Viks, Jeffmen Top Favorites

Olinger Field Site Of Cinder Payoffs

With Vern Gilmore's Salem Vikings and Pat Beal's Jefferson Lions tabbed as the outfits to beat, both the Class A and B divisions of the annual District 7 track and field meet will be galloped off today on Olinger field. Qualifying prelims open at 10 a.m. in most events, with the finals set for a 1 p.m. takeoff.

Entered in the "A" division along with Salem are these schools, in the order in which they are picked to finish behind the Viks: Molalla, Silverton, Woodburn, Stayton, Sacred Heart and Mt. Angel. Jefferson's strong Lions will be competing with Gervais and the Oregon School for the Deaf mostly, but some athletes will be entered also from Chemawa, Turner and possibly Aumsville, Mill City, North Marion, St. Paul and Detroit.

According to earlier performances this spring by the Class A lads, no meet records will be broken. Salem's Buzz Covalt is capable of smashing his 440 mark of 51.4, but has been bothered with a pulled leg muscle this week and may only be out to qualify for next week's state classic at Corvallis.

A few new records may be hung up in the Class B division, however. Most of these standards were notched only last year as track in the B division suddenly grew up. Given another year of development, the B boys could write in many new marks today.

Jefferson's Jim Grimes and Gervais' Pat Mahoney both hold B division records, and will be in the action today.

Class A and B events will be held in alternating order for the meet. The first two finishers in each event will qualify for the state meet next week.

Johnson's Bat Sizzles

Vikings Sock Lebanon 13-0

Outfielder Bill Johnson knocked in seven runs with a homer, triple and double and Pitchers Sonny Walker and Jim Rock contributed a five-hit pitching job to spark Salem high's Vikings to a 13-0 victory over Lebanon's Warriors Friday at Olinger.

Johnson, continuing the thunderous hitting which saw him belt over five tallies with a home run and triple against Silverton Thursday, slammed his latest circuit wallop with the sacks bulging in the first frame. He came up again in the same frame — the Harold Hawk team scored ten times in that inning — and delivered his three-base smash also with the bases loaded to make it six tallies that led over the plate in that one inning. The Viks collected eight hits during the big spurge, all off Lebanon's Rodney Bean.

Walker yielded four hits and fanned six in five frames and Rock gave one blow in the final two frames. Walker got the win, his second in three tries.

Ron Parsons picked up a double and three singles for Salem and Jack Largent had a trio of one-basers.

Willamette's Bearcats made a successful defense of their Northwest conference golf crown Friday as they emerged victors over five other circuit schools in the annual meet held on the Salem course.

The 'Cats, mentored by Jim Johnson, hit for a total of 632 strokes over the 36 holes of play, with the torrid shooting of Bill Wittenberg leading the way. Wittenberg was meet medalist with 136 and equalled the Salem course record of 64 on the second 18 holes.

Lewis and Clark was runnerup with a 651 total, Pacific was third with 653, Linfield had 661, College of Idaho garnered 664 and Whitman trailed with 681 strokes.

Today the WU tennis crew plays host to the conference net tourney. Action is set to start at 9:30 this morning with all circuit schools sending swimmers. Tim Pearce of Whitman is defending singles king and is given a good chance of retaining his crown.

Cece Connors will represent the 'Cats in singles play and Coach Les Sparks will use Ray McCoy and Al Miles in doubles.
