In-Fancy Dress

Simple Foods Can Be Dolled Up to Become Party Fare, With Good Recipe

Sometimes simple rather homey food can become pretty dressy when the right recipe is used. Take this one for instance, it uses cabbage, hamburger or ground beef and macaroni, yet is a nice dinner dish when completed.

STUFFED CABBAGE
½ pound ground beef 1 teaspoon salt
1 cup ¼-inch macaroni, ¼ teaspoon pepper
cooked ¼ cup brown sauce
¾ cup milk
Mix meat with macaroni, milk, salt, pepper and brown sauce (may be beef cube in water). Cut a slice from the top of a medium sized cabbage, remove center and fill with the meat mixture. Cover with the slice of cabbage which was removed. Tie in a square of cheese cloth and steam for 1½ hours or until tender. Plate on a round platter, remove cloth and surround cabbage with brown mushroom sauce or tomato sauce and garnish.

BROWN MUSHROOM SAUCE
½ pound mushrooms 5 tablespoons flour
1 cup cold water 1½ cups brown stock
¾ cup butter Salt and pepper
Wash mushrooms, remove stems and chop or slice thin. Boil for about 20 minutes in the water, there should be about ¾ cup juice. Cook mushroom caps in the butter until clean. Remove, and to the fat in the pan add the flour, stir until smooth then add the remaining ingredients, adding mushroom caps after sauce is completed.

Browned almond sauce for fish is elegant, and can be made simply

BROWNED ALMOND SAUCE
¼ cup salted almonds Few grains pepper
2 tablespoon butter 1 cup thin cream
1 tablespoon flour
Melt the butter, add flour, and pepper and add the almonds. When heated and butter and flour are blended, add the cream slowly and stir until smooth. Pour over fillet of sole or other fish.

COLE SLAW, MINNEAPOLIS-STYLE
Small head cabbage 1 tablespoon green pepper
½ pintonnet, cup up 1 teaspoon celery seed
2 tablespoons pickle relish Cooked salad dressing or French
Moisten shredded cabbage with the dressing, to which have been added the remaining ingredients.

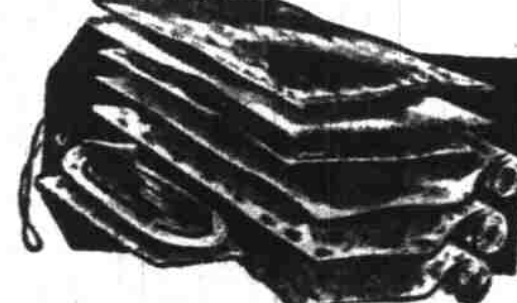
