommy Byrne were the Yanks' winning combination. Coleman unloaded a three run homer in the fifth inning to account for all the Yanks' runs. Byrne tamed the A's on eight hits.

Young Mickey McDermott allowed Washington only five hits in outpitching the veteran Ray Scarborough. McDermott, in posting his third victory, fanned seven and walked five.

Rookie Al Rosen belted a three run homer in the first inning to spark the Cleveland Indians to a 5-1 victory over the Chicago White Sox in a night game in Cleveland.

Bob Rush, aided by a pair of two run homers by Preston Ward and Andy Pafko, pitched the Chicago Cubs to a 6-3 decision over the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Ewell Blackwell cooled off the hot St. Louis Cardinals on five hits as he pitched the Cincinnati Reds to a 3-1 triumph under the lights at St. Louis.

The New York Giants, Brooklyn Dodgers, Boston Braves and Philadelphia Phils were not scheduled.
